Various Activities Reported By Clubs at Council Meeting

The Runnels county home demonstration council held its regular meeting at 2:30 o'clock July 14 in the office of Miss Ollie Chenoweth, county home demonstration agent, with Mrs. Thomas Egan, vice-president, presiding.

A committee for nominating council officers for next year was appointed as follows: Mrs. H. O. Abbot, chairman, Mrs. B. M. Batts, and Mrs. Chester Busher. Officers will be elected for the council in October.

Mrs. Harold Routh read a letter from the Abilene State Hospital about our clubs' plans to send a box of birthday gifts to the patients in one ward of the hospital. Gifts preferred are personal items such as combs, lipsticks, powder, perfume, etc. A box of quilt scraps, embroidery material and other items will be sent next week.

Mrs. Bob Fowler was elected as county T.H.D.A. chairman. Mrs. Chester Busher and Mrs. Thomas Egan were elected delegates to the state meeting to be held at Big Spring on July 23, 24, 25. Mrs. Fowler will also attend this meeting. Mrs. A. W. Tyree was elected first alternate and Mrs. Tom Crockett second alternate.

Mrs. Fowler reported for the recreation committee. She stated that she helped with the recreation at the county 4-H club girls' encampment at Bruce Field last week. The 4-H girls enjoyed the songs, folk dances and square dances she taught them.

Mrs. Claude Simmons gave the report of the finance committee. She stated that council will raise its budget of \$300 by printing a home demonstration club calendar. Advertising space on the calendar will be sold by each club to the merchants in business in Runnels county, the price for the advertising ranging from \$10 to \$1. Each club woman in the county will pay 25c for having her name printed under the date of her birthday on the calendar, which also entitles her to a copy of the calendar. Each merchant buying advertising space gets a copy, also.

Each advertisement should be turned in to the finance committee or to Miss Chenoweth, together

with the money, by August 30, or before if possible.

Mrs. Neuman Smith read a letter from one of the 4-H girls who was elected to attend the district meeting. She thanked the council for the privilege of attending the meeting and told some of the interesting things she learned.

Nine clubs were represented at roll call. Several clubs were reported studying foreign countries, their food, living conditions, customs and climates. The Bethel club had studied South America and Mexico, Drasco had a lesson on Africa, Friendly Neighbors had studied England, and the Rowena club had studied Germany, showing slides of the refugees there. The Victory club adopted Japan as its foreign country and prepared a box of clothes, shoes, story books and other things to send to Japan.

The program on the proper care of the hair, skin and feet had been given at meetings of the Drasco, Rowena, Crews and Victory clubs, while other clubs studied cereals and foods, house-keeping made easier and the making of trays.

The Runnels 4-H club girls gave

a program for the South Ballinger club and seven girls from the Shamrock 4-H club were guests of the Victory club, giving a report on the district 4-H meeting and exhibiting some of their work.

Olfen club made \$5.25 selling cake and sandwiches at a ball game. Five dollars was donated to the Olfen girls' 4-H club. The club women are busy canning vegetables and pickles.

The South Ballinger club will have its regular meeting in August and is planning a social for members' families.

The council voted to furnish the ice, bread, plates, cups and napkins for the Rally Day picnic on August 30. These articles will be purchased by the social committee, Mrs. Neuman Smith and Mrs. B. M. Batts. The year-book committee had a meeting scheduled to follow the council's adjournment. Members of each club's year-book committee were present. A report on what was accomplished will be given at the next council meeting.
