Split Duck Season To Begin in This **Zone November 4**

The duck season for this zone will be split this year, the first open period being from November 4 to November 21, inclusive. The second open period will start on December 21 and continue through

There are some ducks coming into this area now and the first few days of the 1949 season should provide good hunting. The recent cold snap caused many of these birds to migrate south and settle on lakes and ranch tanks in this region.

Hunters are reminded that only four ducks are allowed per day and not more than eight may be in possession at one time. No license is required for shooting in a person's own county, but if he hunts outside the county a license is demanded.

Each hunter, regardless of where he hunts, must obtain a federal duck stamp at a postoffice. These stamps cost \$2 each and are good for the full season. Game officials point out that this is a federal law and a person hunting on his


