Presbyterian Church, U. S. A. Celebrates 70th Anniversary

The First Presbyterian Church, U. S. A., of Ballinger, observed its 70th anniversary Sunday with a home-coming which brought approximately 150 former members back to renew acquaintances and enjoy a day where they worshipped in the early days.

Registration started at the Sunday school hour and continued until after the morning service was underway.

For several weeks, groups had been working to make the day successful and the host of former members and friends of the church who assembled told how well each group had performed the duty.

While church records are incomplete, the beginning was probably in the early part of 1881 at Runnels.

Many beautiful flowers were in the church auditorium Sunday morning and among the pieces was one sent from Honolulu, by Mrs. Evelyn Teague Price, a former member.

Rev. A. O. Rue, pastor, delivered the morning sermon, entitled "A Cloud of Witnesses." He pointed out that God's Church is divided into two parts, the Church Militant and the Church Triumphant.

In a short dedicatory service, Rev. Rue pointed to recent improvements and called to the hymnals many of which are memorial books, a new garage, a new electric organ, redecoration of the educational plant, furnishing of the kitchen, a new heating unit, new vestments for the junior and senior choirs, the communion table and a cross which has just been given the church by the children of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Coulter and which was dedicated at the service.

Three other prominent families in the early day church were reunited for this service. These included the children of Mr. and Mrs. T. S. Lankford, Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Cockrell and Mrs. A. W. Sledge and children.

At the noon hour, the women of the church served a turkey dinner with all the trimmings in the dining room to members, former members and other guests.

1,200-Barrel Producer On J. T. Brandon Farm

News from Runnels county oil fields the past week was good, the largest producer reported so far being completed for 1,200 barrels.

B. C. Morrison, of Los Angeles, No. 1-J. T. Brandon, a Gardner sand strike 1 1/4 miles southeast of the nearest Cree-Sykes field producer, was completed for a daily flow of 1,200 barrels of 44 gravity oil. Pay was topped at 3,830 feet on ground elevation of 1,941 feet. The rating was based on a three-hour run of 150 barrels per hour through a 7/8-inch choke.

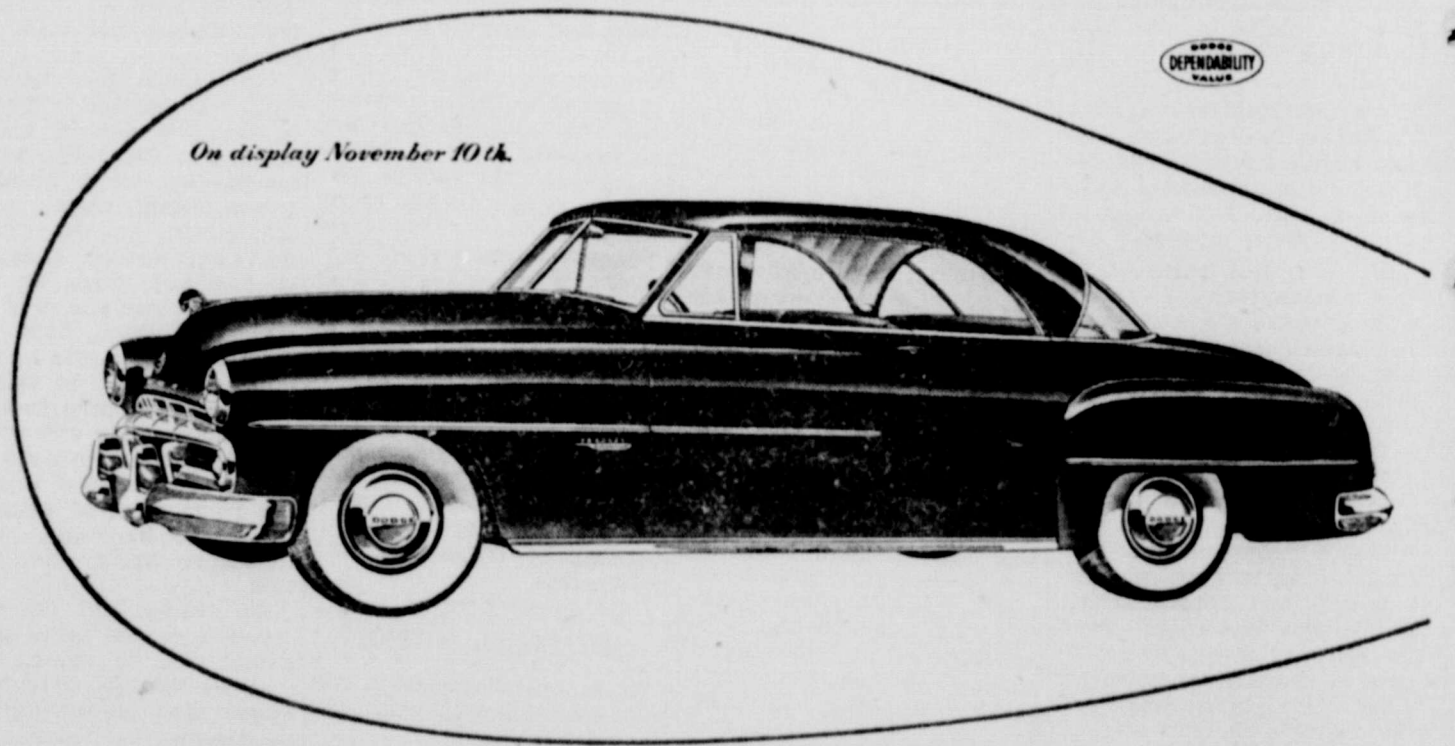

- 1 **Enforcement Begins January 1, 1952.** On this date, the new Safety Responsibility Law, as passed by the Legislature, goes into effect. - 3 **You Don't Have to Carry Liability Insurance, But...** If you are not insured against bodily injury and property damage liability, you must be able to deposit with the State a security equal to the estimated damage, not exceeding \$15,000.00, to cover a liability for an accident anywhere in Texas in which you or your motor vehicle were involved. If you are not insured for the future, your driver's license and your motor vehicle license will be suspended.
- 4 **It's Easy to Establish Financial Responsibility** with a surety bond. If you do not now have such a policy, call your local insurance agent or a surety bond counselor who will be happy to advise you concerning your needs.
- 5 **What is the Minimum of Your Liability?** The law prescribes the following minimum limits of liability: up to \$5,000.00 for injuries sustained by one or more persons resulting from one accident, and up to \$5,000.00 for property damage. You do not have to establish such liability but it is the easiest way.

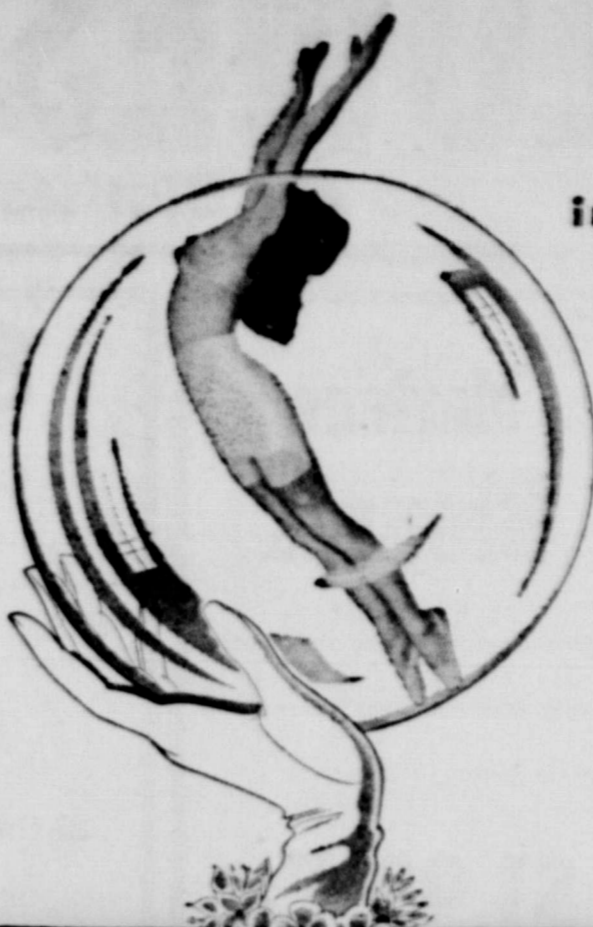

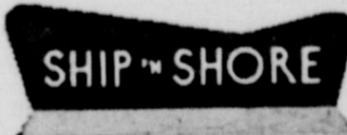

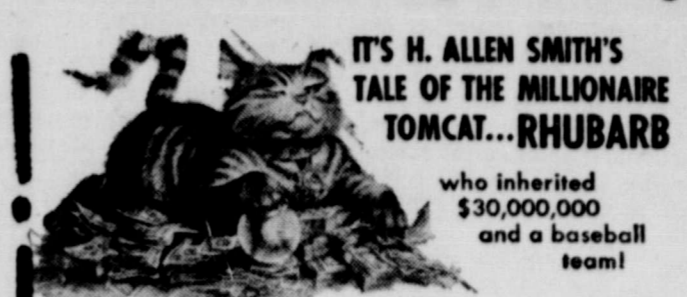

**WEST TEXAS
NOTES**

People of Texas are urged to cast ballots for or against the proposed constitutional amendments in the election next Tuesday. While a light turnout is predicted, the issues at stake should attract record voting. Most of the amendments involve money and have a direct effect on each person's taxes. Complete explanations have been given on the amendments and most people have their minds made up on how they will vote, but the big problem is getting citizens to take time to visit their voting boxes. All polling places in Runnels county will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m.

Ballinger firms will observe Monday, November 12, for Armistice and stores will be closed. It is one of the five annual holidays set up by the chamber of commerce. Very little is planned for the day here, the only set program being the annual American Legion breakfast. The usual Armistice football game between the Ballinger and Coleman teams will be played Friday night in order not to have two games in one week. Employees will enjoy a double holiday, taking Sunday and Monday off.

The northern Friday morning brought one of the earliest cold spells here in many years. Ice is expected about November 10 but the freezing temperature the past week-end may cause considerable damage while sap is still up in trees and shrubs. The temperature here was about 30 degrees Friday morning.

The city commission and a number of committeemen are making an attempt to get every dwelling in Ballinger numbered correctly. Citizens are asked to cooperate and to put numbers where they can be seen from the street. Those who have never displayed number plates are asked to secure them and put them up. With free mail service to all parts of the city, corrections are needed to accelerate distribution. Delivery service depends upon numbers to a large extent, and visitors here look for numbers to find friends. The plan will be worth much if all cooperate. Street markers have recently been installed and the correct numbering of all houses will complete the job.

Attendance included people from Paint Rock, Ballinger, San Angelo, Millersview, Eola, Lowake and Miles. The Paint Rock P-T-A makes this attraction an annual event and for a number of years has about financed its year's work with the proceeds.

Directors of the Stephenville Chamber of Commerce will explore the possibilities of the broiler industry in their section. Action was taken at a breakfast meeting last week when information on the project was presented. A committee was named and instructed to start a survey at once to secure all possible information and follow up work will try to locate operators for the venture. W. J. Wilson, secretary, stated that preliminary information showed unlimited possibilities.

The state department of health is operating a mobile X-ray unit at Menard from

Wednesday through today, making free chest pictures of all adults over 15 years of age. The Menard Social Service Council sponsored the clinic and did preliminary work to line up groups for each day. Those received by the clinic included all high school students 15 years of age or over. Grade school students prepared posters advertising the mass program.

Approximately 150 people attended an interesting and highly successful range training school and range plant identification contest held at the Lee Campbell ranch in Comanche county last week. The meeting was arranged by County Agent Wade K. Frey and a staff of extension service workers. At noon the group was served a chuck wagon dinner at the Campbell ranch. Special attention was given to range management and grazing for best benefits.

Coleman county taxpayers have taken care of half of their accounts already, the collector reporting \$184,000 paid in October. During the same period 395 poll tax receipts were issued. The early payments on county and state levies was because of the 3 per cent discount offered in October. Tax-payers have November, December and January in which to pay before the accounts become delinquent.

The movement of 1951 turkeys got underway at Brownwood last week. Officials of the Southwestern Poultry Association

stated the crop would be much shorter than in 1950. This estimate is based on the amount of finishing feeds purchased from Brownwood dealers. Advance prices are up slightly over 1950 and it was estimated that farmers with good birds would average from \$1 to \$2.50 profit. Thanksgiving shipments will be processed and sent out in refrigerator cars at once.

Mayor Walter Smith has announced that additional street lights have been installed in the residential sections of Rising Star. Sixty-eight new standards were set up by West Texas Utilities Co. linemen at intersections. The Crouch Lumber Co at Winters has completed a new

show room and it is open for the display of building materials. The new room extends across the entire front of the building. It has plate glass windows set at angles across the front to better reflect the sun's rays. Garland Couch, manager, has extended an invitation to the public to inspect the new show rooms.

Setting up the Brady Aviation Corporation at Curtis Field began last week when a number of employees were put on the payroll. W. C. Beck, manager, stated that others would be added as material arrived. The plant is a branch of the International Manufacturing Co., of Garland. Several key men from the home plant will arrive soon to assist in setting up the Brady plant and staff. The city council made available some 250,000 square feet of floor space for use of the company.

Mrs. J. J. Black, of Midland, president of the sixteenth district Parent-Teacher Association, was a visitor last week when the Miles P-T-A held its annual Halloween carnival. The visitor praised the fine work being done by the Miles organization and the many activities it sponsors for the benefit of the schools.

The Rowena Lions Club recently completed a street marking program for the entire town. At the club meeting last week a number of individual contributions were made to help

defray the costs. Chairs had been purchased for the club meeting place.

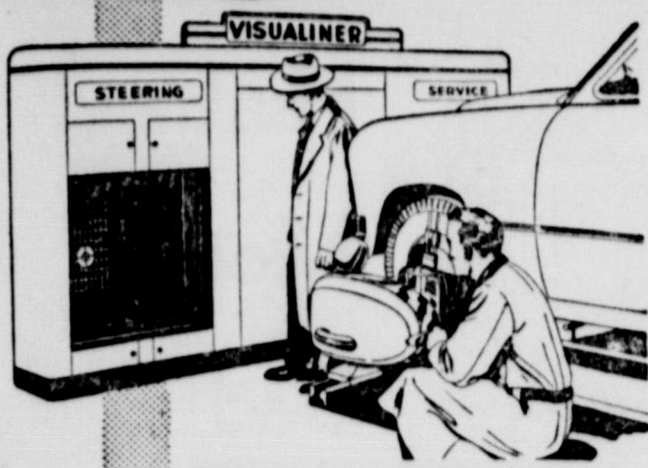

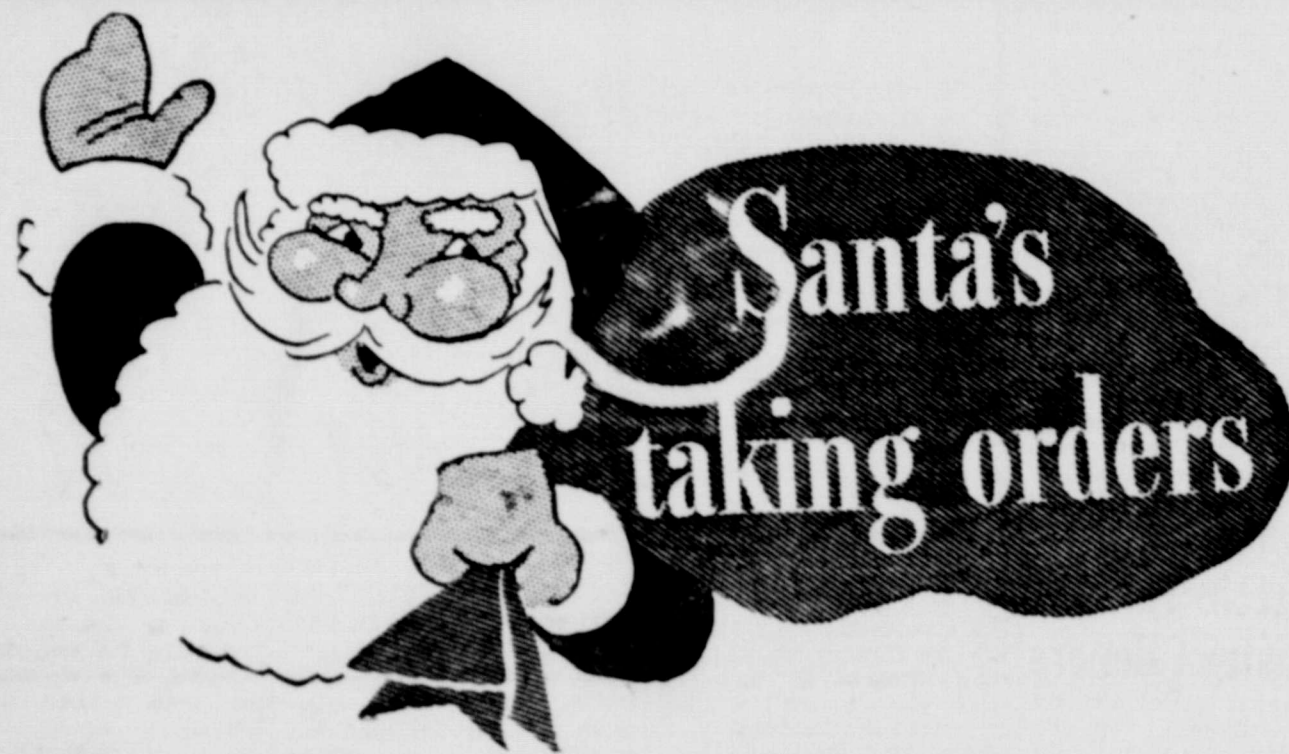
