Soil conservation technicians point out that now is a good time to be thinking and preparing for reseeding grass in old fields. If grass is to be seeded in the fields that grew small grain, sudan or sorghum this year it is best to leave the stubble standing and the field unplowed until ready to plant grass next spring.

Grass should be seeded on old stubble on a hard seed bed with a grain drill or grass seed drill. It is advised not to plant over half an inch deep.



In 1889 a Kansas City businessman developed the first successful automatic dial telephone. Shortly afterward, his equipment was installed

in an early Independent telephone exchange at LaPorte, Indiana. History records this as the first dial telephone system in America. The development of dial service was necessary, not just fortunate. 


