

WINGS OF POWER . . Another milestone in B-36 intercontinental bomber history is reached as a U.S. air force crew readles for delivery to the strategic air command the last B-36 to be equipped with jet engines at the San Diego division of Consolidated Vultee aircraft. This ship, now designated as a B-36 model, pro-vides the air force with a fleet of completely jet-augmented B-36's capable of speeds in excess of 433 m.p.b. at altitudes eight miles high. The four General Electric J-47 engines mounted in pairs under the wings and the six 3500-horsepower Pratt and Whitney piston engines generate 42,900 horsepower for the big aircraft.


You knew a ticket was coming when the siren sounded behind you and the flashing red light blinked in your mirror-and you knew why.
