## Football Opener Friday; Bearcats to Meet Broncs

The Sonora Bronchos will be here at 8:00 p. m. tomorrow (Friday) to open the football season with the Ballinger Bearcats. School officials were rushing work this week to have everything in readiness for this game.

Bearcat coaches have been having their early season troubles, a large number of injuries stacking up in early scrimmage. Those on the injured list the past week-end included two of the three starters last year. Gary Ferguson was out with an infected foot and Spike Dykes was suffering an injury to an ankle which will take time to determine how long he will be out. Others injured include Winchester, an end; and John Duke, a back.

Coach Doug Cox stated that it was impossible to give the starting line-up because of the physical condition of some players. He hopes to start the following boys in the first game: Ends, Ronnie Maedgen and Pete Bryan; Tackles, Gary Ferguson and James Buxkemper; Guards, Bobby Winans and James Dreyer.

## Maintenance of Terraces Said Important on Farm

Theo Halfmann, of the Offen community, reports that he does a good job of terrace maintenance with a whirlwind terracer. He says that he goes over his terraces with this machine every three or four years and thereby keeps his terraces high and wide and has very little trouble with them. Mr. Halfmann is a cooper with the Runnels soil conservation district.

Local soil conservation technicians point out that maintenance is necessary to keep terraces from breaking and causing serious erosion.

They say that terraces can be maintained by proper plowing. This should be done parallel to the terrace so that a dead furrow falls in the channel and a back furrow on the ridge. In this way well built terraces can be kept at a proper size and slightly undersized terraces can be built up. Widths between terraces should be varied from year to year so that dead furrows will not fall in the same place.

If terraced fields are plowed as they should be maintenance becomes a part of the regular tillage operation and is not a special maintenance job. Old terraces that have been well maintained seldom require repair, but new ones may need the fills, road crossings, or where crossing plows have cut into them built up. End blocks should be maintained.

The small rubber tired, hydraulic ferno, available in the district, will work nicely in making fills. The lighter terracing machines, such as Mr. Halfmann uses, or a homemade V-drag can be used effectively for maintenance.

Sory Alexander is terracing another of his fields, west of Crews. This field is a long narrow one with outside water coming across from a hill on two sides. Four small diversion terraces were constructed. They empty into two waterways across the field in the natural drain. These carry the outside water safely across the field. Mr. Alexander is now building a diversion terrace above another small field to cut the outside water.

Alva Berry has just completed 26,699 feet of level closed-end terraces. His farm is northeast of Ballinger on the Crews highway. Mr. Berry first constructed two diversion terraces above his field to shut out the outside water that had been flowing across his cultivated tract. One of these terraces empties into a stock tank and the other takes the water from the spillway of the tank and empties it into his pasture away from the field.

F. D. Gardner, of Wilmett, is planning to finish terracing his field south of Winters. A field north of this one was terraced last year.

## 2 Wells Finalled In Nearby Fields; Pay Close in One

Rhodes Drilling Co. No. 1-Mrs. J. F. Currie was being drilled Wednesday below 3,000 feet. This prospector, located in the Ballinger Palo Pinto field, is near production depth and should be completed this week-end. It is one location north-west of the Byler No. 1, most recent producer in this field, and south of other production on the Currie place.

Serving Drilling Co. No. 1-J. B. McCord, a Cross Cut sand discovery five miles southeast of Crews, has been completed for a daily flowing potential of 245 barrels of 43 gravity oil. Pay was topped at 3,308 feet.

Pan-American Production Co. No. 1-Wesley Wood has been gouted for a daily pumping potential of 2436 barrels of 44 gravity oil. The well is an extension north of the Ballinger (Serrati) field. Top of pay was encountered at 2,449 feet. The location is five miles north of Ballinger.

Thomas D. Humphrey & Sons, of Dallas, has filed an application for a permit to drill its No. 1-Bryan Clayton, one location south of production in the South Crews field, four miles south of Crews. Rotary drilling to 4,000 feet is scheduled to begin at once.

The South Crews (upper Gardner) field has been extended one location west with completion of Vincent & Welch, Inc. No. 5-Myrtle Taylor for a calculated daily flowing potential of 240.94 barrels of 44 gravity oil. Top of pay was found at 3,843 feet.

## CALICHE BASE WORK FINISHED ON DETOUR

Grading and caliche topping have about been completed on the road leading from the Horseshoe Theatre on the Paint Rock highway to highway 67 west of Ballinger. The distance is slightly over two miles and within the near future the state maintenance division will give it a black topping.

This road is being hard-surfaced and will be used as a detour when work is started on the bridge across the Colorado River here. No exact location or the starting time on the new bridge has been announced by the highway department.

Clyde Chapman, commissioner of precinct 1, and his crew have built the grade and caliche base on the detour and a state crew will apply the topping.

## OZONA OFFICIAL THANKS BALLINGER CONTRIBUTORS

## State Lets Contract For Guard Armory

A new national guard armory for Ballinger has moved a step closer with a contract being awarded by the state board of control to R. L. Guyler. The exact amount of the bid was not disclosed.

The bid will be sent to Washington for approval and it is expected to require about 30 days before being returned to the state board. After federal approval a work order will be issued within about ten days.

The overall size of the building will be 109 by 114 feet. An auditorium in the center will be 61 by 90 feet. The building will

contain three small offices, two large class rooms with folding partitions that can be removed to make one large assembly room, a large locker room, two shower rooms, a kitchen, a supply room and a strong room with vault.

The building will have Janitrol ceiling automatic heaters and fluorescent lighting.

The bid calls for just the construction of building and most of the equipment will be received from some other source.

The contractor has 150 days in which to complete the job after the work order is issued.

## Patrolmen File Traffic Cases During Labor Day Holidays

## 11 Important Amendments Before Texans November 2

Eleven constitutional amendments will be submitted to citizens of Texas at the general election to be held on November 2. Every effort is to be made to acquaint the people with the proposals so that intelligent votes can be cast for or against each.

Most of the amendments are of interest to citizens of Runnels county, but one proposal will affect only counties of less than 10,000 population and another specifies the counties involved.

In brief the context of the proposed amendments follow:

S. J. R. No. 7 would authorize the legislature to increase spending for old age assistance, aid to the blind and aid to dependent children by \$7,000,000 a year. It would require that names of recipients of public assistance be made available to the public.

S. J. R. No. 6 would permit members of the teachers retirement system and the state employees retirement system to receive credit for services rendered as a teacher or as a state employee.

H. J. R. No. 17 would provide for coverage of proprietary employees of the state's political subdivisions under federal old age and survivors insurance.

S. J. R. No. 10 would create a state building commission with authority to erect buildings for state purposes and establish a state building fund by transferring to it the surplus in the Confederate pension fund. The decrease in the number of pensions to Confederate soldiers and their widows has built up a surplus of more than five million dollars as of March 31, 1954.

S. J. R. No. 5 would authorize the legislature to fix the salaries of the governor, attorney general, comptroller of public accounts, state treasurer, commissioner of the general land office and secretary of state. It also would fix compensation of members of the legislature \$25 a day for not more than 90 days of any session.

S. J. R. No. 14 would prohibit use of the credit of the state or grants of any public money for construction, maintenance or operation of toll roads and turnpikes.

H. J. R. No. 16 would provide that women shall have both the right and the duty to serve on juries.

S. J. R. No. 4 would change four-year terms the elective district, county and precinct officers who now have two-year terms.

S. J. R. No. 2 would authorize the creation of county-wide hospital districts in Bexar, El Paso, Dallas, Galveston, Harris, Jefferson and Tarrant counties and authorize ad valorem taxes for support and operation of these districts.

H. J. R. No. 10 would provide that a member of the armed forces of the United States or component branches thereof may vote in the county in

## Murder Charged In Fatal Shooting Near County Line

Santiola Valdez, of Robstown, arrested in Ballinger Sunday night, has been charged with murder by Concho county authorities. He was arrested on Thirteenth Street by City Night Patrolmen Paul Richardson and Chester Derrick following a four-hour manhunt by Concho and Runnels county officers and state highway patrolmen.

Valdez is charged with the slaying of Trevino Esquivel, 21, of Winters, at a tavern south of Ballinger in Concho county. Officers stated that Valdez shot the young man two times with a .410 shotgun, one charge hitting the victim in the face and the other in the right shoulder.

The shooting occurred about 4:00 o'clock Sunday afternoon and previously a gang fight had occurred in which about five Latin-Americans were involved.

Immediately after the shooting Valdez and two companions left the tavern in a truck and hid out until after dark. They were trying to get back to the northern part of this county where they were picking cotton and were travelling on Thirteenth Street in an attempt to evade officers. After being captured, Valdez admitted the shooting.

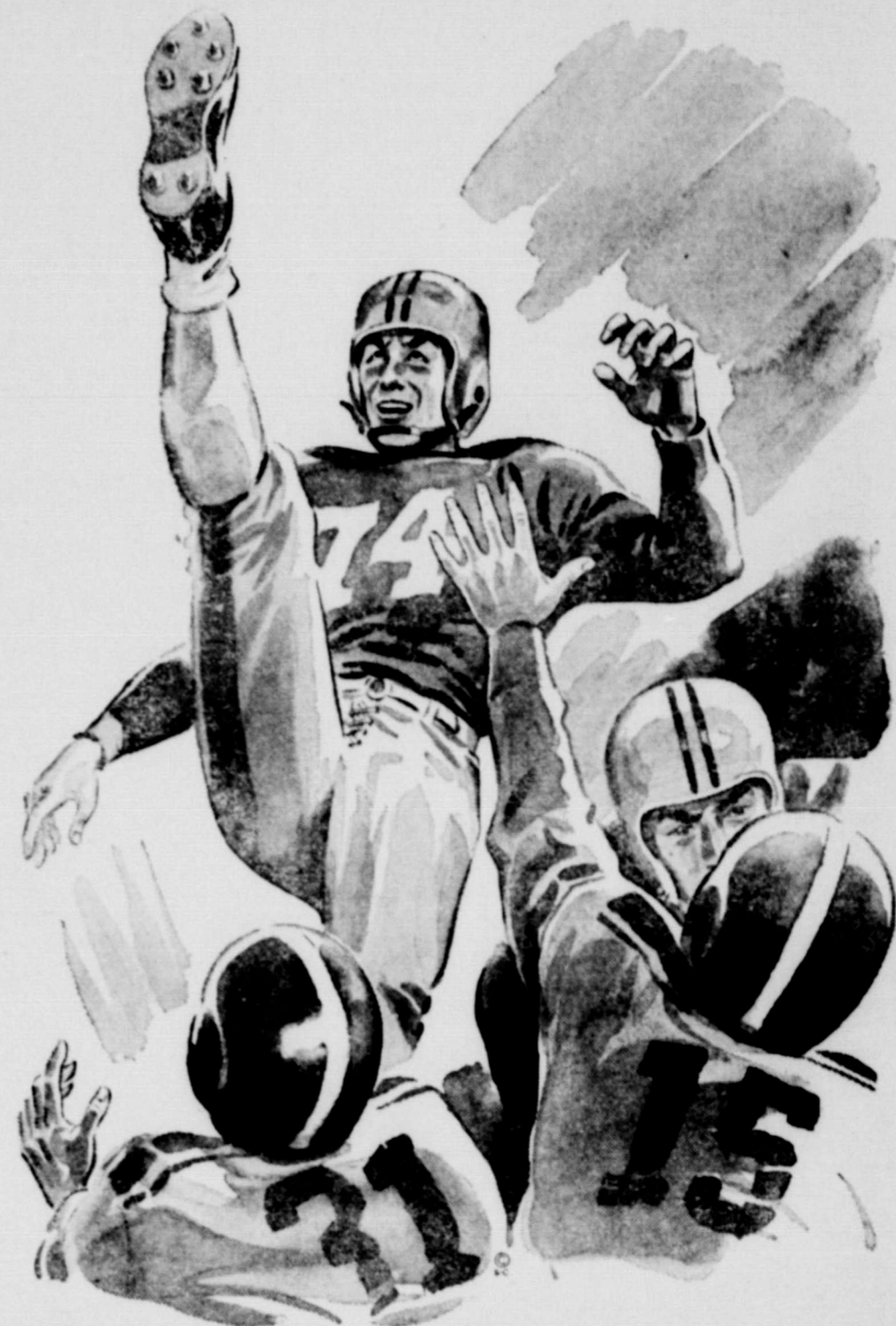

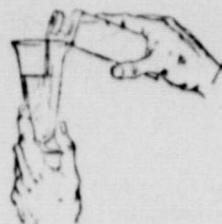

Better Health for Better Living



THE LAST THREE DECADES have brought many changes in matters pertaining to health. The normal span of life has been increased materially. Consider diabetes, for example. Diabetes was first recognized about the time of Moses, or 200 years before the birth of King Tut. It was not until 1921, however, that a specific remedy was discovered. 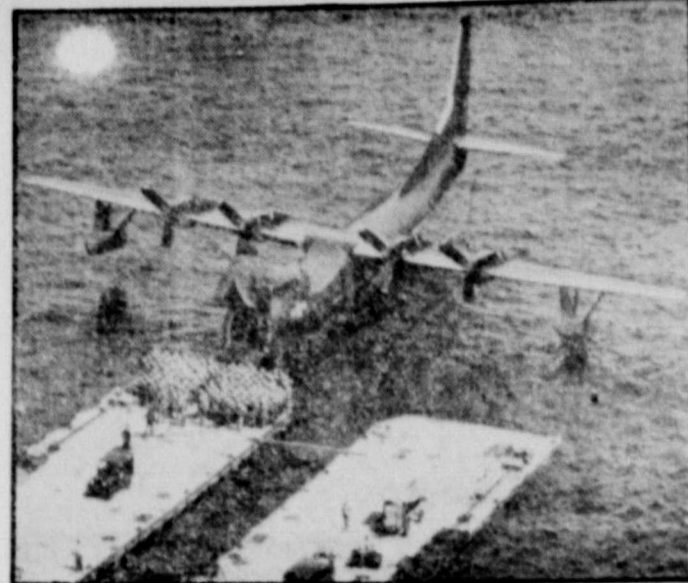

## Police Make Three Arrests in August

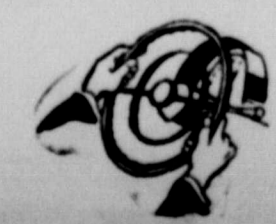
"What can I do to help?"
