

75 years ago a group of Galveston businessmen and merchants made plans to build a railroad from the Gulf into the heart of Texas and out across the Southwest.

Starting the G. C. & S. F.

On June 6, 1873, the Gulf, Colorado

and Santa Fe was incorporated. The first tracks reached Belton by 1881, then west to Brownwood and north to Fort Worth and Dallas, then a branch extending to Navasota and Conroe.

By 1886 the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe had grown to the point of building into Oklahoma. At this time the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe was expanding in the Middle West and building southward. 



County Agent John A. Barton has been designated to handle the distribution of grasshopper poison in Runnels county this year. A mixing station has been set up at the Ballinger Co-op Gin and all mixed polson will be secured

Frank Kemp, in charge of the mixing station, stated the mixed bait would be ready by Saturday of this week.

The bran and poison is being furnished by the government. The peanut hulls and syrup are to be purchased by the farmer and a small cost will be added for mixing the poison bait.

Sodium fluorsilicate is the poison to be used, which is just as effective as arsenic and has the advantage that it loses its strength after two weeks or more while arsenic never loses it strength.

Dorchester was torpedoed and sunk in the North Atlantic in Pebruary, 1943. On board were four chaplains of three faiths: Protestant ministers George L. Fox and Clark V. Poling, Pather John P. Statements of the survivors of the sinking include these words: This is the picture engraved on our minds and hearts as the S.S. Dorchester disappeared beneath the waves.'




