

Barton Suggests Control of Grubs For Cattle Herds

October, November and December are the months to apply cattle grub control. Don't let cattle grubs rob you of beef, milk and leather profits. Control measures are simple, inexpensive and effective. Check for grubs in the back of cattle by running your hand along the back on each side of the back bone and if knots or lumps are felt, then your cattle are grubby. Now is the time to treat them.

There are two methods of treatment. Where one has only a few cattle, just apply a mixture of 5% rotenone, mixed with two parts of tripoli, earth or volcanic ash to back. A fruit jar with some 15 holes in lid will make a good shaker for dusting backs of cattle. A straight edge or stiff bristled brush should first be run along the back knocking off the scab that covers the opening of the grub. Then just rub the dust in with the fingers so that it will enter each opening.

The second method is by spraying. Use 7½ pounds of 5% rotenone in 100 gallons of water, then apply with a 250-pound pressure sprayer to the back of each animal, using about 1 to 1½ gallons per animal. Grubs are found along each side of the backbone from the hips forward to the point of the shoulders.

Usually from 2 to 3 treatments are needed, one applied in October, one in November and if necessary the third in December, making the treatments about 25 days apart.

Many local cattle raisers have demonstrated this practice in the county and have found it very successful. It is beneficial to an individual farm as the head fly that lays eggs in February, March and April travels very little after it is hatched. This means that an individual can clean up his place with little chance of infestation from an adjoining farm. However it would be better for several farms, neighborhoods or communities to treat for grubs.

Figures show that 840,000 head of Texas cattle out of 2,000,000 slaughtered each year are found grubby. Grubby cattle

get a discount and about \$4.00 per head is lost each year. This means a loss of about \$5,000,000 for Texas producers. Dairy-men also lose in milk production from grubs.

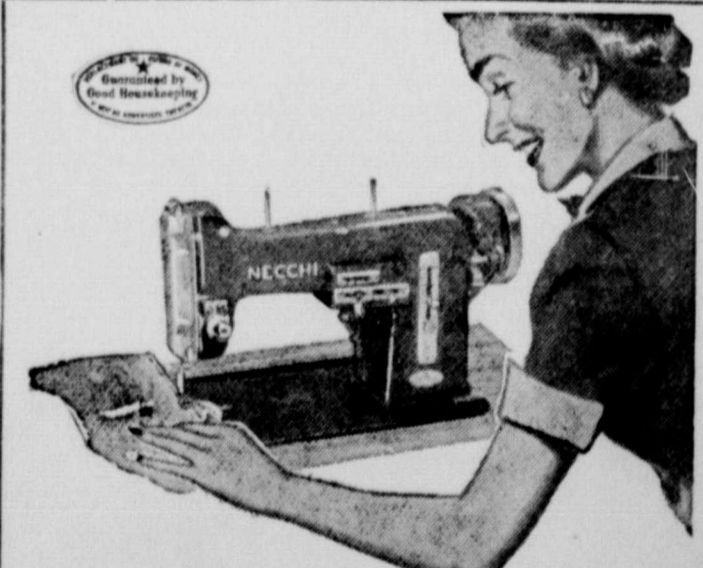

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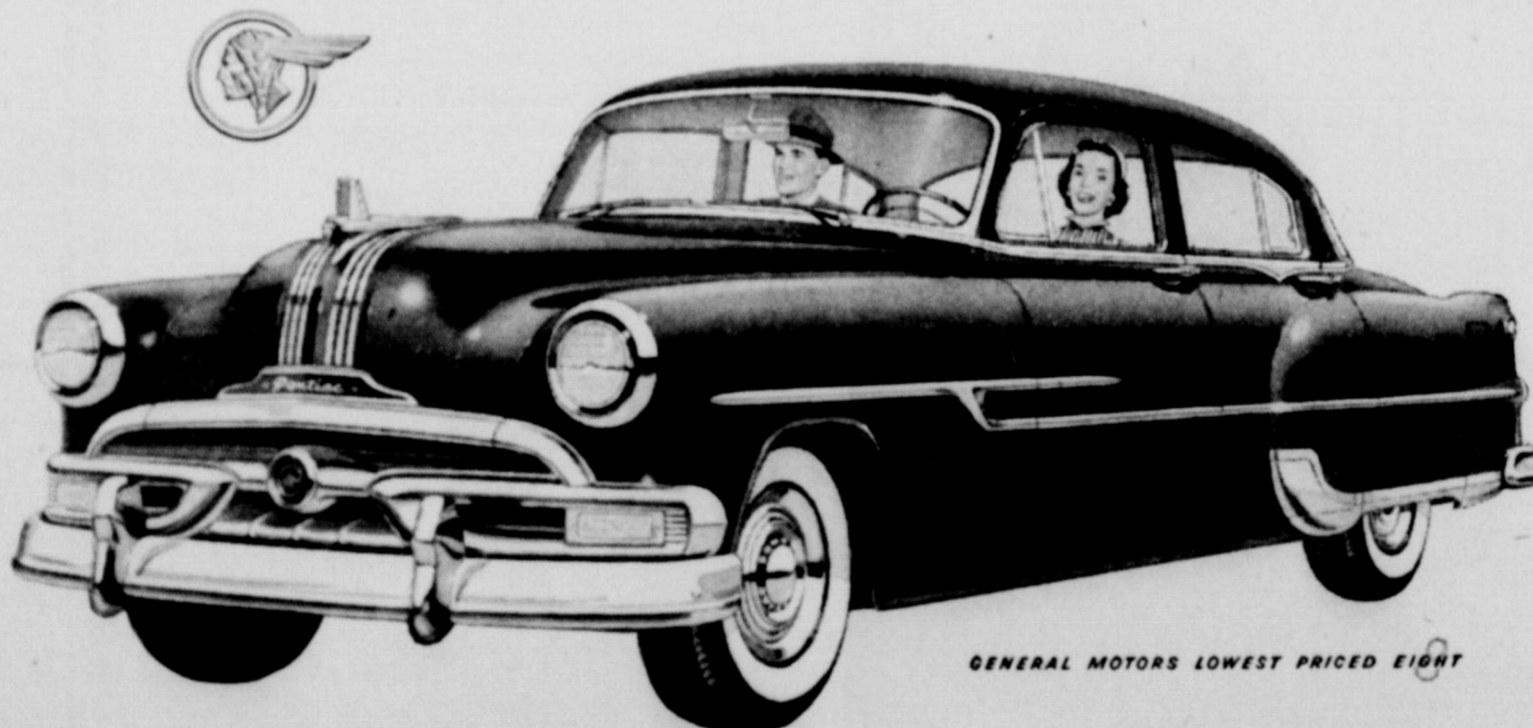

The broken field running of Weldon Brevard was a feature of the night, but his long jaunts were helped along by the down-field blocking of his teammates.

Drizzling rain handicapped the perfect handling of the wet, slippery pigskin. Brevard showed his heels twice for 75 yards and again on a 56-yard dash. Grady Curry turned in a nice job of side-stepping for 25 yards and a score. Jerry Bell broke into the open and scampered for 45 yards on one run to score, and Richard Tolliver took a Bell pass and ran for 38 and a touchdown. Tolliver also galloped for 50 yards and a score in the opening minutes of the final quarter.

The Lake View score came on two pass plays, one for 35 and another for the same yardage. Bill Hook was on the receiving end of the pass effort that scored.

The Bearcats racked up 18 first downs and amassed a total of 443 yards on running plays. They completed four passes for another 154 yards.

The Lake View team was held to 8 first downs and 106 yards rushing. The Chiefs completed two passes for 69 yards.
