



NAVAL CADET POSTS NOW **OPEN FOR MEN 18 TO 25**

Applications of unmarried men between the ages of 18 and 25 are being taken at the navy recruiting station at Brady for naval aviation cadet training. Under the re-implemented

program, first authorized in 1942, the navy will accept about 2,000 cadets for training this year, and will continue with large yearly quotas.

Candidates for the program enlist in the naval reserve and agree to serve a total of four years on active duty. This includes approximately 18 months of indoctrination and flight training, and a period of service in the operating forces.

After successfully completing training, cadets are commissioned either as ensigns in the naval reserve, or as 2nd lieutenants in the marine corps reserve.

Applicants must have completed at least two full years, or who may be expected to complete these requirements during the current semester, in an accredited junior college, college or university. In addition they must pass the naval aviation physical examination and flight aptitude test.

As cadets succeesful candidates will receive \$75 monthly, lodging board and uniforms.
