A message was received here Tuesday announcing the first Ballinger casualty in the Korean war. Sgt. Donald Clubb, 26, was slightly wounded in combat on July 20, relatives here were informed.

He enlisted in the army for duty in World War II the day after Pearl Harbor was bombed and saw service in various sectors during the global conflict. 

We ask the property owners of Ballinger, who believe their property has been valued too high, to sign these petitions before Monday and if possible attend the meeting Monday morning at the city hall.


