OTHER STATE TAXES (except school taxes) Though T & P's contribution to the state general fund was only \$33,350 last year, it normally averages \$117,750 per year.





LEVEE AND DRAINAGE TAX T & P paid into various levee and drainage tax funds a total of \$90,169 last year.
