

THE BARS at bottom in the graph above show the variation in heating weather for the last two years as revealed by Weather **Bureau Reports** 

The bars at top show the amount of gas an average home used each month. Gas for cooking, water heating and refrigeration is indicated in gray. Gas for house heating is indicated in black.

Last December, for example, the bar on the extreme right shows that an average home used nearly 10,000 cubic feet of gas-7,500 of it for heating. 




