A committee composed of F. M. Pearce, of the Ballinger Rotary Club; O. L. Huddleston of the Ballinger Jaycees; E. C. Grindstaff, of the Ballinger Lions Club; and Troy Simpson, of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce, met with the entire city commission Monday to obtain facts regarding the bond issue election Saturday, February 17. Members of the city commission attending the meeting were: Bill Moore, mayor; Malcolm Morgan and Raymond Berryhill, commissioners; and Fred Underwood, city secre-

Without any effort to color the issue, the following questions have been asked and the following answers are given:

Question-What is the amount of bonds asked in Saturday's election?

Answer-\$100,000. They will be retired in 18 years with interest of 21/2 per cent for the first ten years, 234 per cent for the next five, and 3 per cent for the

Question-For what purpose are the bonds to be used?

Answer-They will provide money to be used by the city in meeting requirements at Bruce Field and permit operators to secure a contract for a flight training school for cadets.

Question-Has a contract been approved for Ballinger?

Answer-No, but operators have been secured and before getting a contract they must have assurance that the flying field here will be improved to meet requirements of the air forces.

Question-If these bonds are approved by the voters, and contractors fail to get approval for a school at Ballinger, what would happen to the bonds?

Answer-The bonds would not be issued, or sold and the entire issue would be declared void. Question-Could these bonds be sold and the

money used for any other purpose? Answer-No, money from the sale of this issue could only be used for airport improvement.

Question-Will \$100,000 meet the requirements, or may a second issue be called?

Answer-Assurance has been given that the work can be done for \$100,000 and city officials have guaranteed that no second call will be made on the voters.

Question-What are the requirements?

Answer-The city will be required to provide three hard-surfaced runways 150 feet wide and 4,000 feet long, give the present ramp a seal-coat job, repair streets inside the field and erect a specific number of field lights.

Question-Will the entire \$100,000 be needed?

Answer-That has not been determined, but only bonds for the needed amount will be sold.

Question-If these bonds are approved, how will it effect our tax rates?

Answer-The city commission has given assurance that with the bonds approved, the tax rate for 1951 will not exceed \$2.00 on the \$100 valuation. This will be a decrease of 40 cents on the tax rate for 1950.

Question-How can the tax rate be reduced when an added expense such as retirements of the \$100,000 in new bonds, is added to the city's liabilities?

Answer-The city collected \$2.40 on the \$100 in

1950 in order to clear up some past due obligations and get all departments out of the red. This has been accomplished and the tax rate will be reduced this

Question-How will the field benefit the people of

Answer-It will provide an annual payroll of around \$1,500,000 plus the purchases of the field made locally. In addition, it will provide good employment for many local people who will be needed in the operation of the field and training program.

Question-How will the size of the proposed school compare with the one operated during World

Answer-It will be much larger. Approximately 200 more cadets will receive training, the air force personnel will be greatly increased and more civilian instructors and other workers will be employed. In addition, the school may be expanded, and it is because Ballinger has ample room for expansion, that we have a fair chance to secure a school.

Question-Will any of the money from the bonds be used to replace buildings?

Answer-No. The building program will be up to the contractor, and the city will have no obligation other than improvements in making runways meet
