# **Motor Equipment Registration Law**

vehicles and equipment.

The law recently passed places a large number of machines and pieces of farm and highway equipment under the provisions requiring registration and the display of number plates.

Hereafter highway equipment is The pieces are too numerous to be mentioned and there are some exemptions. Machinery used on a job between barricades is exempt, but if moved from one job to another it is necessary to register the machine and obtain numbe plates. It is the opinion of county officials that this will apply to all county road machinery and city equipment as well as that belongng to contractors.

The same applies to farm tractors, trailers, combines and other machinery when used commercially. Farm machines will be exempt when used strictly on the farm or when moved from one PMA Committee farm to another belonging to the same owner. Farm trailers cannot be loaded with more than 4,000 pounds and remain exempt.


