Corn salad, also called lamb's lettuce, is an annual that may be mixed with lettuce or water cress as a mixed salad. It is sown in the early spring in 16 to 18 inch rows about a foot apart in the row, and is handled about the same as lettuce or mustard in fertilization and cultivation. The flavor of corn salad is very mild, and may be improved some by mixing with other salad plants.

Endive is another crop similar to lettuce, but is more tolerant to the summer heat. It should be planted about the same time as lettuce, and thinned to 8 or 10 inches in the row. The other instructions are the same as the plants already named

Garlie is another of those onion plants, and the main thing to remember about garlie is that a little goes a long way. They are planted and handled like onions and chives. When the tops break and fall over, the bulbs are pulled, dried, and braided into strings by their tops or tied in bunches and stored in a cool, dry place. Be sure they don't freeze.
