COLLEGE STATION, Feb. 23 .-Landscaping and the women's home demonstration clubs went a long way last year

There were over 20,000 women enrolled as demonstrators who improved their own home lawns Of this number, more than 1,300 gave demonstrations and assisted in conducting training meetings for their clubs. The leaders asisted in making 34 study tours to experiment substations, and they opened their own homes and helped conduct 351 Achievement Day tours to see neighbors'

accomplishments. Sadie Hatfield, extension landscape gardening specialist of Texas A. & M. College, says in her annual report that 65 tours were also made to homes of garden club members. Control of insects and plant diseases were among the landscaping programs conducted. Other accomplishments for the year included teaching their neighbors how to prune trees and shrubs, build barbecue pits and outdoor living room furniture, and arrange flowers.


The demonstrators say they learned more than the people they taught, reports Miss Hatfield. Not only were they benefited materially, but here are the figures to show the actual number of yard improvements made. There were nearly 4,500 outdoor living rooms arranged and furnished, over 2,300 drives and 2,700 walks built. And nearly 29,300 shrubs and trees were grown from seeds and cuttings.



HERE in Texas, we have an amazing situahorse. We have carefully required by law that the members of nearly every trade or profession prove themselves qualified in their field before practicing in it. Our plumbers, teachers, veterinarians, attorneys, all must meet minimum

And yet we have no minimum standards for those who minister to our ill, whose job is to insure our health.

Your active support is needed for a law which will abolish ignorance from the sick room, protect patients and save lives.

As things stand now in Texas, you cannot be sure that the man who treats you is qualified to do so. Regardless of whether he is a doctor of medicine, osteopath, chiropractor or naturopath, you cannot be sure that he has fundamental background in such things as human anatomy, disease, effect of drugs and so on. The only purpose in a Minimum Standards Law is to improve the health standards of the people of Texas, to protect Texans from quackery and to safeguard our sick rooms from incompetence.
