## Highway Patrol Reports Extra Quiet 4th in Area

Joe Perry, state highway patrolman, stationed here, stated that the long Fourth of July week-end was the quietest experienced in several months. The patrol investigated a fender-bushing which resulted in an arrest and a charge of driving while intoxicated against one man.

Patrolman Perry stated that no arrests were made for speeding and no traffic violation of any kind occurred Sunday or Monday.

Other enforcement officers had considerable business Saturday but no arrests or investigations Sunday or Monday.

## Four More Producers Reported Past Week

New oil producers in the Ballinger area have added interest this week and it is indicated that additional locations will be staked soon.

Casing was being set Wednesday morning in Rhodes Drilling Co. No. 1-Hamp Byler to test production in the Palo Pinto. After concrete is run to the bottom of the pay, it will set for 72 hours before pipe is perforated and the structure given acid treatment. Gas and oil were hit in this well last week but the hole was drilled on to 4,200 feet to complete the contract.

Pipe also was being set yesterday in Truman Hill and D. Henry Werblow, Trustee, No. 1-R. L. Huddleston to gauge production in the Serratt. Gas and free oil were encountered on a drillstem test Tuesday night between 2,360 and 2,370 feet. Concrete will be run in the hole today and a standard rig moved in the latter part of the week to finish drilling. The rotary rig is being skidded over to drill No. 2-Huddleston.

The newly designated Norton, West (Lower Fry) field, has gained a second producer and a one location north extension. Bert Fields No. 1-E. F. Bryan was finalized the first of this week for a daily flowing poten-

tial of 459.36 barrels of 50 gravity oil, and no water. The potential is based on an actual six-hour flow of 114.84 barrels. Top of pay was found at 4,335 feet.

The Winters, North (Gardner line) field gained its third producer with completion of Howley & Jacobs No. 1-Anna Jonas for a daily flowing potential of 141 barrels of 46.6 gravity oil. Top of pay in this well is at 4,532 feet.

Gulf Oil Corp. has filed an application for a permit to drill a 4,600-foot try, its No. 1-A. G. Seitz, in the Fry sand field, three miles northeast of Wingate.

Sid Katz, Wayne Petroleum Co. No. 1-E. L. Eubank, 5/8 of a mile east of the Winters, West (Canyon) field, is projected for 4,800 feet. Operations have already been started on the wildcat.

The log of Womer-Tilton Oil Co. No. 1-J. A. Henderson, wildcat, six miles southwest of Winters, shows gas and oil found in the Gardner. The tests were made below 4,600 feet.

Thomas D. Humphrey & Sons has filed an application for a permit to drill Humphrey No. 6-Thomas C. Hall, four miles northeast of Ballinger. Projection is for 4,000 feet to the upper Gardner.

## Clean-Up Underway; Free Hauling July 14

The special clean-up campaign is underway here this week and free trash hauling will start next Wednesday. The committee in charge of this special clean-up is enlisting a number of truck owners to furnish equipment and a group of the larger sized Boy Scouts will help in the loading and unloading. Trucks will begin their first runs Wednesday, July 14, and all trash is to be in containers and in the alley by that time. Trucks will be unable to double back over the same territory and trash put out after the trucks have passed will not be picked up.

Bill Bell, civic chairman of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce, is having members of his committee to look after details of the campaign. He has also named a number of local men to serve as inspection captains and each of these has been assigned an area of the city. They will look at yards and alleys to determine where work is needed and will report

to the general committee. As soon as the campaign is concluded, on July 16, another inspection will be made to see how many have failed to cooperate and house numbers where work is still needed will be listed and turned over to the committee.

The drive has been well organized in the negro and Latin-American sections and many have already started work. These areas will furnish their own help in the hauling job.

It is the hope of the committee that every fire and health hazard will be removed during these ten days. Some of the captains have already inspected their territories and most of the reports show the community in excellent condition. There are a few alleys where weeds have grown rank since rains several weeks ago and these are offering harborage for flies and mosquitoes. Owners of vacant lots where weeds are high are also asked to join in the campaign.

## C. C. Directors Approve Course on Salesmanship

Ballinger Chamber of Commerce directors held their regular July meeting Tuesday evening.

J. G. Tuckey, chairman of the retail committee, gave information on a course to be held here for salesmen. A class of thirty employees will be formed and an instructor will be here the last two weeks in August to direct the sessions. "Public Relations and Sales for Retail Employees" is the subject of the course and all employees are eligible to sign up. The entire course of six two-hour classes will cost \$150 per person and all supplies will be furnished. Joe Gabriel will be the instructor and classes will be held on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday of each week. Those interested are asked to sign up with the chamber of commerce as soon as possible.

Bill Bell reported on the clean-up campaign which is now underway and told what had been planned for the remainder of the period through July 16.

It was announced that the district Boy Scout swimming contests would be held in Ballinger on Saturday, August 7. The civic committee of the chamber will have a watermelon supper for the scouts on the night of August 6 at the city park. C. E. Maedgen was appointed to look after the serving and other details.

The directors voted to send Manager Joe McCauley to the Southwestern Institute, Dallas, July 18 through 24.

A number of other items were discussed and a special meeting of the industry committee was scheduled for this week-end.

## Absentee Voting Now Underway; Supplies Readied

Absentee voting began in Runnels county Sunday with several applications on hand for ballots to be mailed out to citizens who will be away from home on July 24.

These ballots and other blanks are to be found at the office of County Clerk Frankie Berryman. Persons who expect to be out of the county on election day, may go to the office and cast a ballot any time now and until three days before the primary.

On the day of the election, these ballots will be opened, counted and included in the county totals on all races.

Homer Hudgins, county Democratic chairman, has placed an order for the ballots, purchased other election supplies and will distribute all supplies and boxes to the election managers several days before July 24.

Mr. Hudgins will come to Ballinger the night of the election and be at the Ledger office to receive telephone calls from managers when they make reports. The unofficial returns will be compiled Saturday night after the election and sent to the Texas Election Bureau at Dallas.

## Preparation Suggestions Given For Planting Grasses in Spring

Woodrow Hoffman, of the soil conservation service, states that now is the time to take the first step in getting ready to plant grass in the spring of 1955 in those shallow fields and old turned-out fields.

Hoffman said that growing a dead cover now for seeding grasses next spring is the most dependable method known to date. In order to have a dead cover crop in which to plant grass, close drilled crops such as grain sorghums should be planted now on lands which are to be planted to perennial grasses in the spring of 1955.

There are approximately 19,500 acres of land in the Runnels county soil conservation district that are unsuitable for cultivation, according to specialists. This land should be or it has been turned out of cultivation and planted to perennial grasses. A lot of these old turned-out fields are now covered with mesquite, prickly pear, threeween grasses, red gamma and hairy gamma. These plants yield little or no grazing to the soil from wind or rain. These old fields can be made to produce good perennial grasses such as sideoats grama, little bluestem and cane bluestem. These types yield an abundance of grazing and provide the maximum protection to the soil.

Based upon experience through the years, the following steps are considered essential west of the 30-inch rainfall belt, if successful grass planting is to be accomplished.

1. Have the ground clean and in condition for planting sorghum.
2. Sow in close drills and adapted forage sorghums.
3. Mow when necessary to prevent maturity of the sorghum seed and leave 6 to 8 inch stubble.
4. Leave the stubble undisturbed over winter, and drill grass in this stubble at the proper time next spring.
5. Plant only grass seed adapted to your area.
6. Plant local grown grass seed if at all possible.

Here are some of the things that this dead cover does. It reduces the soil temperatures, thus reducing the soil evaporation. It helps to eliminate surface crusting of the soil. It protects the grass seedling from the hot dry winds. All in all it helps to nourish the young grass through its critical growing stage which is about the first two months after it comes up.

The party opened with a "hot dog" supper and later a short program was presented. Chaplain A. O. Rue made a short talk in which he commended the Ballinger firemen for their fine record in attending drills, meetings and fires. He praised them for their loyalty to the department and the service rendered property owners of Ballinger.

Mayor Charles Hambrick told all present that the work of the fireman had brought the best insurance rate possible for a town to enjoy. He also told that firemen were working on a plan to purchase a truck to take care of their safety and first-aid equipment and added that the city had not been asked to purchase this equipment. The mayor also stated that the county commissioners' court had been asked to financially help the four fire departments of the county in maintaining a rural truck which would answer all fires outside city limits. When the new county budget is made up this item probably will be included.

The treasurer's report showed a total of \$1,065.00 on hand at this time.

The seal sale in Runnels county was not conducted locally last year. Seals were mailed out from the state office, Austin, and checks were returned there. The county organization did receive part of the money sent in from this county, however. Special effort will be centered on the 1954 sale starting on Thanksgiving day.

## Hardeman Brings Patriotic Address To Lions Meeting

State Senator Dorsey B. Hardeman, of San Angelo, was guest speaker for the Ballinger Lions Club Friday, bringing a patriotic address. Mr. Hardeman took the constitution and the American way of life as the basis for his remarks and threw in warnings of what is happening over the world.

At one point in his address the speaker stated that he did not want to be called an alarmist but drew attention to the infiltration of communists in Central America and of other incidents which might threaten our freedom.

The speaker referred to various amendments to the constitution and urged every person to reread it and to obey it and live by it.

## County's Bank Deposits \$14,530,823 on June 30

Combined deposits in the five principal banks of Runnels county were up \$242,477 for the call on June 30. This increase was shown from the statement at the close of business on April 15. The deposits of the five banks totalled \$14,530,823 on June 30 as compared with \$14,288,346 in April.

A downtown solicitation was made but many were not contacted by the workers. Announcements were made in several churches Sunday that contributions could be put in the collection plates and marked for flood relief. If this plan raised any money, it had not been reported Tuesday.

Last week one pick-up load of bed linens was taken from here to Ozona for distribution. Those who made the trip stated that it was given to those needing it and all was issued within a short time. Some additional bedding was received after the pick-up left Ballinger and this was taken to San Angelo and put in a collection being made up there.

Any person who has not been contacted and who will make a donation is asked to send it to the Red Cross, King-Holt Co., either one of the local banks or the chamber of commerce office. Leaders expect to close the campaign and get the money to the Ozona authorities the first of next week.

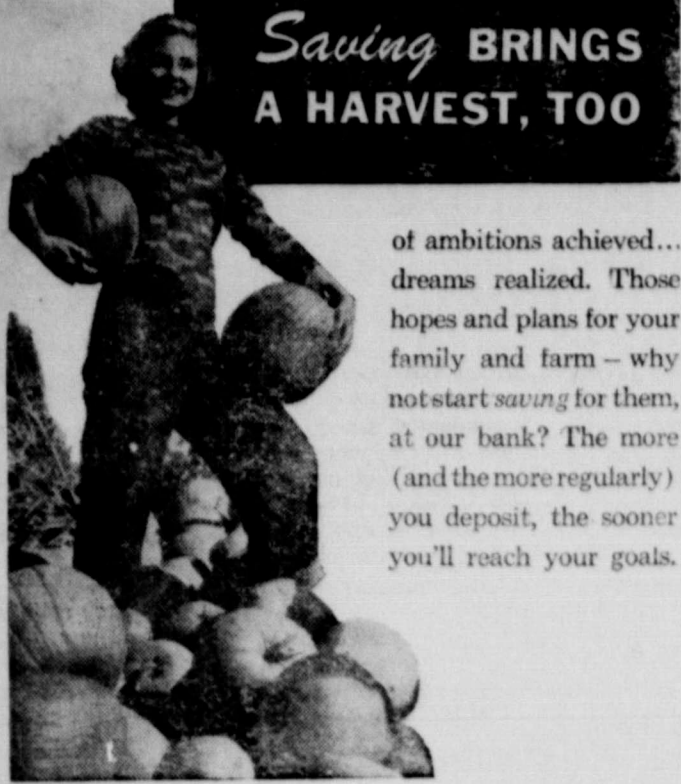

The double ring ceremony was performed by the Rev. Alvin O. Rue, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, U. S. A.

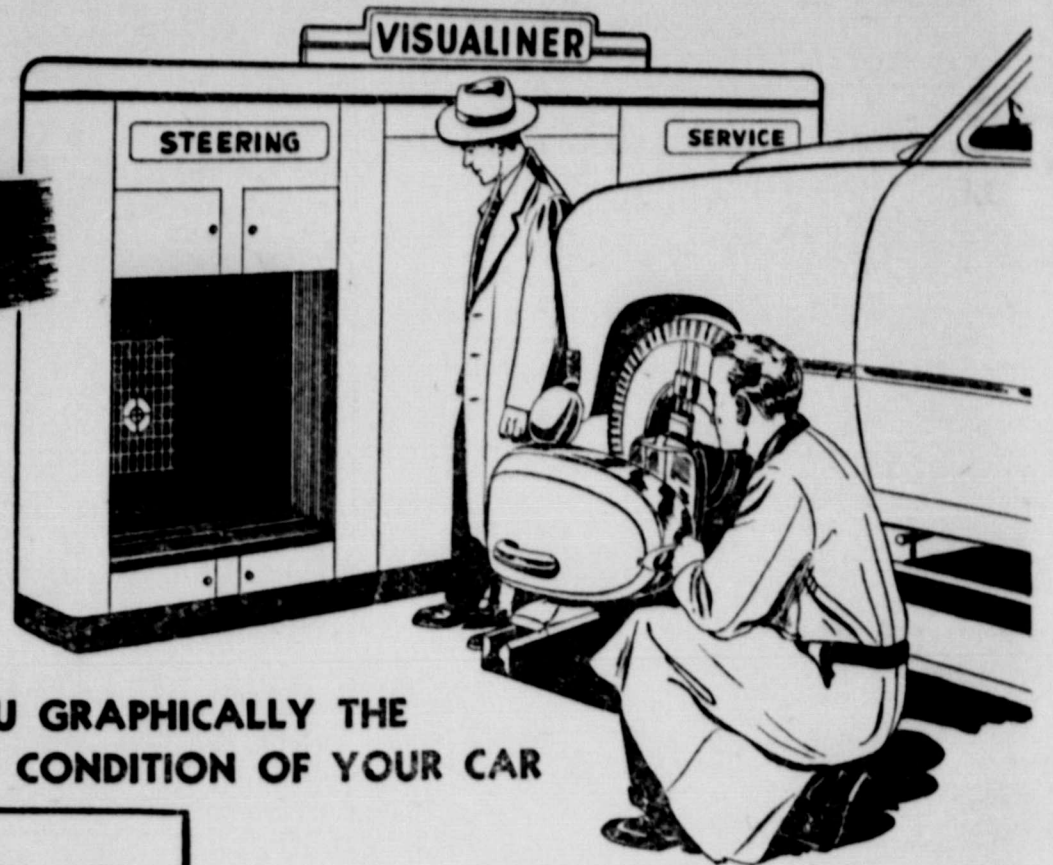

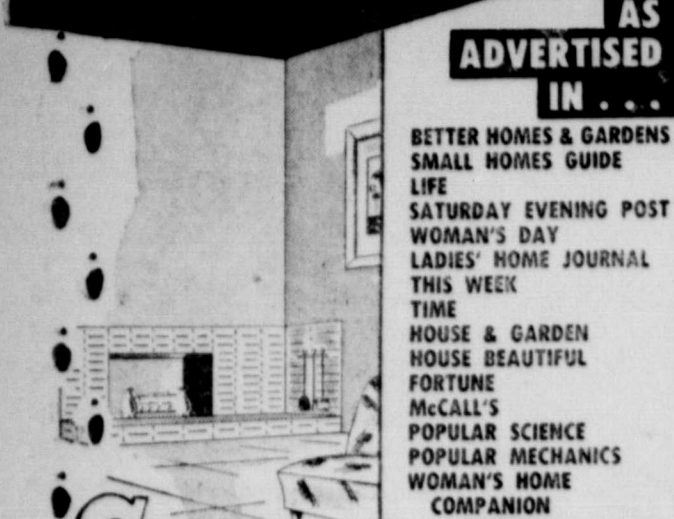

**Oscar H. Smith**

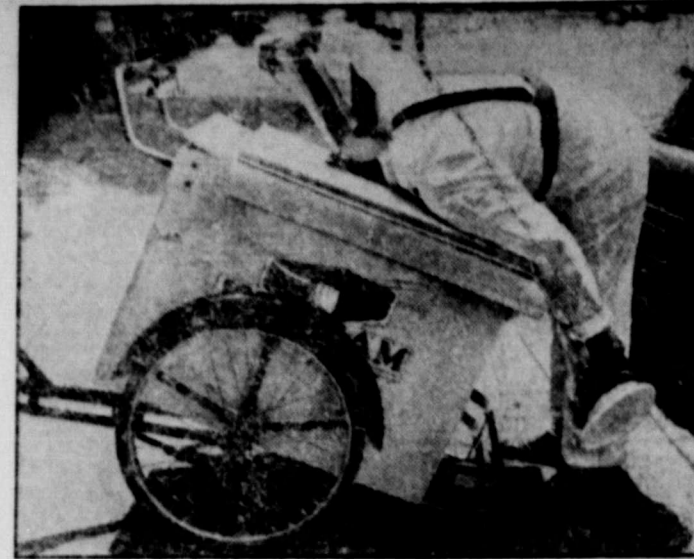

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## WEST TEXAS NOTES

A city-wide clean-up campaign is being conducted here which will be continued through July 16. Last week a city crew sprayed all over town to kill flies and mosquitoes and plans are to eliminate health hazards for the remainder of the summer. A group of 20 "captains" first surveyed the town to see where clean-up was needed. At the conclusion of the campaign they will cover their assigned territories again and report house numbers of all places where requirements have not been met. Starting July 14, a number of extra trucks, with Boy Scouts working as loaders, will move trash from the alleys. Each property owner is to put his trash in containers, which can be handled by two men, in the alley. When this is done it will be hauled away free of charge. The general committee is urging that every individual in Ballinger show a personal pride in getting his premises cleaned. The effort is in behalf of everybody and in the hope that no case of polio will develop here this summer.

It is just two more weeks until the first Democratic primary. Absentee voting began Tuesday and will continue until three days before the election. All election managers have been named by the county committee and there will be ample help in every box to wait on the voters. Polling places will be opened at 8:00 a. m. and kept open until 7:00 p. m. The returns from each precinct will be reported as soon as possible after 7:00 p. m. and unofficial

The Miles Lions Club is sponsoring a barbecue to be served on the evening of July 15 and this to be followed by a calf roping. The barbecue dinner will be for the purpose of making money to carry on a city recreational program. Dinner tickets are being sold in advance so the club will know how many to prepare for but those attending the calf roping will be able to secure tickets at the arena. Committees have been named to look after getting the meat, making table arrangements, serving and ticket sales. The club has set as a long-range project the building of a swimming pool.

In addition to a building program, the Winters school is carrying on a renovation and minor improvement project this summer. A new electric scoreboard has been installed at the football field which is approximately 18 feet wide and 18 feet high. The new field house will be completed late in August. Grass is being planted on the football and practice fields and campus improvements made. According to the contractor, the new building will be completed some time in January.

The Brownwood Chamber of Commerce has planned a huge Halloween party to be held on October 30. The party will include a parade, a big street dance and other entertainment. Approximately \$500 in prizes will be offered, and for the best costumes there will be four different age groups. The person submitting the best name for the party will receive a cash prize of \$50. All members of the Western Square Dance Association will be invited to attend and take part in the street shindig.

A new system for selling and collecting tickets has been invoked for the Coleman rodeo. Instead of collecting from passengers in cars, as they enter the grounds, all cars will be able to drive in and park but a second fence around the arena will prevent them from entering the stands without tickets. Three new ticket offices have been constructed and patrons may secure their admissions at these places. The new plan will eliminate the blocking of cars on the highway which caused a serious traffic problem.

The 14th annual Comanche rodeo opens today for three night performances. All arrangements have been completed for the 1954 show, top notch livestock having been secured and some of the best amateur performers in the state entered for cash prizes. Last year the rodeo drew near capacity crowds and additional seating has been provided for the 1954 show. A parade will be the opening feature, merchants entering decorated floats and many riders joining in the horseback division.

The Bronte school board last week called a \$250,000 bond issue and set July 10 as the date. At that time citizens of the district will determine whether the bonds will be issued for construction of a new building and numerous other improvements. For the past year several committees have been studying the needs of the system and the election was called after a petition bearing 103 signers was handed to the board. A consulting engineer has stated that the quarter-million dollars would take care of building and equipment.

The Stephenville city council approved a new city hall building and equipment at a meeting last week with the contractor. The approval placed limitations on some parts of the building where a small

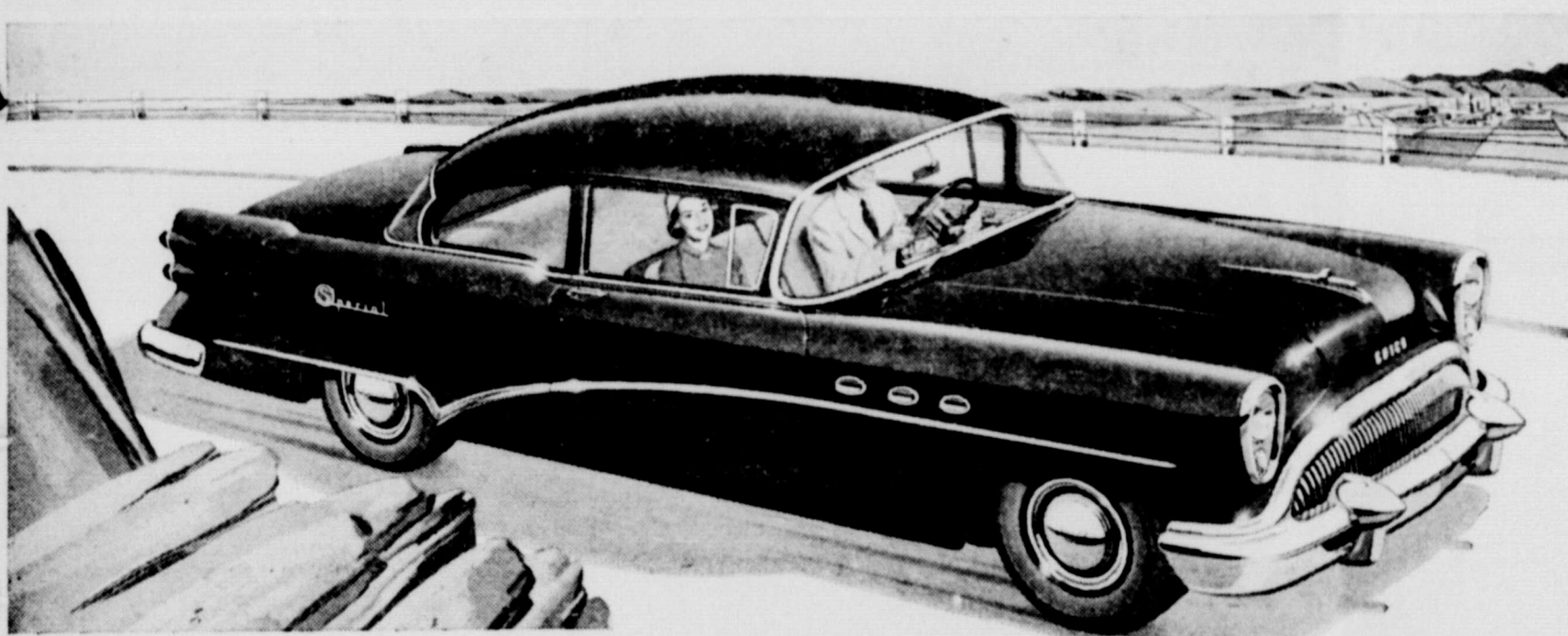
