### **Polio Incidence Said Increased in Texas**

AUSTIN, May 18 .- During the first seventeen weeks of 1948 there were only 55 cases of policmyelitis reported to the state health department, while in this same period for 1949 there have been 142 cases reported from different sections of the state, according to Dr. George W. Cox. state health officer. Seven cases were reported the last week in April, three from one county.

"Poliomyelitis is one of the most dreaded of all diseases," Dr. Cox said, "and justly so. It is more often a crippler than a killer, but in either case it takes a heavy

The Texas agricultural experiment sub-station ran some tests recently on sweet sudangrass and common sudangrass. At the conclusion of the experiment they decided that one is as good as another in sudangrass pastures. Common sudangrass yielded more total forage during the dry years and was drouth resistant. On the other hand, sweet sudan is resistant to the common bacterial foliage disease, and holds its lush greenness and palatability better as it approaches maturity with cattle grazing both the leaves and the stalks, says Gibson.


