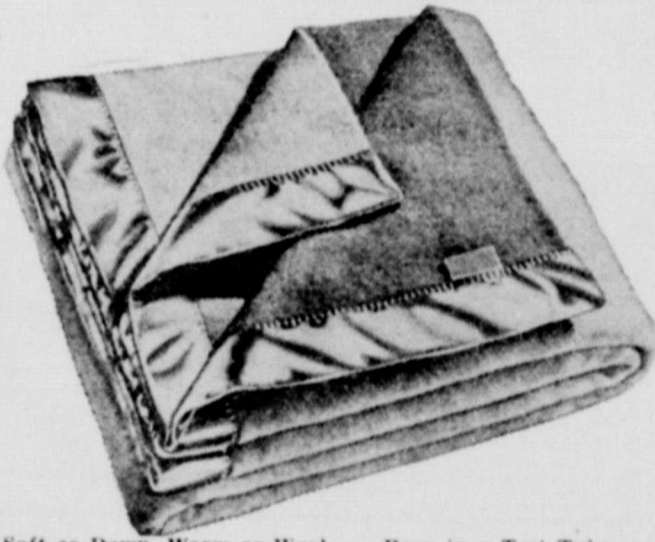

St. Joseph's Girls' 4-H Clubs Elect Officers

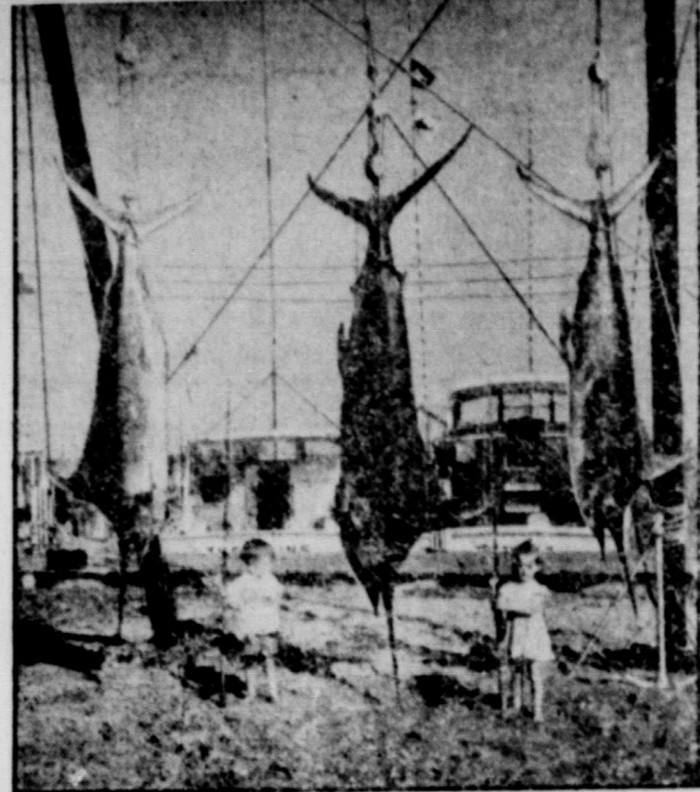

Christian Women's Fellowship Has Social

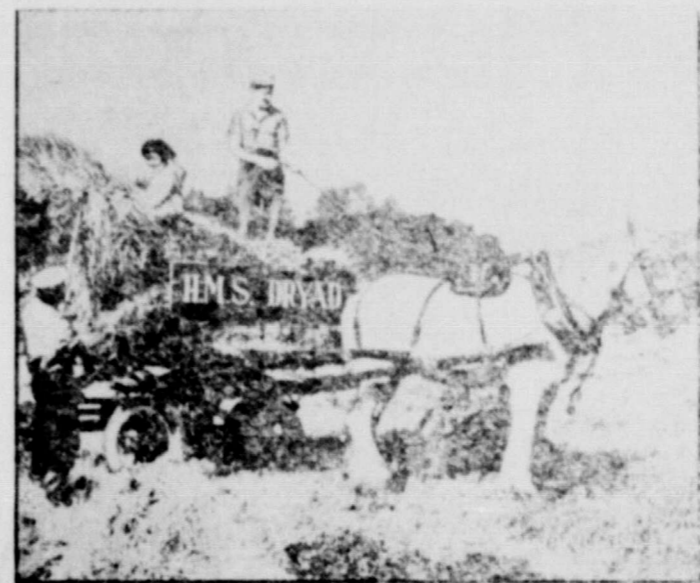
Mrs. Charles F. Bailey was hostess Monday afternoon for the monthly social meeting of the Christian Women's Fellowship, in her home on Fifth Street.

Two First-Run Features, Fight Scenes On Current Week's Bill at Horseshoe

All the grandeur of frontier America in the 1890s, with its sweeping western landscapes, Indians and hard-fighting soldiers is captured in Technicolor in the spectacular adventure drama, "The Siege at Red River," first-run feature at the Horseshoe Drive-In Theatre tomorrow and Saturday. On the same program is a Bowery Boys comedy, "Neath Brooklyn Bridge," starring Leo Gorcey and Huntz Hall; and first-run scenes of the heavyweight prize fight between Rocky Marciano and Izzard Charles. 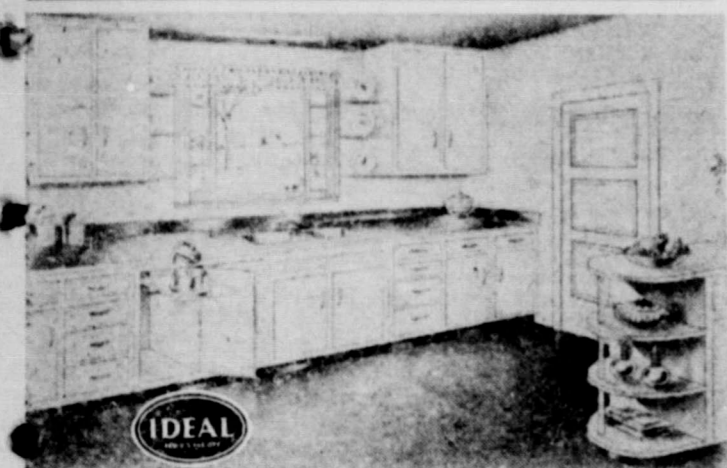

Bearcats Show Power In Beating Anson 42-0

The Ballinger Bearcats showed plenty of power and a stubborn defense in their crushing defeat of the Anson Tigers here Friday night by the score of 42 to 0. The Bearcats were without the services of John Duke, quarterback, and Wayne Johnson, fullback, who remained on the sidelines with injuries. The second string were in practically all of the last quarter and all the players were in and out of the game frequently.

It was a big night for scab-back Grady Curry, who romped to four touchdowns and turned in other nice yardage.

The Bearcats set up an early lead when they drove from their own 45-yard line to the five, from where Curry skirted

right end for the first score. Gary Ferguson booted a perfect extra point through the uprights to lead 7 to 0.

On the next play the Bearcats gambled on a fourth down try and Curry started wide, then cut back into the Tiger's secondary and picked up blockers to go the remaining 30 yards for the second counter. Ferguson's kick was perfect and the Bearcats were off with 14-0.

Again in the first half, the Bearcats took over on the Anson 29 after a bad pass from center and Charles Holloway and Curry worked the ball to the one-yard stripe, from where Maurice Carder went over. Ferguson's kick was good and the Bearcats were off with 21 to 0.

The Ballingerites got underway in a hurry at the beginning of the second half. The Tigers failed to gain and kicked to the Ballinger 29-yard line. On the first play from scrimmage, Curry cut into the Anson secondary and scattered 71 yards to tabulate Ferguson kicked to make it 28 to 0.

Mickey Hart intercepted a Tiger pass and returned to the Anson 26. From there the Bearcats worked the ball to the 4, from where Holloway crashed through the line for the score. Ferguson's toe was again accurate and his kick made it 35 to 0.

The Bearcats gained possession of the ball on the Anson 32 and Grady Curry went into action again and after a beautiful run went over for the last touchdown of the evening. Ferguson made it a perfect night and the score was 42 to 0.

The second string, with Grider Hays and Charles Jackson carrying, took the ball to the Anson one-foot line but failed to get over.

The game was filled with penalties and officials issued several warnings. The Tigers drew 10 for 100 yards and the Bearcats were set back 15 times for 145 yards.

The locals piled up 18 first downs to the visitors' 7. On the ground the Bearcats rushed 396 yards against 207 for the Tigers. The Ballingerites shot 6 passes and completed 3 for 69 yards. The Tigers threw 20 passes and completed 4 for 22 yards. Five Anson fumbles were recovered by the Bearcats and the locals lost two to the Tigers.

TAX ROLLS APPROVED BY CITY COMMISSION

The Ballinger city commission held a regular business meeting Tuesday and took up a number of routine items.

The most important transaction was approving the 1954 tax rolls with a few minor changes. City property valuations total \$4,235,457 and with a \$190 tax rate collections this year are expected to be \$80,473.

Revisions one year ago were \$4,159,808 and the tax return was \$79,036.

The city office will begin collecting taxes on the current rolls October 1 and this will be continued through January, 1955.

The few changes made on the tax rolls were to take off some small items which had been assessed and later it was discovered the property had been moved out of the corporate limits.

No discussion was held on requirements of the state highway department for the construction of the new bridge across the Colorado River at the west end of Hutchings Avenue.

H. T. HODGE EXPIRES IN ABILENE HOSPITAL

H. T. Hodge, 85, pioneer West Texas theatre owner, died at Hendrick Memorial Hospital, Abilene, at 8:00 a. m. Wednesday after illness of only three days. He was owner and operator of the H. & H. Theatres.

Decedent was born in Alabama on October 16, 1868, and moved to Lee county, Texas, with his parents when he was only 4 years old. He moved to Abilene 40 years ago and entered the theatre business and had been in that business continuously since.

He was a member of the Evangelical Methodist Church of Abilene, and has served his church in many ways during his long life in Abilene. Funeral services will be held at the church at 3:00 p. m. today.

WEST TEXAS NOTES

There has been much discussion pro and con on the proposed parallel parking on Hutchings Avenue. Naturally, Ballinger officials are not too strong for the proposition as it will call for every meter to be taken up and moved and the respacing will reduce the number of parked cars about a third. Moving the meters will be expensive for one reason and too, many citizens have protested this kind of parking. However, this is one of the positive requirements of the state highway department if a new bridge is built across the Colorado River. A large number of permanent businesses located on Hutchings depend largely on the through traffic on this route. It is for this reason that requests were filed not to reroute the highway to skip the business district. Parallel parking is common in many towns. To obtain a driver's license, the operator must be able to parallel park and anyone who lets his license expire is required to take an examination and do this kind of parking. City and county officials are working as fast as possible to meet the requirements of the state highway engineers and definitely assure the new bridge and highway improvements for this precinct.

A new tax paying season begins tomorrow and three offices here are ready to take payments. Usually, payments in October are the highest of any month of the year because the larger concerns desire to clear their tax bills as soon as possible and because the state and county offer a 3 per cent discount in October. Receipts have been made up and the three collecting offices are prepared to begin issuing them tomorrow morning. Tax paying will continue through January, giving property owners four months in which to call at the collectors' offices.

Much of the time of local enforcement officers is being taken with the apprehension and prosecution of people issuing and cashing worthless checks. In recent months there have been numerous complaints

The 50th anniversary of the Rowena Sons of Herman Lodge was celebrated at the hall Sunday. The Rowena lodge was organized in December, 1904, and has functioned continuously since that time. Paul J. Herting, grand secretary, was the main speaker for the anniversary program. Four charter members, Henry Backhaus, Louis Strube, W. A. Schumann and August Zenner, attended the meeting Sunday. Construction of the lodge hall was started in 1910 and it has served as a community meeting place many years. In 1925 lodges in Ballinger, Miles, Winters and Abilene merged with the Rowena group.

Jay Hicks marketed the first 1954 peanuts at Comanche last week. The 43 bags weighed 1,400 pounds and graded a little under the standard of 70 which has a support price of \$2.37 per bushel and a loan value of \$2.28. Buyers and farmers stated that the prospects for the crop in Comanche county are poor this year due to dry weather. In a few isolated spots that received showers at the right time fair yields of nuts and hay will be harvested.

October 5 is the date scheduled for the opening of the new livestock show and feeding barn at Winters. The Winters Livestock and Agriculture Association is sponsoring an open house, including a program of entertainment and refreshments. The program will begin at 7:30 p. m. and visitors may come and go as they please. The new barn will be used by 4-H club and FFA boys of the Winters section and the annual livestock show will be held in the barn each January. Free labor helped to construct the building.
