The flax is about knee high and is now in full bloom and many people have inquired what was growing in the field. Mr. Barton stated that the field was beautiful and urged local people to see the highway. Mr. McKnight ha about 90 acres planted in flax.

Charles Dankworth, south of Ballinger, also has 25 to 30 acres in flax, and Leo Halfmann has about the same acreage. A number of other farmers have projects started this year and are testing their land for possible new crops.
