



H. J. R. No. 13 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION amending Section 15 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a provision that the husband and wife from time to time may in writing partition between them-selves in severalty or into undi-vided interests all or any part of their community property, wheretheir community property, where-upon without prejudice to the right of existing creditors the por-tion or interest set aside to each spouse shall be and constitute a part of the separate property of such spouse: further providing that such Constitutional Amend-ment if adopted shall be selfoperative and self-executing: pro-viding for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State: prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the procla-mation and publication thereof. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGIS-LATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 15 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 15. All property, both real and personal, of the wife, owned or claimed by her before marriage, or that acquired after ward by gift, devise or descent, shall be the separate property of the wife; and laws shall be passed
