The Winters Lions Club saw pictures of the latest classroom furniture and equipment for modern schools at a recent meeting. Dr. Z. I. Hale showed the pictures and contrasted the equipment with that in the Winters schools at present. Citizens of the district will vote soon on a \$575,000 bond issue for a new building and general modernizing of the entire system.

The Mitchell county commissioners' court has rehired Pritchard & Abbott, Fort Worth, oil evaluation firm, to list oil and gas properties in the county. This firm has been setting these values for tax purposes in the county several years and has been responsible for a large increase in assessments. Total valuations in Mitchell county increased about one million dollars the past year and oil development is being continued.

The Lone Star Gas Co. has started construction of a new 36-mile pipe line in the Hamlin area to give patrons a more certain supply. The new line

will be from Stamford to Abilene and a number of towns in Jones county will benefit. The cost of this second connection for a number of distribution plants is estimated at \$838,000. The 12-inch pipe for the line was shipped to Stamford last week.

Judge Carl Peek and Mrs. Ellen Sims, of Paint Rock, attended a March of Dimes meeting at Dallas last week. Plans are being made for the campaign in January when American people will be asked to contribute \$75,000,000. This quota is nearly double that raised this year, the additional funds asked to shift from defense to attack on polio. Later the states will be given quotas and each county chapter will be asked to raise a certain amount.

Red Cross officials at Brownwood are preparing for a visit of a bloodmobile unit on November 5 and 6. The quota is 300 pints of whole blood and donor cards are being proffered now in an effort to secure sufficient signers. One day will be spent at Bangs, the unit to be set up in the school's gymnasium. On November 6 the unit will be at Brownwood, scheduled from 9:00 a. m. to 6:00 p. m. It was revealed that 718 pints of blood were used in Brown county hospitals last year.

Peant marketing in Comanche continues to lead the nation and is setting a fast pace for other Texas centers. Maturity of the crop and the threat of rain caused growers to rush the harvest from October 15 through October 21. During that period Comanche buyers received 4,087,029 pounds. The grade in the three-county area of Comanche, Erath and Eastland is good. The price is standing around the government loan which allows \$222.30 per ton.

The membership of the Miles Baptist Church approved an expansion program at services on October 18. According to plans nine classrooms will be built and the auditorium enlarged. Labor has been secured and the cost was estimated at about \$4,000. Rev. Bennie Smith, pastor, stated that 100 new chairs would be purchased to provide for all classes. Work will be started as soon as lumber and cement is on the site.

The Rowena Lions Club is continuing its campaign to raise money to purchase a fire truck to serve the whole community. A television set will be given away on December 19, all profit from the set to go into

the special fund. Several other projects will be sponsored by the club and anyone who wishes to help make a contribution.

An Abilene firm has been retained to develop preliminary plans for a new Methodist church at Coleman. Studies of church needs were started by committees last March. The requirements are also being studied by agencies of the Methodist conference and the National Council of Churches. Approval by the quarterly conference and also by a membership meeting is necessary before construction can begin.

The Stephenville Centennial will be held on October 27 to 31 in connection with the Erath County Fair. Planning committees have been working for several weeks and all have agreed on the dates and are now arranging the special program for the five days. Clinton Cox, general chairman, stated that 25 committees will be formed at once to start preparing various features. The finance committee will start soon to raise the budget.

Work on an addition to the Merton Church of Christ began last week after being postponed three years because of the drought. The building committee

disclosed that most of the labor had been contributed and that actual cost of the improvements would be about \$8,000. The two-story building will have a number of classrooms, a baptistry and restrooms.

The Brady Rotary Club has launched a campaign for the renovation of the court house and the landscaping and beautifying of the grounds. The club is calling on citizens of Brady and McCulloch county to make available the necessary funds for the project. Money for the beautifying of the court house grounds has already been subscribed and the club hopes to secure enough to do considerable work on the building. Part of the work will be started at once and additional improvements will be added as the fund grows.

Committees for the Armistice Day parade and auction at Menard have been named and details of the program are being prepared. This feature is presented annually by the Menard Parent-Teacher Association with assistance of other civic groups. The theme for the parade this year will be "Texas Under Six Flags." Immediately following the parade merchandise and livestock will be offered to highest bidders.

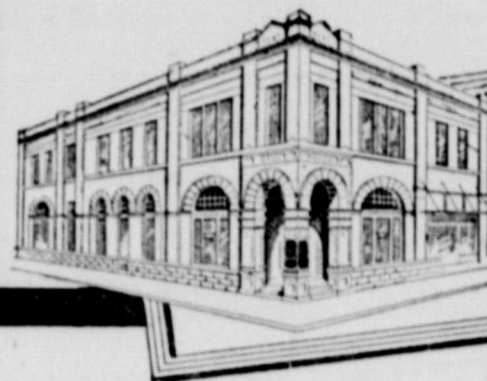

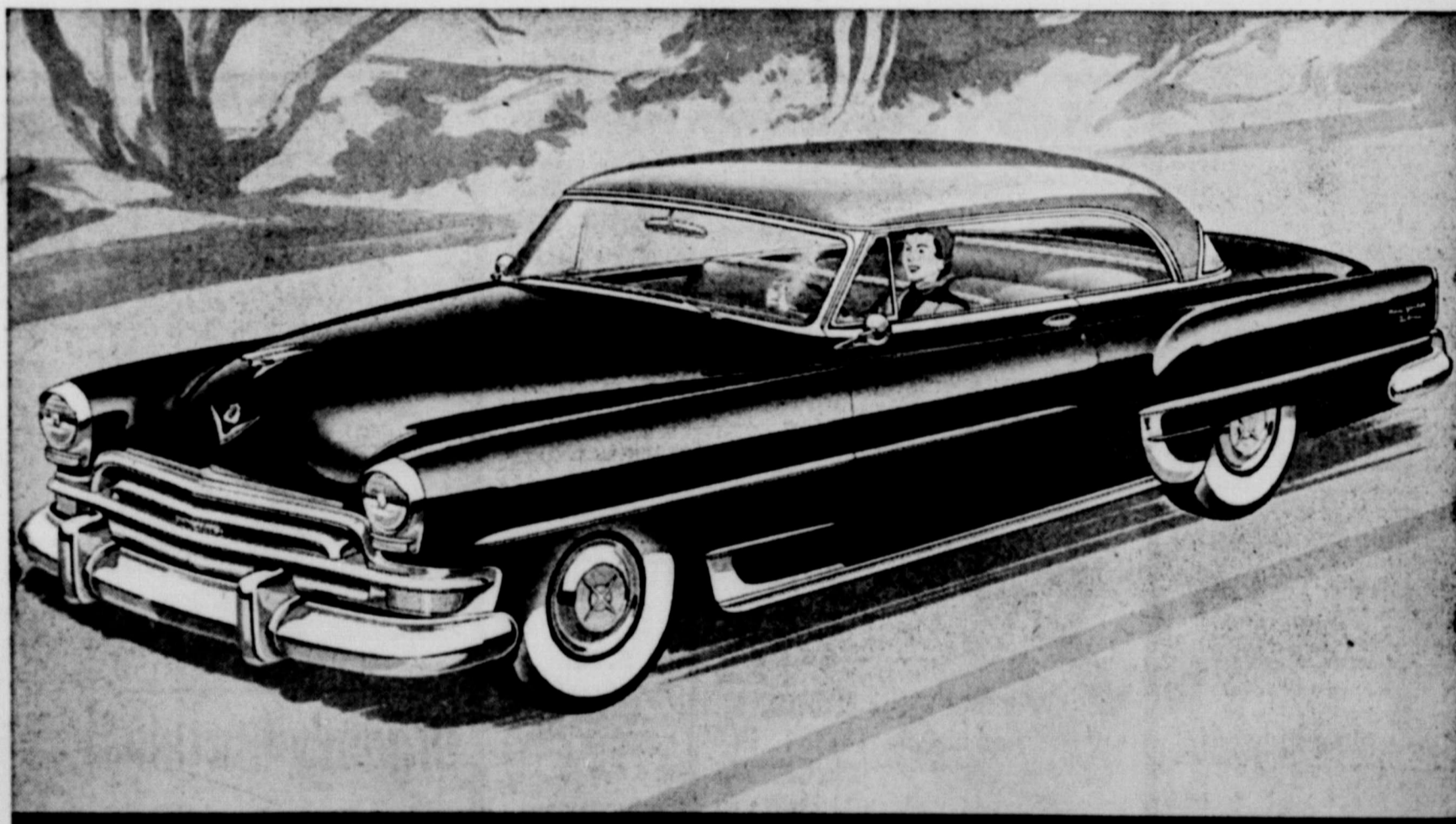
