



There is still room in many households and businesses for better planning and fuller and more efficient use of all goods and services at hand. This goes beyond efficient use to household supplies. transportation and financial resources. As a partener in the inflation fight, the government, Timm believes, needs to be even more aggressive in getting larger farm and industrial production, in securing better distribution of present supplies of food and other goods, in correlating domestic in keeping wages from getting out of line, and in using its fiscal and monetary powers.
