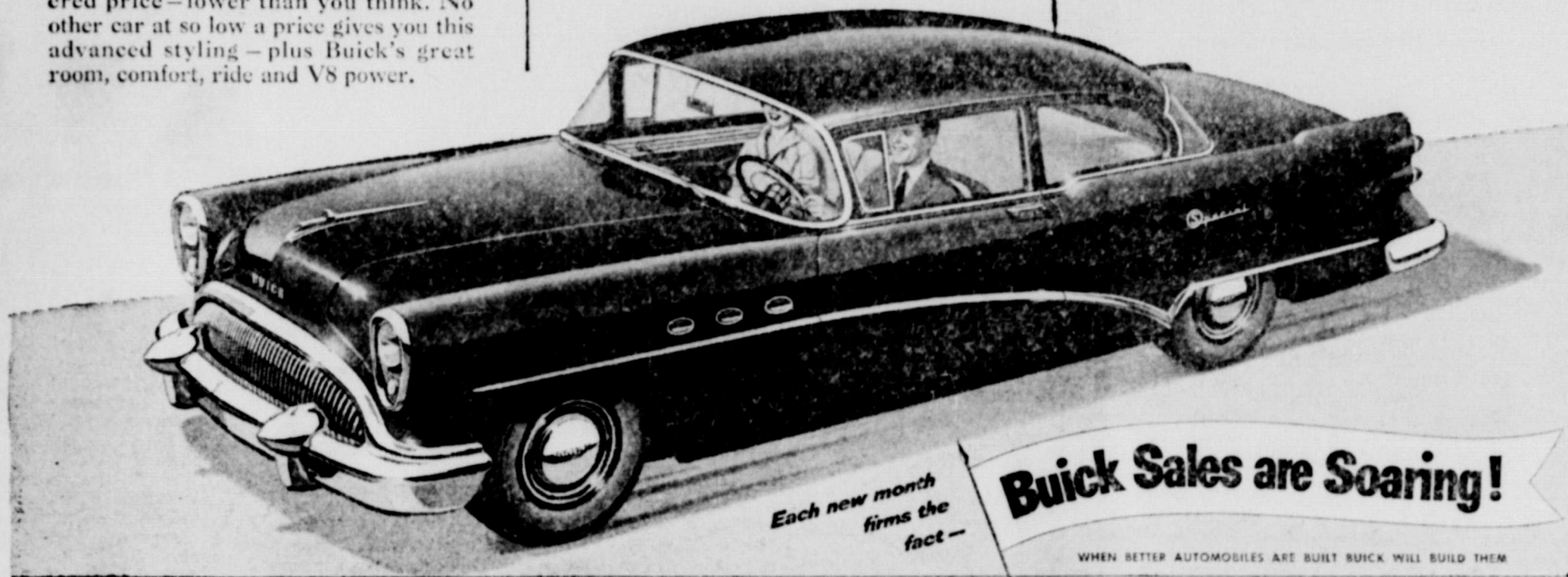

LEGISLATIVE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2

Second Primary For All Polling Places in County

The Runnels county Democratic executive committee met here July 27 to canvass the ballots in each box and to decide other business.

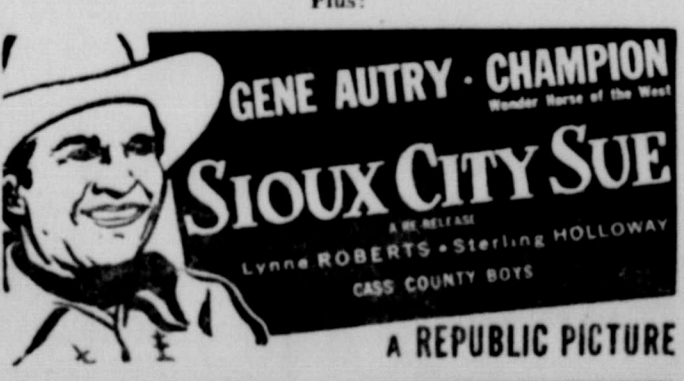
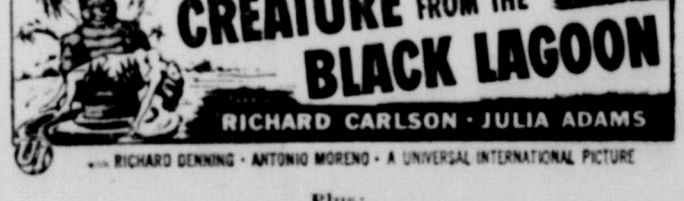

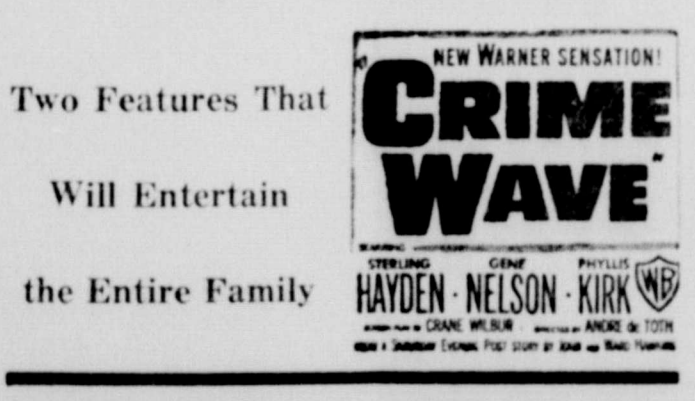

**Farm-Ranch Co-operators
 Complete Useful Projects**

Co-operators in the Rannels county soil conservation district have completed a large number of projects. In each instance technical assistance was extended.

Bill Moore, of Ballinger, who has a farm located east of Maverick, has just completed a diversion terrace to protect a field from outside water. He has five acres of guar in the northeastern corner of his farm on the Bronte highway. He also has a 43-acre field of perennial blue panic grass alongside the bridge road. He is pitting the surface of 500 acres of pasture land to catch and soak up rainfall.

Alva Berry, of Ballinger, has constructed diversion terraces to protect a field. One puts water into a tank which he has enlarged and the other carries the discharge from the tank away from the field. He plans to terrace this field now and another later.

Cicero Smith has installed a level border irrigation system with Bert Simpson the operator. He has already started watering his crop.

W. H. Cole, of Winters, has built a diversion terrace above a field. He installed a system of level closed-end terraces to catch and hold the water that falls on the field. He intends to build more terraces soon.

Jim Patton, of Wingate, has five acres of guar on the C. C. Pace farm. The roots are piercing down deep and fertilizing the soil.

Walter Green, of Winters, has built six acres of perennial grasses growing. His farm is located three miles northeast of Wingate.

Pat Pritchard, of Wingate, has constructed a terraced field. He is also plowing up a thick stand of mesquite brush. This will permit native grasses to take the rainfall. He had 22 acres of peas on his place the past winter.

Gus Schwertner, of Miles, recently completed half a mile of terraces. He used the elevator terracer belonging to the North Concho district.

George Thomas, of Bronte, who farms three miles northwest of Maverick, has completed 32 miles of terraces. He shaped a waterway to handle the outside water.

Vac Kvasnicka, of Rowena, cleared 14 acres of land and installed 15 miles of terraces.

Ralph Erwin, of Ballinger, has constructed two diversion terraces above his field and Lester Lee built one on his farm in the Maverick area.

Roy Smith, of Content, has completed a livestock water pond. It has a diversion terrace to carry water into it.

Others who have completed tanks since May are Hugo Vogelsang, Marvin Gray, Winters; Ralph Vancil, Hatchel; Wesley Wood, Ballinger.

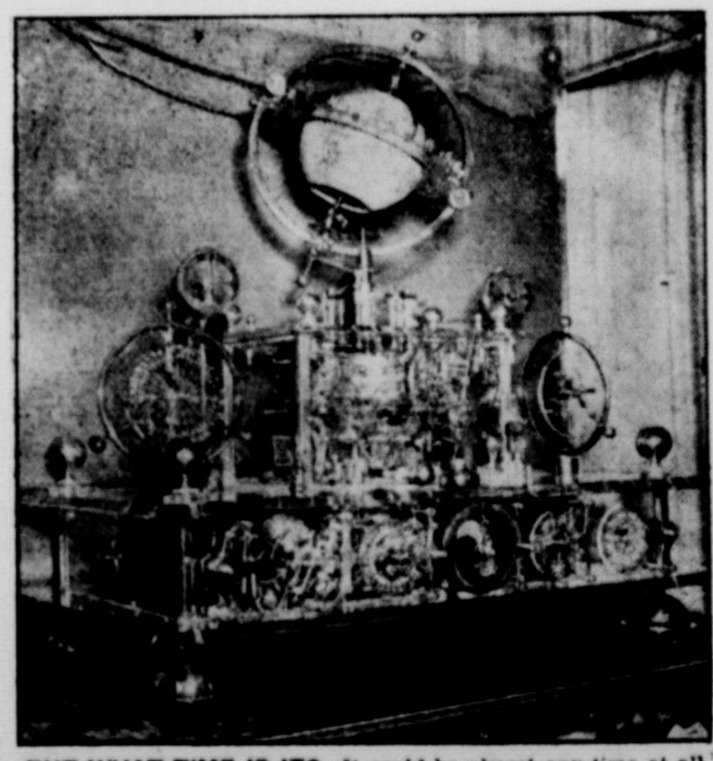

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3
 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 16a to Article VIII to provide that in counties of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants, as determined by the last preceding census of the United States, elections may be held to provide for an Assessor-Collector of Taxes, providing for submission of this Amendment to the voters of Texas, and providing the time, venue and manner thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
 Section 1. That Section 16a shall be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas so as to read as follows:
 "Section 16a. In any county having a population of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants as determined by the last preceding census of the United States, the Commissioners Court may submit to the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county at an election the question of adding an Assessor-Collector of Taxes to the list of authorized county officials. If a majority of such voters voting in such election shall approve of adding an Assessor-Collector of Taxes to such list, then such official shall be elected at the next General Election for such Constitutional term of office as is provided for other Tax Assessor-Collectors in this State."
 Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at the General Election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon the following:
 "FOR the Constitutional Amendment permitting elections in counties of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants to provide for an Assessor-Collector of Taxes," and
 "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment permitting elections in counties of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants to provide for an Assessor-Collector of Taxes."
 If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.
 Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

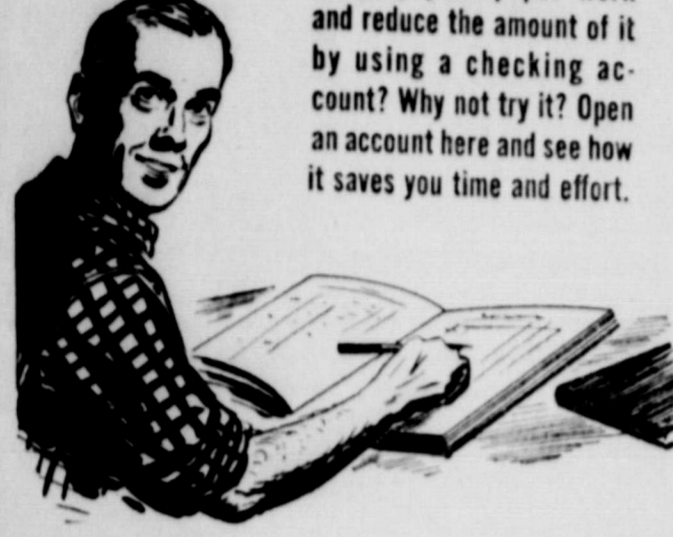

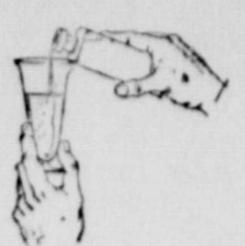

RESTATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas. Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that the same shall hereafter read as follows: 'Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions hereinafter contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be provided by law, for the payment of assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to, (1) needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of sixty-five (65) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than two hundred (\$200) dollars per month...
