

## Red Cross Workers Start Blood Sign-Up

Red Cross workers in every section of Runnels county started work Tuesday in an effort to secure donors in the first mass blood contribution ever made in this county. Tom Caudle, county chairman, said he hoped to be able to announce by this week-end a successful sign-up of cards which would assure reaching the 300-pint quota set for Ballinger.

Mr. Caudle went to Miles Monday night for a meeting with the Lions Club and Tuesday night visited the Lions Club at Rowena. At each meeting a speaker outlined the need of the blood and urged the signing of cards. Motion pictures were shown to members of the two clubs who are sponsoring the signing of donor cards in their communities.

Ballinger workers started the coverage of their assigned territories Tuesday morning. The committeemen are asking every individual 21 through 59 years of age to sign cards and appear at the clinic at hours to be assigned to give blood.

As soon as all cards are tabulated a committee will set an hour for each to appear at the

clinic on August 16, and signers will receive cards reminding them of the date and giving the exact time to be present. This will cause little loss of time and will make it possible to keep the technicians and other workers busy throughout the day.

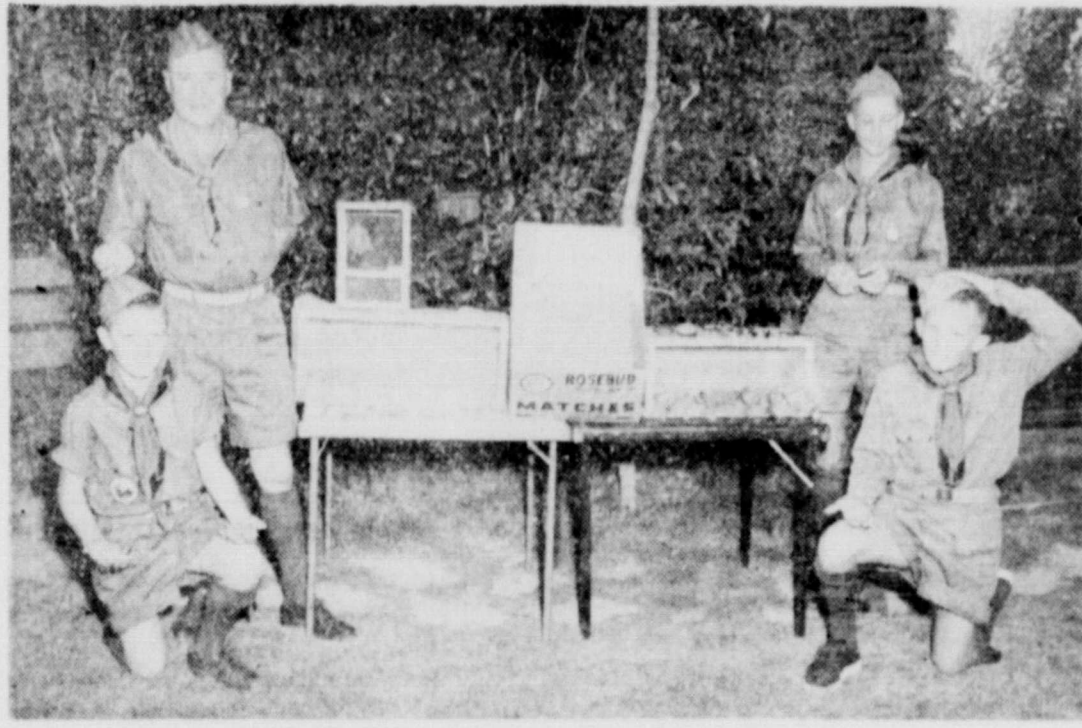
On August 11 the clinic will be moved to Winters for one day.

Citizens living in the central part of the county may indicate on their cards where they prefer to report to give blood.

Mr. Caudle said cooperation would be needed from managers of business houses. He asks that they allow clerks time to give blood and time to recuperate if needed.

Red Cross leaders and field representatives have impressed on local workers that it will require at least 600 signers of donor cards to get the needed 300 pints. They point out that some will not be eligible after physical examinations, that some will not show up the day the clinic stops here, and that even if more than 300 are accepted at the clinic the blood is urgently needed and will be taken.

## Hull-Dobbs Field Gets a Producer And a Location

The Hull-Dobbs oil field was extended one location north when the S. C. Herring Drilling Co. No. 3-W. D. Buford was completed for a daily flow of 108.38 barrels of 40 gravity oil. Top of pay was picked up at 3,950 feet.

S. C. Herring Drilling Co. has staked its No. 4-W. D. Buford, the permit calling for a 4,500-foot hole. It will be one location north of production on the northern side of the Hull-Dobbs field.

Moutray-Moore Drilling Co. No. 2-Mollie E. Curry has been staked and will be drilled to 4,500 feet. The try will be just across the border of Runnels county in Taylor county.

A pulling and swabbing unit was destroyed by fire when a well in the Cree-Sykes field caught fire Tuesday. No one was injured. The equipment was owned by the Murray Petroleum Co. of San Angelo. The operators were pulling rods on the Murray No. 3-Williams when the well made an unexpected head and a spark from an engine is believed to have set the fire. The blaze continued about two hours before it was extinguished.

Frank Love & Co. No. 1-C. E. Allen, in the Hull-Dobbs field, has been completed for a daily flowing potential of 241 barrels of 40 gravity oil. Top of pay is 3,866 feet.

Gulf Oil Corp. No. 6-H. C. Stickle, in the Pace (Fry sand) field, has been finished for a daily flow of 330.7 barrels of 42.3 gravity oil. Top of pay was encountered at 4,425 feet.

Frank Love & Co. No. 1-J. O. Bush will be started at once at an offset to the company's Allen producer.

## First 1953 Polio Case Diagnosed in Ballinger

The first polio case in Ballinger this year developed Friday and the child was taken to a San Angelo hospital for treatment. Her condition Wednesday morning was fair and no paralysis had developed.

The victim is Sheryl Spurlock, 3, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Doyle Spurlock, who are living in a trailer house at 1409 Broadway. The father was in Mississippi at work and another child in the family was ill but doctors stated Wednesday he did not have polio.

As soon as the case was diagnosed, application was made to state health department for gamma globulin and a shipment was received Wednesday and seven children received inoculations. There is none of the product available commercially and the state will only provide 60cc per case. The dose is 1cc to the pound body weight and the amount required for each single case does not go far where a large number have been exposed.

Only those in the immediate family up to 30 years of age are eligible and all pregnant women. In the local case the sick child who did not have polio was moved into another home and this made all children in this home eligible for gamma globulin.

The medicine is furnished free by the state and doctors make the usual charge for administering it. In the event of an epidemic, the amount of gamma globulin is determined by a survey by outside medical examiners.

About two weeks ago a Mexican child at Rowena was diagnosed as a polio victim

## Law Enforcers Committee Nominates Officers Here

The organization will be known as the West Central Texas Law Enforcement Association. The purpose is to improve law enforcement in the region through education, alliance and cooperation. Membership is open to officers in this part of the state who desire to belong.

The nominating committee selected officials to be nominated at a meeting to be held at Brownwood in October. The report of the committee will suggest Jack Moore, Runnels county attorney, as president; Frank Fenton, Coleman county sheriff, as vice-president; and Joe Perry, state highway patrolman, as secretary-treasurer.

Directors to be nominated are J. P. Williams, Brady, W. A. Guin, San Angelo; T. R. Gholson, San Angelo; Bill Allcorn, Brownwood; Bill Green, Sterling City; Ranser Nordyke, Brownwood; and Ed Powell, Abilene.

Counties represented in the organization at this time are Runnels, Coleman, Brown, Taylor, Coke, Menard, Tom Green, Sterling, Nolan, McCulloch and Concho. Others are expected to take membership between now and the date of the Brownwood meeting.

At the October meeting officers and directors will be elected and a constitution and by-laws voted.

## Rain and Hail Fall in County; Half Inch Here

Beneficial rains and damaging hail fell in a wide area of Runnels county Wednesday morning. A section east of Winters is reported completely haled out. Heavy hail also fell in the Lawn and Novice sections of Coleman county.

Ballinger was in the edge of the rain clouds and received a slightly over half an inch. To the north, east and south more rain fell, some places getting two inches and more. Sections around Runnels received from one to an inch and a half and good rains were reported in the Bethel section and to the southeast. West and northwest the moisture stopped a short distance from town.

Coleman, Valera and Santa Anna got heavy downpours, according to travellers from that direction. Motorists arriving from Abilene said hail was noticeable in the Tuscola and Ovalo areas.

From one to two inches of rain fell in the vicinity of Crews, several miles northeast of Ballinger. It was a hard downpour and water was put out in streams and surface tanks.

## METHODIST BUILDING PLANS SUBMITTED BY ARCHITECT

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## City Commission Rejects All Bids On Sale of Land

The Ballinger city commission held its regular weekly meeting Tuesday. Bids were opened on the sale of three acres of city land formerly used by Harman Park. All bids were rejected as the city officials thought the offers were entirely too low. No action was taken on re-advertising the lots for sale.

The commission authorized the installation of a street light at the corner of First Avenue and Ninth Street. An order has been given for this light and it will be in service within a few days.

The repairing of furnaces in city park was authorized and the section known as "the nook" will be cleaned up. The park has been overcrowded on several recent occasions and the nook will offer facilities for small gatherings where it will be more or less private.

The old canteen building at the park will also be cleaned, lights installed and it will be available for dressing rooms for family reunions and other over-night occasions.

## Giving of Blood Program Theme For Local Lions

The Ballinger Lions Club was given a preview of what happens to a pint of blood given by a person when the blood mobile unit comes to town. A movie was screened to show how the whole blood is packed and flown to hospitals in Korea and the ultimate beneficiary.

The picture also carried appeals from doctors, nurses and other who are working day and night to save the lives of American fighting men.

Jerome Oslund, Red Cross field representative of this area, was the guest speaker at the club meeting Friday following the showing of the picture. He urged every eligible person to sign a donor card and be on hand for an examination the day the unit visits Ballinger.

Mr. Oslund stated that it is easier to get money for the Red Cross than to get blood. He gave information also that it only requires one hour to give a pint of blood, including the examination, the actual giving of the blood, the visit to the canteen and a rest period. He added that it does not hurt and that from eight to twelve specially trained nurses will be with the unit who are skilled in puncturing the vein to take the blood. The speaker said that every human has 14 pints of blood and that the giving of one pint is not more than paying a round of golf. He explained how a doctor will give a limited physical examination and no person will be asked to give blood who is not able to do so. When it is over, the representative said that each person will receive a satisfaction in his own heart, knowing how it can save the life of a soldier or keep paralysis from some child polio victim.

E. E. King, county Red Cross chairman, expressed appreciation to the Lions for their active cooperation in the past and their interest in the blood campaign.

Tom Caudle, county chairman for the blood collection, urged business men to allow employees time to visit the clinic and give blood.

## Western Co. Will Open Oil Well Servicing Here

The Western Co., an oil well servicing concern with a number of houses in Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Kansas, will open a house in Ballinger at once and plans to work some 8 or 9 counties from here.

C. E. Woodruff, of the Midland house, was in Ballinger Wednesday and leased the warehouse at the corner of Thirteenth Street and Railroad Avenue for the company. A crew will install plumbing in the building, cut it into departments and get it ready for occupancy. In addition the company will open a downtown office within the very near future.

Mr. Woodruff stated that at present the firm is operating at Midland, Odessa, Seagraves, Snyder, Levelland, Borger, Hobbs, New Mexico, Guymon, Oklahoma and a house in Kansas.

It offers four services to oil operators—acidizing, fracturing, radioactive logging and perforations.

The company will place seven pieces of equipment and about 15 families here. The first of the crew arrived today and began looking for living quarters. Others will be here the first of next week. Two station managers, Joyce Chaney and Bill Dennis, have been assigned to the Ballinger house to have charge of local operations.

With two large crews coming to town on the same week-end a shortage of living quarters has developed. Any person with a rent house, apartment or bedroom is asked to call the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce office at once and list it.

## 7 Wrecks Investigated By Officers Past Week

Local officers spent considerable time the past week investigating seven car wrecks in which one was killed, six hospitalized and damage of \$7,450 resulted.

## Drouth Emergency Feed Program Starts

Runnels county farmers and ranchmen are striving applications for shipments of emergency feed under the provisions set up for assistance to drouth-stricken states. Interest here in the plan has been shown in the large number of applications received at the sign-up place in the PMA office.

The county committee is composed of Messrs. Melhart, John Curry, E. G. Erwin, H. J. Zappe and John A. Barkus. The committee will offer a number of services which were worked out at a meeting of representatives of the drouth-stricken states and of states that have surpluses of feed and pasture.

Each state in the designated drouth-stricken region will furnish information to farmers and ranchmen in the feed surplus states in a weekly sheet on the approximate number of cattle and sheep available for movement, price situation, location of livestock and other data.

Feed surplus states will furnish a weekly sheet of information on surplus hay, kind, quality and price, also a list of pastures that may be available, the local acreage, carrying capacity, price, length of grazing period and other information.

The A. & M. extension service will compile the Texas information sheets from reports by county agents on the number of cattle and sheep for sale and the number of each that would be moved to pastures if available. In addition, the extension service is furnishing an information sheet on surplus feed in Texas that can be purchased and the price.

Applications for feed are based on a thirty-day need and not in large amounts to carry over.

Surplus feed is only for sheep and cattle and there are no provisions for hogs or chickens. The surplus is only for farmers and ranchmen, but commercial feeders may obtain some feed to finish their cattle or sheep that are in the process of being fattened.

Circulars on drouth feeding have been prepared by the extension service and can be had at the county agent's office.

As fast as new directives are received on the program the information will be made available to ranchmen and farmers of this county. Those who have livestock for sale or who would move them to pastures are invited to list these with the county agent. He will send a sheet of this information to the state office each week and in turn the information from all counties will be tabulated and sent out in a state information sheet to states with surplus pasture and feed.

W. R. Gray, PMA office manager, stated Wednesday that the first shipment of emergency feed had arrived in the county and word had been received that more was en route. The first shipment of 40,000 pounds of sheep pellets is being distributed by Loyd Herring. This amount was taken by the first three applications on file.

To Wednesday morning approximately 450 tons of pellets, 175 tons of meal, 140 tons of corn and 150 tons of oats had been called for on 272 applications in this county.

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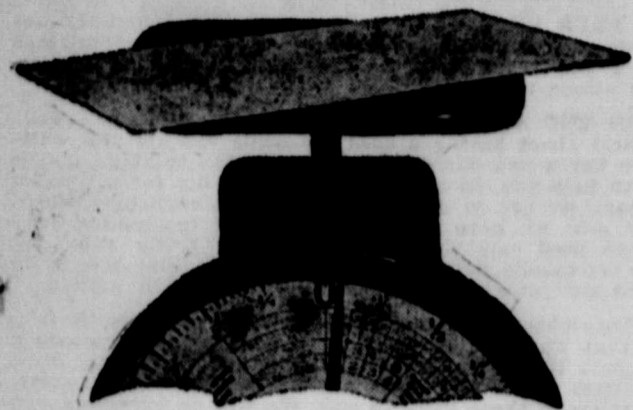
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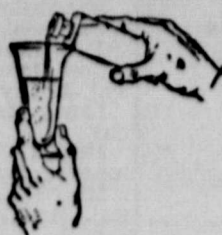
CHAMBER SHOW WINDOW OPEN TO ORGANIZATIONS

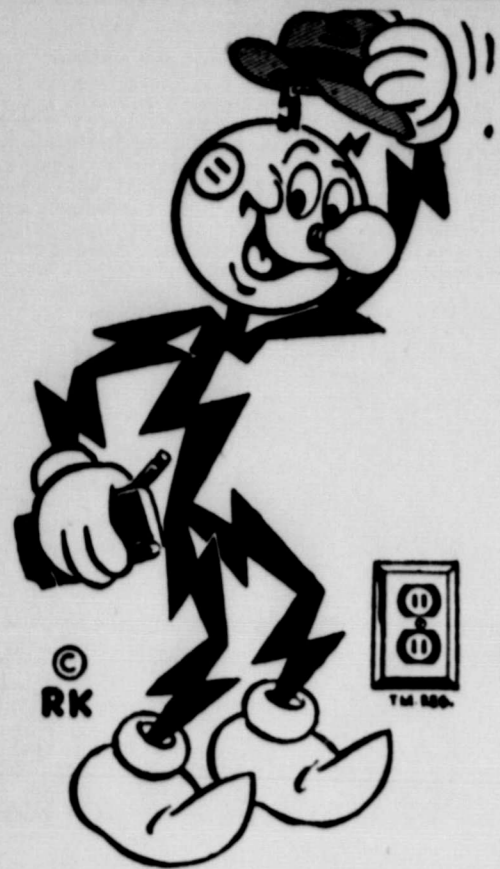

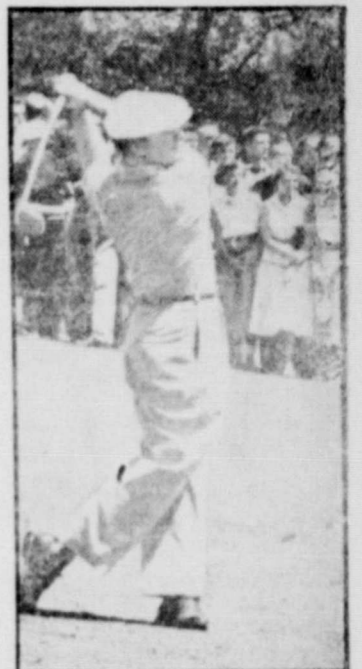

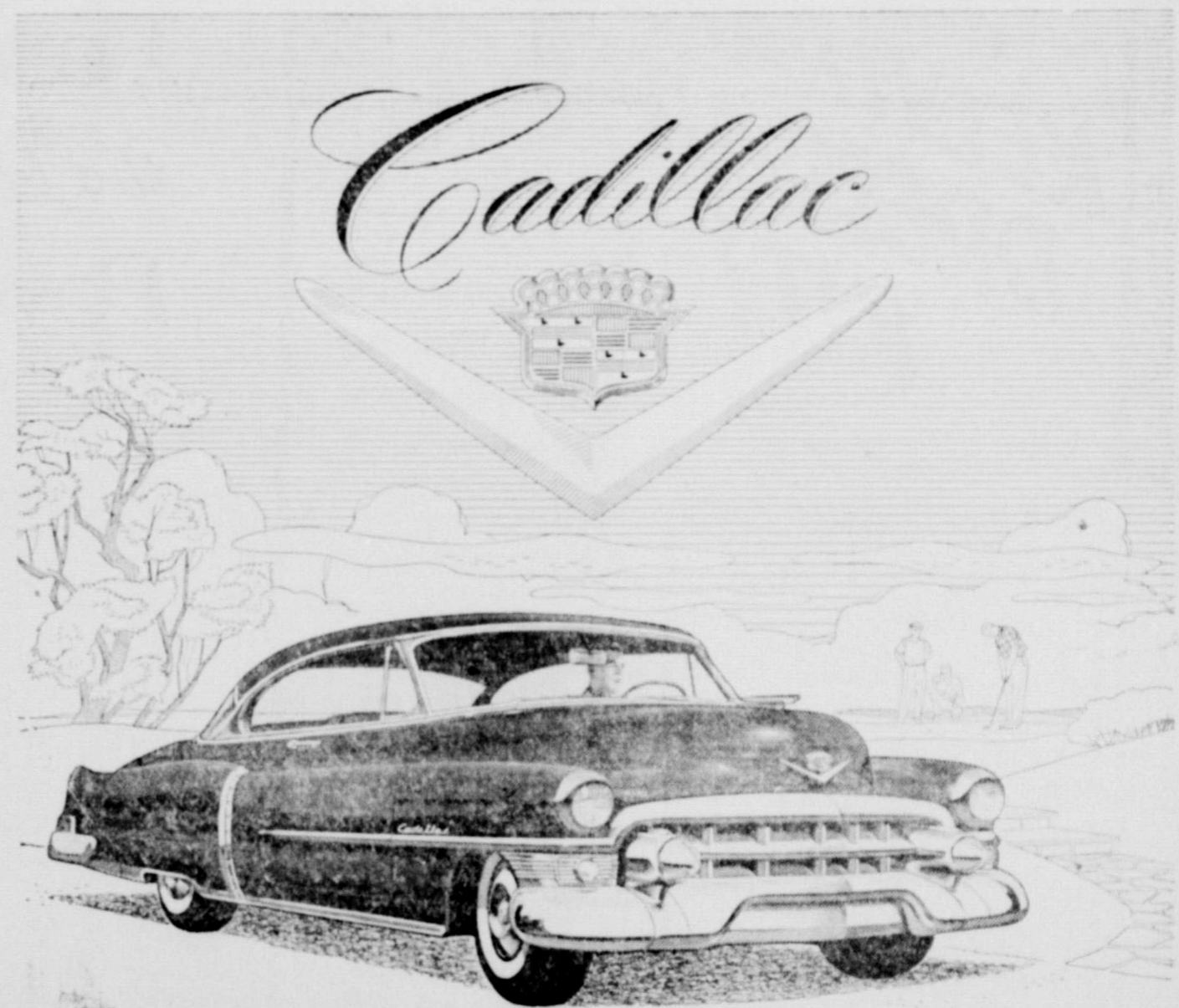

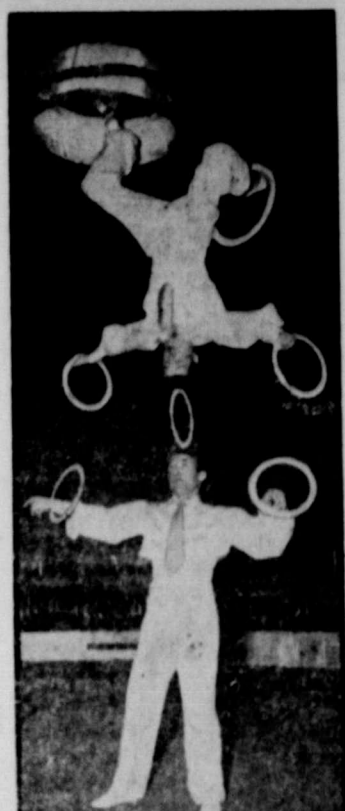
