## Baseball Season Opener Watched by 1,800 Fans

Organized baseball returned to this section Wednesday evening with some 1,800 eager fans in the stands to witness the first game since the Lamesa franchise of the Longhorn League was brought here to represent Winters and Ballinger.

County Judge W. H. Rumpy welcomed the fans and urged attendance during the rest of the season. Manager Harold Webb told the fans he was glad to be in Ballinger and complimented them on the fine opening crowd. He introduced the players brought here from Lamesa. Mayor Lee Allen, of Winters, pitched the first ball and Bill Moore, former mayor of Ballinger, caught the pitch.

Fans enjoyed the first four innings as they saw the Eagles come from behind to put the game in a 3-3 tie. Then came the fifth with seven hits and six runs scored by the Carlsbad

Potashers and that salted the game away from the visitors. The visitors added two more in the sixth and one in the ninth to made the final score 12 to 4.

The Eagles left 13 men stranded on the bases, Pitcher Williams giving the home lads 12 bases on balls. Inability to hit with runners in scoring position proved bad for the home team.

The defense of both clubs was excellent, no errors being committed. A few bad bounces, because of the ground condition cause several singles to go for extra bases.

The two clubs meet again tonight at 8:15 and Manager Webb has announced that Tommy Herrera will be the starting pitcher for the Winters-Ballinger Eagles.

## Farm-Market Road Contract to be Let By State on June 17

The state highway department is asking for bids for the construction of 8.237 miles of highway west of Ballinger and from highway 67 to the Concho county line.

The designation is farm-to-market road 1678 and it will leave highway 67 about two miles west of Ballinger and run south past the old Kemp Dairy, the airport and near Martin's Inn in Concho county.

For several weeks, Commissioner Clyde Chapman has been getting deeds for the necessary right-of-way through this section. Within a short time fences will be set back or rebuilt through the new section and grading commenced.

Bids will be opened at Austin on June 17 and at that time it is expected that a contract and a work order will be issued.

Property owners along this route have been interested in securing a farm-to-market designation several years. The commissioners' court accepted the route as a project about a year ago and since then had been seeking a designation.



## 10 Runnels 4-H Boys Attending Junction District Encampment

A delegation of Runnels county 4-H club boys left Wednesday noon to attend the district encampment at Junction. The ten Runnels county boys were to attend sessions on June 3, 4 and 5 and will return home after the final program tomorrow (Friday).

## Silver Jubilee Mass Arranged Here on June 10

A silver jubilee mass will be held on June 10 at St. Mary's Catholic Church when Rev. Patrick J. Ward, O.M.I., will celebrate the twenty-fifth anniversary of his ordination to the holy priesthood.

A solemn high mass will be sung at 10:00 a. m. Rev. Ward to be the celebrant. The Very Rev. Frederick Brockman, O. M. I., will be deacon and Rev. Franck A. Kilday, O. M. I., sub-deacon. The sermon will be preached by Rev. Frederick J. DeRoche, O. M. I. of San Antonio.

Rev. Ward, a native of Knoxville, Tennessee, moved to Texas with his parents in 1910. They resided at Beaumont and Houston for some time. He made his philosophical and theological studies in San Antonio at St. Anthony's College and DeMazened Scholasticate.

Ordained in 1928, the jubilarian has spent the time of his priestly life working in the missions of Texas. From 1937 until 1940 he was stationed at historic St. Louis Cathedral, New Orleans.

At noon on June 10 a luncheon will be served to the visiting clergy at St. Mary's hall. At 8:00 p. m. a reception will be tendered Rev. Ward by the parishioners in the parish hall. Thursday night he will depart on his vacation.

## Conservation District Election Set June 12

Herman Giesecke, Jr., chairman of the Runnels county soil conservation district committee, announced at the regular meeting of supervisors Monday, that an election is to be held at 8:00 p. m. Friday, June 12, at the bank building in Rowena for sub-division 2.

Mr. Giesecke said that a farmer will be named to represent the people in the district west of the Paint Rock highway and south of the Colorado River to the southern and western county lines.

Kirby Robinson, vice-chairman of the board of supervisors, stated that the board had approved plans on the following ten farms: W. E. Hall, Paul C. Gerhardt, Wilson Holbrook, Loyd Coats, Vernon Dankworth, L. F. Smith, Hosea White, Walter Kruse, W. F. Bryan and W. H. Burselson. Robinson stated that the approved plans

were for 6,359 acres and brings the total number of farmers and ranchers holding conservation agreements to 297.

Clarence Spill, secretary of the board of supervisors, stated there had been quite a bit of interest shown in guar planting since the leaflet on guar came out in bank statements.

He added: "Guar is an extremely drought and wind resistant, strong rooted summer legume. It should be inoculated with nitrogen fixing bacteria."

Bill Minzenmayer, board member, said guar probably would be planted by the following: Fred Bremeyer, L. B. Watkins, Press Edwards, Carlton M. Smith, Clarence Spill, B. M. Smith, Clyde Flanagan, J. W. Little, Herman Giesecke, Jr., Kirby Robinson and Mr. Minzenmayer. He stated the list was growing fast and the district goal for this year is 10,000 acres.

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## Swim Pool Opening Here Attracts 5,000

Formal dedication of Ballinger's new \$60,000 swimming pool was held Friday at 10 a. m. and when J. W. Moore, former mayor, cut the ribbons about 75 boys and girls hit the water. This number was swelled to around 200 within a matter of a few minutes, diving boards and all other facilities of the pool being used.

E. C. Grindstaff, master of ceremonies, opened the program and presented Mayor Bill Leach, of Coleman, who also was the architect and engineer for the pool. Mr. Leach brought greetings from Coleman and complimented the citizens of Ballinger on one of the largest and most modern pools in West Texas.

R. E. Bruce and Towner Dickenson, contractors on the pool, were presented.

Lions who composed a swimming pool committee two years ago and who worked for the calling of a bond issue and other details in making the pool possible were introduced. This group was composed of Joe Satterwhite, Ed Curry, Jack Pridden, Dr. W. K. Wheatly, Doyle St. John, Jack Moore, Max McCrary, Jr., and Jack Nixon, Jr., present president. The former city commission, Mr. Moore, Raymond Berryhill and Charles Hambrick, and the new commission, which superintended the finishing of the pool, Charles Hambrick, mayor; H. J. Zappe and Doyle St. John, were presented.

The Ballinger national guard company was in charge of the flag raising ceremony and the Bearcat band played the national anthem.

Dr. Conway T. Wharton delivered the dedicatory address. The speaker declared that the pool spoke for the vision and careful planning on the part of those in charge of construction and the many others who had worked for the project. "While I am a Rotarian, I must praise the Lions for their fine part in this work," he said. The speaker said that the pool also suggested that we might draw any factions that might exist which would keep the people from working together. He urged that the pool and this also apply to the spiritual way of living.

Mr. Moore expressed appreciation at being selected to cut the ribbons. A large number of bathers were pressed against the black and red ribbons, as the scissors snipped the bearers the children let out a yell and hit the water.

Small tots were also enjoying the wading pool, located just to the east of the big pool. This spot is practically in the shade and has a number of concrete benches where mothers can rest and watch their little ones.

The junior bathing beauties stole the show when 75 of them paraded before the judges in the feature of the day. Ballinger firms sponsored girls from 6½ to 12 years of age and two groups competed.

In the older group, Donna Atkins, 10-year-old daughter of Sheriff and Mrs. Don Atkins, who represented Keel Drug, was awarded first honor. Kay Man-

sell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Mansell, who represented Mansell Bros., was second; and Jeri Jan Kennedy, representing the Talpa Lions Club, was third.

In the younger group, Loyette Dillon, 8-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Dillon, "Miss Studebaker," was first place winner. Judy Garrett, 6½-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jay Garrett, who represented Southwestern Life, was second; and Janabeth Conner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Conner, "Miss Esso," was third.

Out-of-town judges declared that it was impossible to pick the winners accurately and that every girl in the show was a good candidate for first place. One judge added that he had looked at so many beautiful girls in exquisite costumes that it was confusing and an impossible task.

Preceding the revue, a San Angelo diving team with a few local boys working as clowns gave a diving demonstration which drew the applause of the big crowd.

Morris Stokes and John King gave an underwater demonstration with the new resuscitator equipment.

Attendance during the day and evening was estimated at 4,000 and almost 1,000 swimmers passed through the pool during the 12 hours it was open. The pool will open each morning at 10:00 o'clock and close at 10:00 each evening.

The Ballinger Lions Club had charge of concessions during the day. No check-up has been made of receipts.

The concrete recreation slab was put into service for the first time Friday night when a square dance group gave an exhibition following the revue. Regular dancing continued until the lights in the park were turned off to close a very successful opening day.

Ballingerites Give \$1,508 for Storm Victims in State

The Red Cross storm disaster fund raised in Ballinger is being sent off this week after a total of \$1,508 was contributed. Of the total, \$10 was sent to Waco as directed by the contributor and \$50 was sent to the Salvation Army at San Angelo as directed.

The balance of \$1,448 is being sent to the San Angelo Red Cross chapter disaster committee with instructions that it be used in the rehabilitation at Lake View.

E. E. King, county Red Cross chairman, was in conversation with the field representative at San Angelo this week. He learned that the big welfare fund at San Angelo was being turned over to the Red Cross as money was needed in the storm area. It was stated that approximately \$74,000 had been allocated at that time for rebuilding and other necessary relief.

## Caudle is Completing Red Cross Blood Unit

Tom Caudle, Red Cross blood chairman for Runnels county, is completing an organization for the clinic to be held in the county on August 10 and 11. The bloodmobile unit will be in Ballinger on August 10 and at Winters on August 11.

Mr. Caudle is organizing along lines set out by the national organization and about July 12 will begin getting commitment cards signed. These will be returned to the committee by August 5, when all signers will be notified when and where to report.

To obtain the quota of 300 pints of whole blood, it will be necessary to have some 600 commitment cards signed in this county. All the blood collected here will be used for defense purposes and word comes this week from Korea that a big offensive would find the armed forces short of whole blood to save lives.

Volunteer service will be headed by Miss Ollie Chenoweth and she will have the support of all home demonstration clubs of the county. Locally the Fannie Stephens Study Club Mrs. Lloyd Downing, president, will assist in this phase.

Building and labor for the clinic will be the responsibility of W. B. Woody.

Sam Behringer will arrange for necessary announcements through the churches and will be assisted by the Ballinger Ministerial Alliance.

A group of speakers will be trained during June to be ready to appear on any kind of program during the campaign.

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## Cree-Sykes Gas Plant Now 70% Completed

Work on the Runnels Gas Products Corp's three million dollar plant in the Cree-Sykes field is about 70 per cent completed. The combination pressure maintenance, gas dehydration and gasoline extraction plant will be put in operation as soon as possible.

The Elm Creek field was extended west and slightly south with finaling of Pethybridge-Erlich No. 1-W. Conway for a flowing potential of 112 barrels of 40 gravity oil. Top of pay was encountered at 3,332 feet.

G. W. Strake No. 7-Charity Pace, in the Pace (Pry) sand field, has been completed for a daily flowing potential of 426.32 barrels of 34.1 gravity oil. Top of pay is 4,431 feet.

T. W. Murray, independent operator, appears to have uncovered two new Pennsylvania pay sections, the third

and fourth in the Lindemann multi-pay field.

Murray No. 3-H. F. Lindemann flowed oil from the McMillan (Swastika) sand, one of the field's two regular pays, then oil was recovered on drill-stem tests in the Palo Pinto lime and in the Morris sand. The field also produces from the Gardner.

Geochemical Surveys has filed an application to drill No. 2Q-John W. Harris, 2½ miles southwest of Creeva. Projection is for 4,600 feet.

Davis Bros. Oil Co. and Ab-Tex Drilling Co. have filed an application to deepen their No. 1-W. F. Minzenmayer. It is planned to drill to 4,500 feet to probe the Ellenburger.

American Trading & Production Corp. has asked for a permit to drill No. 2-Stanley E. Tinkle on the southern side of the Jim Burt (Caddo) field. Projection is for 4,600 feet.

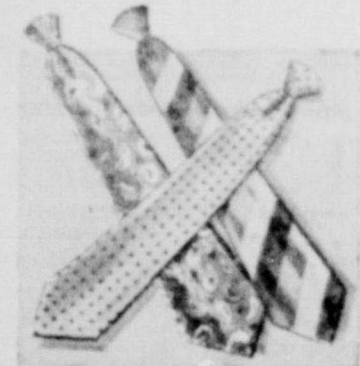

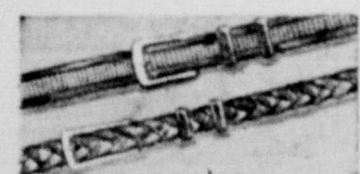

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## WEST TEXAS NOTES

Improvements in the Runnels county court house are progressing nicely. Painters began work last week and finish the interior soon. This work is being done on the second and third floors and the contractors will move as fast as possible to cause the least inconvenience in the busy offices. As soon as the painters finish electricians will install the new lighting system on the first two floors. The new lights will give modern illumination in all the principal offices and greatly improve working conditions. Both contracts were let several weeks ago and the painting was done first because it will affect the amount of light.

State highway patrolmen were on duty in Ballinger Friday and did a good job directing traffic. Capt. Ray Butler, of San Angelo, and seven additional patrolmen assisted local officers in handling traffic preceding and following feature events at the swimming pool. There is room for only about 300 cars in the parking space at city park and any big attraction can cause traffic congestion. Officers had worked out a system Friday and did the best job possible in the situation.

One serious complaint has come up over the new swimming pool and mothers of small children want something done to correct the condition. The pool starts at water three feet deep and many of the smaller children who want to learn to swim cannot stand up in the shallowest place. Many have expressed the hope that additional concrete can be run in the northwestern end of the pool to provide shallow water for the smaller children. The pool meets A.A.U. requirements but it is not probable that swimming meets or contests will be held here and to make the water accessible to all who want to use it, the depth must be cut to suit the little folk.

Farmers of this section have been in their fields for long hours every day since the recent rains. Many acres have been planted in cotton and combines have been operated full time to harvest oats. In addition a large acreage of maize and other crops needed plowing to keep weeds and grass from taking over. It has been a busy time but farmers are catching up and another rain would be welcome.

A basket dinner was served at the noon hour and several ministers delivered talks on various subjects. Also included on the program was an explanation of the flower fund and the sinking fund.

More than a million dollars will be spent in the construction of Colorado City's proposed jet landing strip. The cost was revealed after pre-bid estimates were made by engineers. 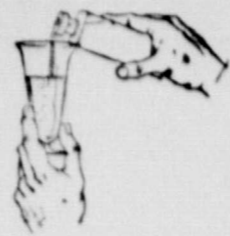

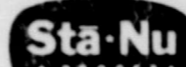

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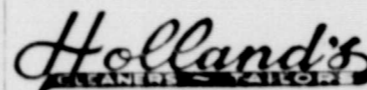
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steadily in the oat fields and fewer weeds and grass were reported. Harvest of wheat was not expected to get under full steam until later this week.

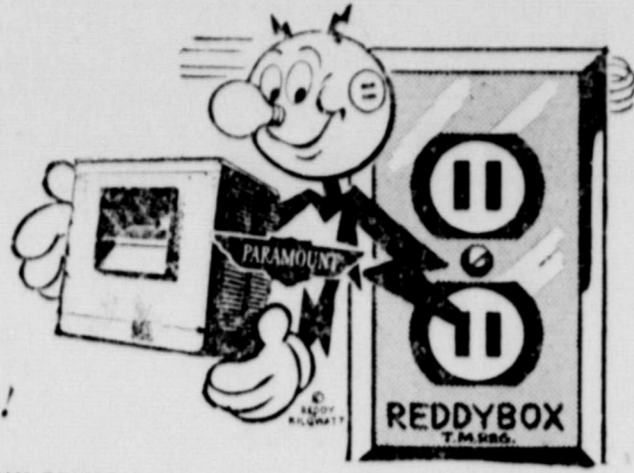

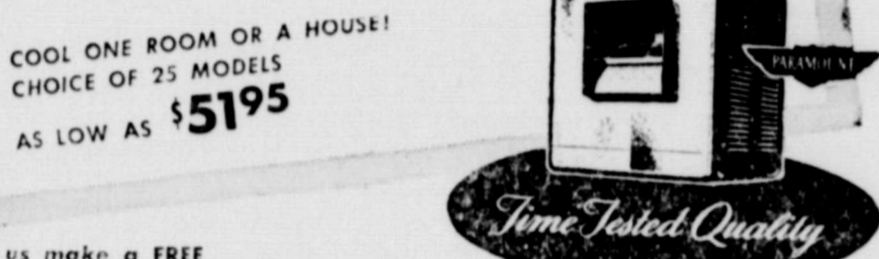
