

But it wasn't always fike that. For instance, at the left is a replica of a portable hand drill used 50 years ago. It was operated by turning a hollow augerlike bit by hand. The unique hand drill cost about \$10 and could drill a hole 150 feet deep. By contrast, the modern portable drilling rig, used by the Shell Oil company, may cost \$259,000 and can drill to depths of more than 9,000 feet.



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
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

The Anhalter railroad terminal in Berlin became a deserted mass of tracks when East German Communists closed the station simply by ruling that all long-distance trains which used to leave that point for Soviet zone cities are forbidden to either arrive or depart from the station. The only exceptions are interzonal trains from West Berlin to West Germany, and special trains to Allied zones.



It is located on the east side of the mile-wide, world-famous Chicago Union stock yards, three miles from Chicago's Loop, or central business district. Fifteen acres of space provide free parking facilities for 4,000 cars. The first nominating convention of 1952 to be held here will be the hotly-contested Republican convention which convenes next week.
