The Lone Star plant will have capacity to process thirty the care and companionship of million cubic feet of casinghead gas per day and will produce natural gasoline and propane and butane gas. As an oil and gas conservation measure, facilities also will be provided to inject the residue casinghead gas into the reservoir for repressuring.

More than 22 miles of pipe of two to sixteen inches in diameter will be installed initially to gather gas from the first stage separators serving the 250 producing oil wells in the field. In the near future, an additional gathering system will be required to handle gas from the second stage separators serving these wells.
