



So it's best, says Moore, to keep the pullets growing in body and gaining weigh as fast as possible before their combs and wattles dish racks and other needed pieces develop. These kind make better egg producers.

Feeds containing soybean meal and cottonseed meal for protein, with small amounts of fish meal and meat scraps seem to be the best. The growing pullet should get this feed along with liberal amounts of grain and the best tender green range that you can give them. The addition of choice alfalfa leaf meal to the mash being fed is a good substitute

when good range is not available It is important to supply the growing birds with plenty of shade, pure, cool water and keep them clean. Moore says, if the pullets are developed properly, they will be ready to produce next fall and winter when egg prices are best. The kind of birds that go into the laying house in the fall will be largely determined by the treatment they get this summer, and concludes Moore, now is the time to practice poultry range management.

Farmers can save money if they will buy the water pump best suited for their needs. Three types of water pumps on the market give the farmer a choice, depending on the depth of his well.
