



#### **County Agent Urges Immediate Spraying** To Get Case Bearer

warning all pecan growers that it is now time to take care of the case béarer. He pointed out that with subsoil moisture plentiful, no cold weather probable, and a good spray growth on the trees, spraying should be done to prevent

damage by the case bearer. A suggestion for a spray is six pounds of lead arsenate, 1 pint of nicotine sulphate or black leaf, 40 to 100 gallons of water. Another effective spray is 6 pounds of DDT 50 per cent wettable powder to 100 gallons of water. Where trees are showing yellow leaves and unhealthy growth, it is suggested that the above formula contain 2 pounds of zinc sulphate to each 100 gallons of water, which will help the trees.

Mr. Barton said May 10 to 20 is usually the best time for spraying. The most effective period is short, the best time being when nuts have turned brown at the end and have set and been pol-

A power sprayer with 200 to 400 pounds pressure is best, and the spray should be worked well into the ends of the nut clusters



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
