Santa Claus Will Open Christmas Season Here Tomorrow Evening

Miami Operating Co. Buys E. S. Price Oil Properties

A deal was close the past week in which the Miami Operating Co., Inc., purchased the oil properties and holdings of the E. S. Price Oil Co. in Runnels county. The sale price was not disclosed but the amount was large and the new firm takes over some of the best properties in the county.

Carl Miles, of Grayville, Illinois, is president of the company. Company headquarters are at Grayville. Ray Hall is here and will be manager of the Runnels county operations and will maintain his office on a lease five miles north of Ballinger on the Crews highway.

The new management took over on November 16. In an interview Monday, Mr. Hall stated they had come here to be a part of the town and county and anticipated

a big development program on their holdings starting soon after January 1. He added that if prospects turn out as expected Ballinger will likely be made headquarters for Central Texas operations.

The firm recently bought twenty-odd producing wells and holdings in Oklahoma, has started a 6,000-foot test Wichita Falls and a 12,000-foot test in Reeves county. They are making changes and getting their new Runnels county holdings in condition for further development.

The Miami Operating Co. expects to bring a number of workers to Ballinger in the near future to make home.

Mr. Hall stated that their drilling operations would not be "tight" and that as soon as new wells were started, information would be available as progress was made.

District Governor Is Guest Speaker For Rotary Club

Dr. Pat Norwood, governor of district 184 of Rotary International, was here Tuesday for a meeting with the Ballinger club and was guest speaker at the noon luncheon.

Dr. Norwood is associate professor of education at Southwest Texas State Teachers' College, San Marcos, and is director of public service, the extension and correspondence school and the placement bureau. On a tour of 26 Rotary clubs, he is discussing plans with these organizations for the year.

He has been a Rotarian the past 12 years and has served as president and secretary of the San Marcos club.

On this tour he will visit clubs at Gonzales, Runge, Waelder, Carizo Springs, Pleasanton, Pettus, Charlotte, Fredericksburg, Ozona, Sanderson, Junction, San Angelo, Uvalde, Ballinger, Del Rio, Pearsall, Eagle Pass, Brady, Menard, San Saba, Kerrville, Brackettville, Medina, Jourdanton and Poteet.

In addition to meeting with the entire club, Dr. Norwood held a conference with the Ballinger officers and committee chairmen.

Response Excellent In Christmas Seal Campaign to Date

The first response to the sale of tuberculosis seals has been very good and those in charge of the big task of conducting the county-wide campaign are urging that all make returns on their letters as soon as possible.

Last week approximately 4,000 letters with seals enclosed were mailed to Runnels county. In each enclosure was a self-addressed envelope for the convenience of the recipient in returning a check. Each of the envelopes had the name of the recipient typed on the outside so that proper credit can be given when the remittance is received.

Bond sales have been completed in the towns of the county and with success. The bonds in denominations of \$5, \$10, \$25, \$50 and \$100 are offered to larger contributors and this was done by personal solicitation.

The big revenue of the annual campaign, however, is derived from the many smaller contributions in exchange for the sheets of Christmas seals. These sheets are worth \$1 each; some letters have two sheets enclosed, and others contain more.

The seal and bond sale is conducted with volunteer labor so that all money received goes into the Runnels County Tuberculosis Association's fund for educational work and in the actual tests for tuberculosis in the early stages. Work is done principally in the schools of the county in which patch tests are made available for every child, and in the bringing of an X-ray unit to the county for making chest pictures of all adults. In this way a large number of cases have been discovered and hospitalization arranged for their cure.

The seal sale will continue until Christmas, but association officials will appreciate early returns so that the work can be completed as soon as possible.

A total of \$1,432.25 was collected on the personal solicitation campaign through the sale of bonds. This is the highest sum in several years and the following tabulations were given: Ballinger \$721, Winters \$286, Rowena \$177, Miles \$178, Wingate \$50 and Norton \$10. The report also showed that two business houses purchased \$50 bonds, ten bought \$25, twenty-four \$10 and the others gave from \$1 to \$5 each.

There may be some people who have been solicited on the bond sale and then mailed a letter with seals enclosed. It was impossible to keep the lists perfect and those who have already contributed through the purchase of bonds are asked to return the seals.

2 Oil Wells Being Drilled Near City; Locations Staked

Regular tours were started this week on the J. B. Ashum and H. T. Hilliard, of Midland, No. 1-W. T. Routh. This well is near the city limits of Ballinger, just east of Elm Creek, and will be drilled to 4,000 feet with rotary equipment.

Jay Kirkman has located his No. 3-A. W. Malone and Tuesday was moving in a rotary rig. The new well will be due north of Malone No. 1, a producer and best well in this area. Peterson & Kirkman have the drilling contract.

The City of Ballinger will open bids soon for oil and gas leases on municipal land surrounding the Valley Creek lake and near the No. 1-Turner, a producer. A number of bids have already been filed and it is probable that a lease contract will be signed calling for drilling of tests.

Wheeler & Strake has staked a location for a well 1 1/2 miles south of the Fort Chadbourne field on the Eio Michaelis place. The contract depth is 5,400 feet.

Greenbrier Oil Co. of Fort Worth, has spotted two 6,000-foot tests in the Fort Chadbourne field. One will be the No. 4-S. L. McNay and the other the No. 5-S. L. McNay.

G. W. Strake No. 4-Eio Michaelis will be a 5,800-foot hole on a location 1,130 feet northeast of the No. 1 producer.

Murray Petroleum Co. No. 1-Claude Hightower, in the Davis field, will be drilled to 4,500 feet.

Robinson & Puckett, Inc., No. 2-W. F. Minzenmayer, has been staked in the Winters West Canyon field.

A 2,500-foot well is slated in the Saxon Serratt field, two miles northwest of Talpa, by the Saxon Exploration Co.

Xmas Decorations For Homes, Yards To Start at Once

Ballinger people who will enter their homes or yards in the contest for the best Christmas decorations can secure entry blanks at the Curry-Hambrick store. This part of the Christmas program is being sponsored by the Civic-Garden Club and decorations may be completed at any time from now until December 21, at which time out-of-town judges will be here to inspect the entries and make the awards.

It was announced this week that the Mexican and negro sections would be included. The chamber of commerce committee has voted to offer prizes in the Mexican section of \$10 first, and \$5 second, and has named Felix Cortez as chairman. The same cash prizes will be paid in the negro section and Rev. J. H. Merritt will serve as chairman.

Three prizes will be offered to white people with \$15, \$10 and \$5 as the first, second and third place awards. A number of people have already indicated that they will put special decorations in yards, on porches and in front of picture windows and will sign entry blanks for the contest. Later a list of these will be published so everyone may drive by to see the decorations.

The Christmas season in Ballinger will officially be opened tomorrow (Friday) night when Santa Claus comes to town, colored lights will be switched on along downtown streets, show windows will be opened and from that date until Christmas day gift shopping will be featured by local stores.

A special committee of the Ballinger chamber of commerce has been working on the Christmas program which will include a number of events. The main feature will be the Friday night program opening the season.

Show windows will be opened for inspection at 7 p. m. and at the same time the Ballinger Bearcat Band will lead a parade along Hutchings Avenue with Santa Claus the main personage in the procession.

Santa Claus will be taken to the court house and there will extend greetings to each child of this section and the committee will assist him in giving each one a gift. The children will file through the lower hall of the court house, entering from Hutchings Avenue and going out the Seventh Street entrance after seeing Santa Claus.

Every boy and girl in this section has a special invitation to be in Ballinger tomorrow evening.

Merchants began preparing their Christmas windows and interior decorations early this week and the entire town will be ready for the public tomorrow night.

Other Christmas features being planned include the yard and home decoration contest to be started at once and to be judged on Thursday, December 21. Cash prizes of \$15, \$10 and \$5 will be paid for the best three decorations. This feature is sponsored by the Civic-Garden Club and entry blanks have been printed for those entering to sign. This entry blank is required in order that all places may be inspected.

A city-wide Christmas musical program is being planned and announcement will be made at a later date.

In addition to the community-wide programs, Ballinger churches will also have a number of Christmas programs during the two weeks before Christmas day.

Norton, Comyn to Play 6-Man Bi-District Today

The main entertainment feature in Ballinger this afternoon is the bi-district six-man football game between the Norton Eagles and the Comyn Wolverines. The game will be played at Bearcat Field, beginning at 2:30 p. m. The sponsor is the Ballinger Lions Club.

The Norton and Novice teams played here two weeks ago on the coldest night of the season. After the win by Novice the local district was thrown into a three-way tie. A meeting was held by school officials and Norton, Novice and Mozelle were declared co-champions of the district and Norton was selected to represent the district until the regional champion is established.

The Comyn sextette won its game last Saturday, making it champion in the Comanche area and will furnish the opposition against the Nortonites this afternoon.

Admission prices will be 30 cents for students and 75 cents for adults. Members of the Ballinger Lions Club have been selling tickets in advance and the booth at the field will be open about 1:00 p. m. for those who have not already purchased tickets.

Fans of this section are urged to witness this game. Two of the fastest six-man teams of this section will be seen in action and there will be plenty of thrills as they run and pass in the contest to decide which will enter the regional playoff.

Heidenheimer's will be host to both teams with a Thanksgiving dinner at the Central Hotel after the game this afternoon. Mr. Heidenheimer stated that he would like to serve the visiting clubs and the invitation was accepted.

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\$547 Contributed To Girl Scout Fund; Drive is Continued

Otis Jacob, chairman for the annual Girl Scout finance drive, reported this week that a total of \$547 had been turned in and the drive was not completed. He stated that the hunting season and other interferences caused a number of solicitors to be late in working their assigned territories and that it would require another week to end the solicitation.

The sections which have been covered responded well and those in charge are pleased with the amount collected. Mr. Jacob said that all teams missed a number of people when they called and a second trip will be necessary.

In the meantime, anyone who would like to have a part in this work and has not been seen, may mail a check to Mr. Jacob and it will be deposited in the Girl Scout fund.

It was hoped that \$1,000 could be raised to meet local and area requirements for the next twelve months. There will be considerable expansion here since new troops have been formed and new leaders secured.

Building Sites OKed For 48 Housing Units

John Rayburn, secretary of the Ballinger federal housing project, stated Monday that locations have been approved for the construction of 48 units in Ballinger and work is due to get underway soon after January 1, 1951.

Forty units will be for occupancy by white and will be located in West End addition near the country club road. The land was contracted from H. G. Burkhardt and has received final approval of the administration.

The units will be of brick veneer, in duplex units, and will contain one, two, three and four bedrooms. In the white section there will be ten four-bedroom units. The units will all be strictly modern in every respect and will be rented to people in low income brackets.

Half a block was approved in the southern part of the city between Broadway and Sixth Street where eight units will be constructed for negroes. This group of houses will contain one four-bedroom unit and the others will be smaller.

Mr. Rayburn stated that everything was moving fast but certain matters took time and it was probable that no construction would be started until 1951. Additional surveys are to be made before the final work order is issued.

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New Over-Parking Plan Is Put in Effect by City

The city of Ballinger will put a new parking plan in effect on December 1 which is expected to meet with favor from those who shop in Ballinger.

Instead of issuing a ticket to appear at the city hall and pay a fine for overparking, the patrolman finding a car on a red meter will insert a 5-cent piece and leave an envelope on the windshield of the car. Printed on this envelope will be notice that the car was overparked and a request that if the service is appreciated, a nickel be placed in the envelope and returned to the city hall or attach a 3-cent stamp and mail it. The repayment of the nickel will do away with the overparking charge, but if the nickel is not returned, the charge will stand.

The plan will make it possible for people overparking never to be fined. All that is necessary to get rid of the charge is to return the nickel which the patrolman inserted in the meter.

Recently Ewell Jones, LeRoy McAulay, Chief Lee Moreland and

Fred Underwood went to Stamford to study a similar plan and found that it had worked very successfully there. The people liked it and officers stated they had never lost any money since inaugurating this plan.

Those stopping in front of parking meters will continue to deposit their money. A patrolman will be kept on the beat and each car found overparked will receive a ticket and envelope. If motorist desires to avoid the \$1 fine, all that is necessary is to return the nickel.

Ballinger is one of the only towns in this section which offers two hours of parking for five cents. Most towns have a one-hour limit. City officials state that they will retain the two-hour limit under the new plan and do everything possible to make shoppers here safe from fines.

At the bottom of the envelope is printed: "Ballinger appreciates your patronage and friendship and we invite you to visit us again."

Committees will start at once preparing for the banquet and announcement of the date will be made soon.

After consideration of the community chest plan Manager Jack Pridden was instructed to secure information from towns the size of Ballinger following this plan and make a report to the directors.

The Ballinger Bearcats closed the 1950 football season Friday night by defeating the Winters Blizzards 19 to 13 in a game that definitely was not over until the final whistle. Two evenly matched eleven fought hard all the way and kept the capacity crowd on its feet much of the 60 minutes.

Winters took the kickoff on its own 40, after two kicks had gone out of bounds, and from there marched downfield for a touchdown. Hensley was the big power in this drive which saw one 55-yard scamper around left end. He also circled right end for the last ten yards and the touchdown. The attempt for the extra point failed and the Bearcats led 7 to 6.

The Bearcats did not wait long to stretch their lead. On the first play after the kickoff, Merrifield turned in his best run of the night when he took the pigskin on midfield and cut back through right tackle for 50 yards and a score. The kick from placement was wide and the Bearcats led 13 to 6.

Late in the second quarter, Hensley intercepted a Ballinger

pass on the 34-yard line. Two first downs on the ground and another on pass interference placed the ball deep in Ballinger territory. Hensley chunked one for 22 yards to Kurtz in the end zone for the score and came back to pass to Bird for the extra point to knot the count at 13-13 at the end of the half.

The third quarter went by with no damage from either team and midway in the fourth Ballinger recovered a Blizzard fumble on the Winters 33 from where the Bearcats went to work. Payne got two through the line and Merrifield skipped for 11 and a first down. On the next play Merrifield cut back from right end, went into the secondary and crossed the line standing up for the score which meant the game. Herring's kick was blocked.

While the Bearcats were out in front the game was not over by any means. Winters took the kickoff on its 40 and chalked up three first downs in rapid succession to put the oval on the Ballinger 1-yard stripe. Hensley failed to gain and on a second attempt fumbled, and Merrifield recovered on the Ballinger four.

The Bearcats made another first down as time ran out and the game ended.

The Bearcats held a slight margin in first downs and yardage gained.
