





Shell, pastor of the Church of God. Mrs. Joe Forman, president of the Council of Church Women, presided at the meeting and presented Mrs. C. F. Bailey, who introduced her personal friend, Mrs. Mow.

"The Lord is Thy Keeper" was the program theme. "The Lord's Prayer" was the basis for the very interesting talk given by Mrs. Mow. She stated that the more she studied the prayer the more psychologically and spiritually per cent she had found it. Mrs. Mow suggested that there were two things unique in Christianity, and they were (1) We do not have to seek God, but that God seeks us, and (2) that Christianity has the highest ideal of all religions. She considers that reverence is most lacking in America.

In giving a short history of the Day of Prayer, Mrs. Mow stated that it was a great day for church women because they were in prayer in many countries.





Anyone who proposes to enter any branch of the healing art would be required to pass examinations in the six sciences generally recognized as being basic to all forms of healing. They would then appear before the licensing board of whatever branch of healing they propose to enter.

The Minimum Candards Bill does not affect an an who is now legally practicing a healing art in Texas.

Examinations would be conducted by a qualified board of science teachers from our leading Texas universities and colleges. These teachers would be appointed by the Governor at regular intervals. No practitioner of a healing art could be a board member. This means a fair and impartial board.

Examinations would be in these six basic sciences: Anatomy, Physiology, Chemistry, Bacteriology, Pathology, Hygiene and Public Health. Applicants will identify their examination papers by number, not by name.

Eighteen other states have enacted minimum standards laws. Here in Texas, we require that our plumbers, lawyers, veterinarians, teachers - just about everyone except the people who treat us for illness-meet minimum standards.

Health freedom of Texas is at stake in basic science legislation now pending before

the Texas Legislature, Dr. J. Lester Ohlhausen, of Ballinger, said today Dr. Ohlhausen said basic science legislation had been approved by committees in both the Texas Senate and House of Representatives and unless the public speaks out against the legislation, basic science may become law.

The basic science legislation, he said, was being opposed by Texas chiropractors, osteo-paths and naturopaths, and hundreds of people who have been helped by practitioners of

Dr. Ohlhausen said basic science was being opposed by these three professions because it is 1) discriminatory, 2) placed too much power in the hands of one profession (the Texas Medical Association); 3) deprived the people of their right to select the type of health treatment they desired; and 4) super boards set up by basic science would be a duplication of the licensing board and thus a waste of taxpayers' money.

"The claim is being made that basic science will raise the standards of healing arts practitioners," Dr. Ohlhausen said. "It will do no such thing, because the bills, now being considered by the Legislature, specifically exempt all present practitioners."

Dr. Ohlhausen said a more practical measure—a chiropractic licensing law that will raise standards among the chiropractic practitioners—was now pending in the Legislature and "would do all the things the proponents of basic science claim their bill would do."

"Licensing has worked very well in other professions, and it is much more sati-factory than a drastic basic science law," he said.

The basic science legislation is aimed directly at eliminating chiropractors in the state," or. Ohlhausen said. The fact that in other states where basic science legislation has been enacted the number of chiropractors allowed to practice had been cut down was proof of this statement, he said. "Several of the so-called basic science states are now in the process of repealing the basic science laws," he said, "because basic science not only stifled chiropractors and others, but also cut down on the number of medical doctors, thus creating a
