

Deferred Grazing Still Good Practice Specialists Assert

COLLEGE STATION, Oct. 5 .coupled with fairly good moisture conditions made it possible for many ranchmen and stock farmers to practice deferred grazing on much pasture land in the state this year. This is the pay-off season, says A. H. Walker, extension range specialist of Texas A. & M. College, and he recommends that grazing be withheld for another month or two to give the grasses a chance to mature their

seed. In some areas the preferred grasses have already made seed, but in others, they are making seed right now. He says give the elements a chance to shatter and distribute the seed first. If you permit grazing too soon, chances are good that you may lose what you have gained.

The choice is up to the individual producer as to whether he will grow the high producing good grasses or the low producing ones, says Walker. The essentials of good range management must be practiced to get the job done and

it takes time. By balancing the livestock with range forage production, deferred grazing, proper salt and water distribution and other management factors, more range livestock producers are finding that It pays to grow the good grasses,
