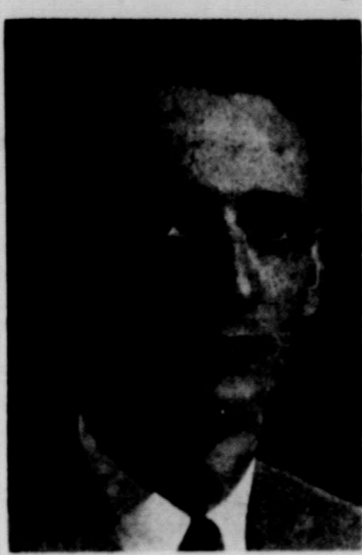


Ballinger Palo Pinto Field Gets New Test

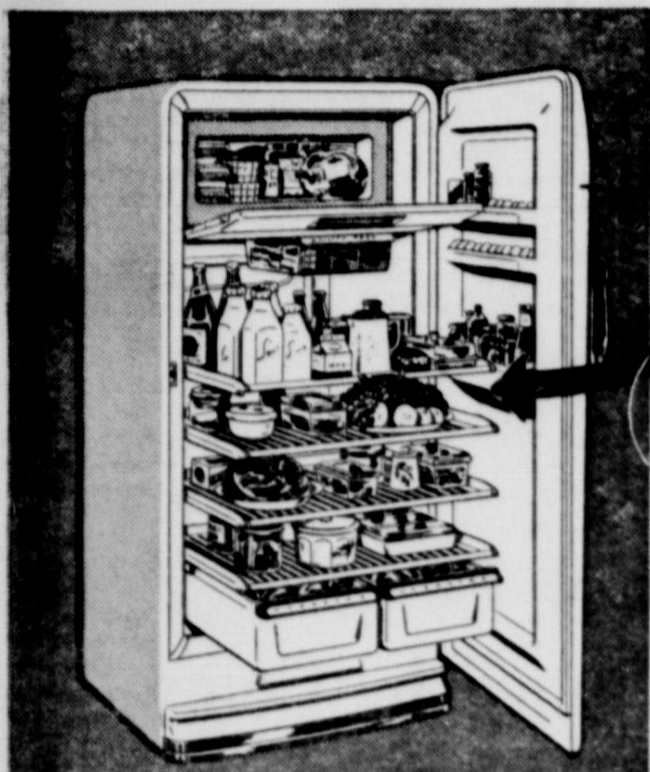

Shakespeare Club Members Make Pilgrimage

The Texas Federation of Women's Clubs is stressing that Texas shrines be visited and studied more than ever before, therefore the Texas Day program director, Mrs. Edgar Boelsche, made arrangements for members of the Ballinger Shakespeare Club to visit the Fort Concho Museum and Memorial Chapel last Thursday.

Less than 100 years ago Fort Concho was established on the banks of the Concho River to help in the defense of the frontier. The location is southeast of San Angelo.

In the group making the tour was Mrs. F. C. Miller, a charter member of the local club, which was organized in 1896. Mrs. Arch Holman, of San Angelo, also a member of the Ballinger club in its early days, joined the group on the tour and enjoyed the lecture given by the curator, Mrs. Cox. Among the exhibits at the

museum is a Gollad bi-centennial plate depicting scenes of historical interest at Gollad, as well as the flag of Gollad. A book, "Indian Fighting on the Texas Frontier," contains many photographs of early day San Angelo. From the Day Ranch in Coleman county came a small roll of barbed wire which was used to fence the ranch in 1875. Also from the ranch was a flint pestle, used by the Indians to grind corn.

The Memorial Chapel commemorates the dead of the two World Wars. Mrs. M. Compton, secretary of the Fort Concho museum board, who is also on the state board of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, talked on the chapel and described other Texas shrines.

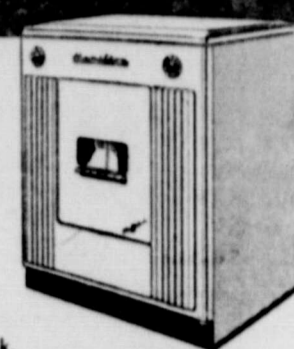

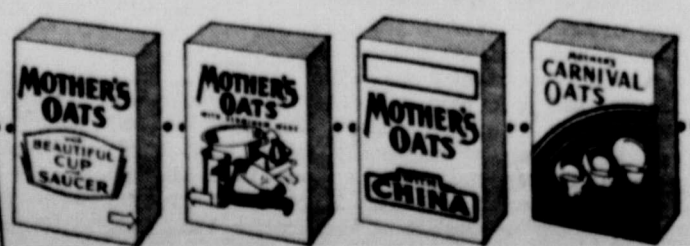

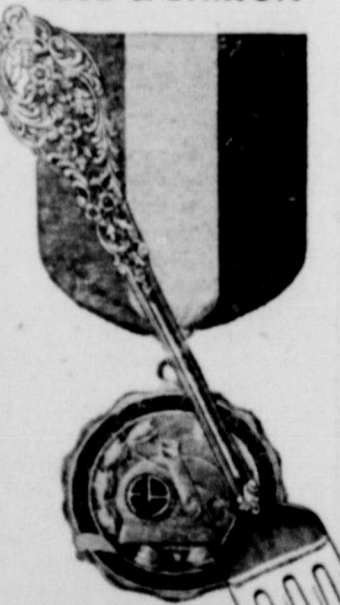

Crop Loans Made Available to All Farmers in Texas

All Texas counties are now under designation as disaster areas by proclamation of the U. S. department of agriculture. The action qualifies farmers who have suffered crop losses and who are unable to obtain credit elsewhere for loans from the farmers home administration to put in 1932 crops. Announcement of the designation was made at Dallas, FHA headquarters, by L. J. Cappelman, state director. Bad weather conditions in 1931 reduced crop yields materially and tightened up credit conditions, to the extent that many farmers were unable to finance crop plantings. Disaster loans are now available in every county. Farmers who have sustained production losses on crops and livestock

may apply for funds to pay for seed, fertilizer and materials for insect control where needed, gas and oil for tractors, feed for livestock, essential farm and home operating expenses, machinery repairs and other expenses incident to the production of a crop. Credit is advanced under authority of public law 38 and is available to farmers who have sustained losses, and who cannot obtain from local sources the funds needed to plant a crop this year. Before a loan is made a county committee of three farmers must certify that the applicant suffered a substantial production loss. Farmers may apply for loans at the office of County Supervisor John H. Curry, located in the county agricultural building at Coleman. Funds will be available to ranchmen whose herds have been depleted by the drought. They can borrow to restock their pastures. Farmers who qualify under

the disaster loan regulations may discuss their needs with the county supervisor.

Better farming practices are emphasized in the FHA loan program. These will be discussed and agreed upon by the county supervisor and the applicant when the loan application is prepared. A program of diversification is the safest course, its being pointed out that farmers who have carried out a balanced farming program with livestock do not need emergency aid this year even though they did sustain losses because of drought conditions last year, according to a survey of case files, the county supervisor emphasized.

Hoffman to Head Cadet Procuring For Goodfellow

Gariyn O. Hoffmann has been named to head the aviation cadet procurement and processing program at Goodfellow AFB. It was announced this week Lt. Hoffman, a basic pilot instructor, began his new job Monday.

A native of Talpa, the lieutenant is a graduate of Texas A. & M. College, where he earned a BS degree in range management, completing a four-year course in two and a half years. He is a 1948 graduate of Ballinger high school.

Lt. Hoffman, who began his military career in June, 1942, became an aviation cadet in December of the same year and received his commission as a second lieutenant October 1, 1943. He was sent to England and became a member of the 355th fighter group of the eighth air force in April, 1944.

On his 35th mission August 3, while piloting a P-51, he was shot down over southern Germany where he evaded capture by the enemy for 12 days, almost making his escape to the Swiss border before he was discovered by civilian police and made prisoner of the Germans from August 15, 1944, to April 29, 1945.

Upon his return to the States, he was sent home to Talpa for 60 days TDY. After completing this tour of duty, he was ordered to Miami Beach, Florida, and then to Randolph Field, San Antonio, where he was discharged from the service November 20.

Upon his return to civilian life he entered college and upon completion of his studies, became the county agricultural agent of Sterling county.

He was recalled to duty June 5, 1951, and was sent to Craig AFB, to attend pilot instructors school. After he completed the course, he was sent to Goodfellow.

Lt. Hoffman was awarded the distinguished flying cross, the air medal with clusters, the purple heart, and the European theatre ribbon with three

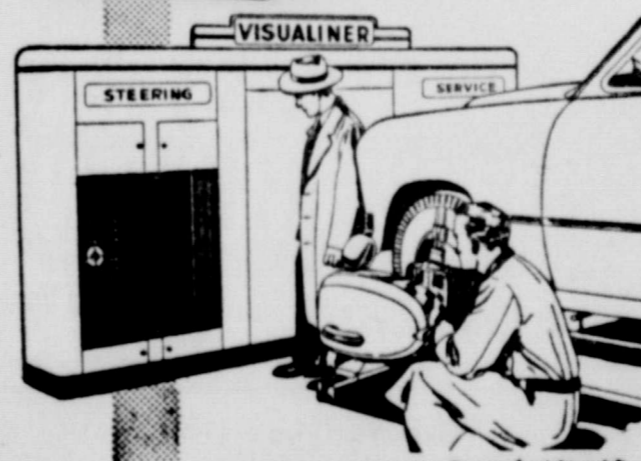
