

Oil Activities in County Continue at Steady Pace

Runnels county led all West Texas counties in new wildcats and in field starters last week. Five wildcats were approved for drilling and 17 field locations were made during the week.

Franklin Love & Co. Nos. 5- and 6- Joe Willeke have been started and are projected for 2,000 feet.

British-American Oil Production Co. No. 1-Joe Willeke has been approved for a 2,000-foot test in the Love field.

Humble No. 6-Mrs. M. J. Arnold pumped 74.91 barrels of 47.5 gravity crude upon completion of the past week-end. It is located in the Winters Jennings field.

Humble No. 7-Mrs. M. J. Arnold is to be drilled to 4,500 feet.

Drilling is below 1,500 feet in the Jay Kirkman No. 1A-E. S. Malone, Beddo field.

Stanolind No. 1A-Tad Richards, in the Fort Chadbourne field, will go to 5,600 feet.

Blackwell Oil & Gas Co., of Holliday, No. 1-Gerhart, is a projected 4,000-foot rotary wildcat.

Vincent & Welch, Inc., of Midland, have staked a location for a wildcat 2 3/4 miles southwest of Rowena, drilling to begin April 5. This will be a 4,800-foot hole on the Ben W. Glass place.

Saxon Exploration Co. has staked three 4,500-foot locations in the Sykes-Cree field. They will be known as No. 10, No. 11- and No. 12- O. C. Sykes. T. W. Murray and others have railroad commission approval

School Trustee Ballot To Carry Names of 7

A trustee election will be held in the Ballinger independent school district Saturday, April 7, at which time seven members will be named to the board. After the election, those elected will draw for one-, two- and three-year places.

One candidate is from the Bethel district, which was consolidated with the Ballinger district in an election held Saturday. Claude Thompson's name was filed for a place on the ticket this week.

At a meeting Tuesday night, seven names were certified for places on the ticket, seven to be elected. The names to appear on the printed ballot are: C. E. Maedgen, C. A. Bissett, J. G. Tuckey, Tom Agnew, Jack Hampton, M. H. Morgan and Claude Thompson.

M. A. Foy, president of the board for the past year and a member for several years, withdrew in order to devote his time to other affairs. In resigning from the board, Mr. Foy made the following statement:

"It has been a pleasure to work with the school board of this district for the past eight years. The support and cooperation from the patrons has made it possible for Ballinger to have one of the best school systems in the state. Without that support the board of education would be greatly handicapped."

Red Cross Fund \$5,852; Topping Quota \$1,433

A check-up Wednesday afternoon revealed that Runnels county people exceeded their 1951 Red Cross donations by \$1,433. With a quota set for the county of \$4,419, W. B. May, county chairman, stated Wednesday that \$5,852 had already been collected and that he expected the total to pass \$6,000 by the end of the campaign.

Joe Satterwhite, Ballinger city chairman, reported over the local quota Tuesday afternoon, turning over to the county chairman a total of \$2,624.42. When quotas were set Ballinger was asked for \$2,000, but Mr. Satterwhite accepted a goal of \$2,600 because the 1950 quota was not met last year.

Mr. May stated Wednesday afternoon that the work had been completed in all communities in the southern part of the county and a total of \$4,414 had been contributed. Winters and the northern portion of the county had contributed \$1,438 to Wednesday, and workers there will spend the remainder of the week contacting the people of Winters and other communities in that section.

The campaign will be officially closed the first of next week, Mr. May said, and remittance made to national headquarters. Officials of the local chapter will also make statements next week, expressing appreciation to the people of the county and especially the workers for the excellent job.

Ballinger Jet Pilot Tells Of 100 Missions in Korea

Lt. Robert M. Lowry, Jr., just home after 33 months in Japan and Korea, was guest speaker at the Ballinger Lions Club meeting Friday. The Ballinger man gave his audience a first-hand picture of the war in Korea and life in Japan.

Lt. Lowry was reared in Ballinger, graduated from the local high school, attended A. & M. College three years and graduated from West Point. It was while at West Point that he was assigned to the air forces and given pilot training. He became one of the early day jet pilots, flying an F-50, and used his type of plane to fly 100 reconnaissance missions from a base in Japan over Korea.

Lowry spoke of the pride in his squadron for making a new world's record on safety for single engine planes. The squadron flew 14,000 hours without an accident.

At the outbreak of hostilities in Korea, five planes were taken from Lt. Lowry's squadron and sent to southern Japan to fly missions. At that time the commanding officer told pilots he hoped to give each five missions. Instead of five, every member got 100 missions. The number of pilots was greatly enlarged and others have been sent as replacements for those who are coming home.

After his talk, Lt. Lowry was kept on the floor thirty minutes to answer questions. These dealt with the refugee question, the kind of planes encountered from the enemy, occupation in Japan, and Gen. MacArthur as a military leader.

"The Japanese are not resentful of occupation, the speaker said, and except for the language barrier it is not a bad place to be. He praised MacArthur as a military man and declared he had not made a single mistake. When queried about certain movements, the lieutenant pointed out that MacArthur was fighting the North Koreans when the UN troops advanced too far towards the Manchurian border, and the general could not know that the Chinese would come in. On a question about the 38th parallel, he stated that the line did not exist so far as he was concerned.

Tribute was paid to the ground forces and their fight against the bitter Korean weather. He told of Korean scenes where entire wards had lost both feet from sub-zero temperatures.

Review of Book, 'River's Parting' To be Given Here

Preparations have been made for the book review to be given here on April 4 by Mrs. L. E. Dudley, of Abilene. The review, sponsored by the Fannie Stephens Study Club, is to be presented in the high school auditorium at 4 p. m. Proceeds will be given the Lions Club on its swimming pool project, and to funds for Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Red Cross, March of Dimes.



Mrs. Dudley has resided at Abilene for a number of years and has figured prominently in civic affairs. She has long been identified with educational activities through her husband, Dr. Dudley, prominent educator and author of a number of text books. She has served the 6th district, Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, as educational chairman for three terms and as president one term. She is a candidate for the office of first vice-president of the organization at this time.

The book to be reviewed is "River's Parting," by Shirley Barker. It concerns England and New Hampshire in the 1620s. It is the story of John Sherlock, who comes to America as a young man, and the English girl who followed him to the New World to marry him. It is a most uncommon historical novel, which has won for Miss Barker the unstinted praise of serious critics of American writing.

Approval Given Housing Project Without Change

John B. Rayburn, manager, was notified this week that presidential approval had been given the Ballinger housing authority for a total of \$469,628.

Abstracts on the building sites are being drawn at this time for inspection and approval of government attorneys. This includes the land belonging to H. G. Burkhardt in the western part of the city and a tract owned by B. J. Harris in the southern part of the city.

Approval is for securing sites and construction of 48 units in Ballinger. Forty of these units would be built in West End and occupied by white families in the lower wage brackets while eight would be on South Sixth Street and occupied by negroes.

Mr. Rayburn has not been informed how long it will be before bids are sought in an advertisement for a contract on the buildings.

Plans for the 48 units were approved without change.

Ballinger Churches Exceed Attendance Records on Easter

More Than Inch Rain Falls All Over County

Rainfall in Ballinger Monday was measured at 1.06 inches and broke a dry spell which lasted since last September. The last rain of any appreciable amount fell on September 4 when the western part of the county received from 4 to 6 inches and the city water reservoir on Valley Creek was filled. Just north of Ballinger heavier rains fell Monday, Runnels getting more than one and a half inches and other spots received as much as three inches.

While the rain will start grass and weeds to turning green, farmers and ranchmen stated Tuesday that the moisture was inadequate for planting and that more moisture is needed. Stock water was increased in some places where water-sheds were good but many stock tanks did not catch any water. Valley Creek was up and all day Monday water was running over the concrete causeway into the city lake about one foot deep. Water department officials expected at least a two or three foot rise in the lake waterline before the creek stopped running.

Elm Creek was also running from rains which fell on that water shed late Monday afternoon.

All Eating Places Go Under Ceiling Prices on April 1

Approximately 2,400 eating and drinking places in the 53-county district of the Fort Worth office of price stabilization will be placed under ceiling price regulations on April 1. This was announced Tuesday by Ellis H. Boyd, district OPS director.

Restaurants, boarding houses, cafeterias and other public eating places are allowed to adjust their menu prices to reflect actual increases in food costs, but are prohibited from any increase in markups.

The regulations make it mandatory for all eating places to reduce prices when food costs decline, or if margin markups have been increased.

Operators are required to give the public the same dollar value of food per dollar of sales as they did prior to July 1, 1950. This will result in a rollback for places that increased their margins after that date.

Certain cafe prices are frozen at the levels prevailing during the period of January 16, 1951, to January 25, 1951.

classes and later will do other work in collaboration with the national defense program.

City officials for Ballinger are to be named in an election next Tuesday. A mayor, a street commissioner, a water commissioner and a judge of the corporation court will be elected. Other municipal officials are appointed by the commission. Voters are urged to keep the date in mind and go to the polls. While only one office is contested, the selection of men to run the city is important and those who serve are entitled to votes of a majority of the citizens.

Considerable construction underway here is nearing completion and when finished the big crews will move out. The city sewer extensions, which have been underway the past six months, will soon be finished and within a short time only the clean-up left. The First Baptist's educational building also will be finished soon. Remodeling of the Masonic building is about complete, the negro school will be ready for occupancy within a short time, and good progress is being made on the elementary school. A job of considerable size in remodeling the Cameron Lumber Co. yard will soon be concluded. This will leave only residential construction and a few smaller jobs underway.

Production was 46,982,174 pounds, an average of 28.06 bushels per acre. The crop sold for \$4,799,429. In addition 696 farms, of 2,358 acres, harvested excess oil. Peanuts sold as oil stock totalled 1,945,400 pounds and brought \$138,123.

The Rising Star Chamber of Commerce voted in a meeting

last week to improve Williams Memorial Park. Work will start at once on an arch and name plate over the gate leading into the park and will be followed by other improvements to make the playground more attractive and usable. The city council will assist in a financial way.

The Coleman County Hereford Association became an official organization last Tuesday when officers and directors were elected and by-laws approved. The organization has 38 charter members and a long range program has been outlined. One of the first features will be a calf sale to be held in the fall when 60 to 80 calves will be selected from herds of association members and sold. Jim Gill was elected president and other officers include C. T. McClatchey and J. T. Garrett, of Santa Anna.

Installation of parking meters at Brady began this week. City street department employees started marking parking spaces last week and meters and other equipment have been received. Officials said about 400 units would be installed at this time and that if others were needed they would be contracted for and placed in other parts of the business district.

A fifteen-year lease on a 4,500 square foot building at Goldthwaite has been taken by the Central Texas telephone

cooperative to serve as headquarters. Brown and eight other counties will have modern dial telephone service when the rural lines are completed. A survey is to be made by engineers soon and blueprints will be drawn for awarding a contract in the near future. An REA loan appraiser has completed inspections and co-op officers have received instructions to take applications for service.

An \$89,000 sewage disposal plant has been completed at Stephenville which will be put in operation on April 1. The plant is located just south of the city on the Bosque River and is fed by a 21-inch outfall line. Bonds for the project, started last July, were approved by a vote of the citizens in

1948. The plant is of sufficient size to serve a city of 15,000 population.

Wool shearing will get underway in Menard county about April 1 and warehouse operators expect the weather to have much to do with the clip. Buyers stated that from 90 to 95 per cent of the 1951 crop has been contracted at from 85 cents to \$1.40 and that the current price was about \$1.50. Most of the crop will be taken to local warehouses and the movement is expected to be in full swing by April 15. Buyers also reported most of the mohair contracted at from \$1 to \$1.65.

Members of the Melvin fire department met last week for a banquet served in the American Legion hall by members of

the auxiliary. Following the meal, Dr. J. L. Coleman spoke on first aid and at the conclusion of his talk, answered questions from the floor. Thirty-seven firemen attended the meeting.
