## Three Oil Producers Reported for County

Vincent & Welch, Inc., No. 17-Myrtle Taylor, one location from production on the south-western side of the South Crews (upper Gardner) field, has been completed for a daily flowing potential of 333.36 barrels of 42 gravity oil. The potential was based on an actual 10-hour flow. The pay section was topped at 3,851 feet.

The Sanford (Fry sand) field has gained its second producer and a southwestern extension with finaling of Gulf Oil Corp. No. 1A-M. R. Smith for a daily potential of 426.88 barrels of 42.8 gravity oil. The potential was based on a 6-hour flow after the well was finaling and perforations made between 4,506 and 4,538 feet.

The Pace (Fry sand) field has been extended one location south with completion of G. W. Strake No. 1W-Stevens Estate for a daily flowing potential of 55.03 barrels of 42 gravity oil. Top of pay was picked at 4,418 feet.

Humble Oil & Refining Co.

No. 1-Maud Vancil, 1 1/2 miles west of Hatchel, was being drilled the first of the week below 2,000 feet. This is a deep test, the drilling permit calling for 5,500 feet.

A. W. Cherry No. 1-Hamp Byler, four miles northwest of Ballinger and just west of the Byler place, is being drilled below 2,000 feet. The contract is to the West Texas Drilling Co.

Thomas D. Humphrey & Sons No. 1-W. A. Ashton has been completed for a daily pumping potential of 21 barrels of 36.4 gravity oil. The location is six miles northeast of Ballinger. Production is from the Serratt sand and operators will ask for a discovery allowable and a new field designation.

Thomas D. Humphrey & Sons No. 1D-C. B. Spill is projected for 4,300 feet in the Spill (Palo Pinto) field, eight miles east of Winters. The field opener was brought in on May 23, 1952, with top of pay at 3,376 feet.

## Harry Lynn Now On Bank's Staff; No Changes Made

Harry Lynn has returned to the First National Bank staff as active vice-president. This action was made official at a meeting of the board of directors Tuesday afternoon. Mr. Lynn has been at the bank since the illness of R. G. Erwin, president, some three weeks ago.

Mr. Lynn was connected with the bank from 1909 until 1947, when he retired to engage in farming and ranching and later in the operation of a commercial dairy. From 1947 until now he has been closely associated with the bank, serving as a director and on the loan and discount committee.

The return of Mr. Lynn to the banking staff will not affect any other positions in the bank and he will be added to take part of the strain off the present force.

Mr. Erwin expects to return to the bank this week-end and will office on the opposite side of the building from where he has been located for many years. New furniture has been purchased for the offices by Mr. Lynn and Joe Forman, cashier.

Ballinger hunters will leave this week-end and through Monday for their hunting leases. This is the deer season for this region and each year a large number from here try their luck in the ranches to the south and west of Ballinger where deer and turkeys are found.

The season will open Tuesday morning of next week and most local groups plan to have their camps ready and time to rest before the opening. Several made week-end trips to prepare their camps.

The Nine-Point Hunting Club will again be on the lease members have hunted on for a number of years in Mason county. The camp has been ready for some time and while the drought has made hunting less desirable, the full membership will be there for the opening of the season. Members are W. O. Wallace, Chester Cherry, M. A. Foy, J. G. Tackey, E. C. Grindstaff, Jim Dankworth, Malcolm Morgan, D. G. Posey, E. T. Branham and Clyde Gabbert.

Tom Caudle will be joined here by his son, David Caudle of Lovington, New Mexico; and a brother, E. B. Caudle, of Odessa, for a trip to Mason county. They plan to leave here early Monday morning and to spend a week or more on their lease.

O. L. Huddleston, Clifford Cook, George Newby, Earl Barr and Max McCrary, Jr. will leave Monday for their lease, located 40 miles south of Rock Springs. McCrary will be camp cook for the four hunters during the week. This lease has had fine rains and there is plenty of green grass, acorns and other food for the deer. ## Commissioners Hear Road Plea; Votes Canvassed

The Runnels county commissioners' court was in session all day Monday and did not get all business finished. A committee of citizens appeared before the court in regard to the designation of a farm-to-market road, south from Rowena towards Olfen. This road is commonly known as the Rowena-Olfen cemetery road. Members of the court explained that the county commissioners did not make the designations and that such action would have to come from the state highway department.

The election returns were canvassed by the court and a report will be sent to Austin. The need of a jury room for women was discussed and the court will try to get space for this room somewhere in the court house. The passage of the state amendment makes it the duty of women to serve on juries and no room is available in the Runnels county court house for taking care of jurors other than men.

The Ballinger quintet demonstrated the selection of breeding Rambouillet sheep suitable for this part of West Texas. ## Four-Year Terms For Six Officials Start January 1

State constitutional amendments approved in the general election November 2 assure six Runnels county officials four-year terms, beginning January 1. The remainder of the officials will serve two-year terms but at the next election will be named for four years. This was set up so that an election would be held every two years and county officials staggered so that no completely new crew would ever be elected the same year.

Those who will begin four-year terms on January 1 are: W. H. Rumpy, county judge; Willie Stephens, district clerk; Frankie Berryman, county clerk; Price Middleton, county treasurer; Fred Bedford, commissioner, precinct 2; Paul Gordon, commissioner, precinct 4.

Those who will serve two-year terms commencing January 1, are: Don Atkins, sheriff; Dalton Crockett, tax assessor-collector; E. C. Grindstaff, district attorney; O. L. Parish, Jr., county attorney; Clyde Chapman, commissioner, precinct No. 1; Bill Harmon, commissioner, precinct 3.

All constables and justices of the peace will serve two-year terms.

## SHOWERS TO RAIN FALL OVER RUNNELS COUNTY

Moisture which fell in Runnels county Tuesday afternoon ranged from light showers to heavy rain. The Ballinger government gauge registered 3.8 of an inch, while just a few miles north of town an inch was reported.

## Construction Begins On Armory Building

R. L. Guyler, of Crystal City, general contractor for the Ballinger national guard armory, arrived Monday to start the construction.

The \$75,000 armory will be located on Crosson Avenue between Fifth and Third streets on land belonging to the city which was formerly occupied by the Harman Park housing project.

Mr. Guyler has let sub-contracts to the Ballinger Electric Co. for electrical work; to the Thompson Plumbing Co. for the plumbing; and to Halliburton Bros. for the painting.

An office has been moved to the location and a large concrete mixer was brought in Monday. A staff will be here at once to organize the work. The exact number of working days for the contract was not available.

The city commission made possible the site for the building when a group of army officers were here last summer

looking over locations. They only looked at the one site and complimented the city highly on the land offered.

Ballinger has maintained a strong national guard company for many years and at one time, just prior to World War II, was on the verge of securing an armory. Orders for mobilization caused those plans to be dropped and when the erection of these buildings was resumed a local application was filed.

The building here will be modern in every respect and will contain one large assembly auditorium which can be used for indoor drills. Officers will have offices, all men will have lockers and showers and the building will have a modern kitchen. There also will be small rooms for instruction and study. The site contains about three acres which has been deeded to the state by the city and an additional 10-acre tract which belongs to the federal government may be secured.

## Ballinger Guard Unit Gets Excellent Rating

The Ballinger national guard company has received notice of the rating made on federal inspection, conducted this year by Major Robert W. Davis, headquarters fourth army, Fort Sam Houston. For the fourth straight year the unit received the rating of excellent.

Major Davis commended the local unit for its high percentage of attendance at the past year, the high state of morale and appearance of men and the classes of instruction conducted on the night of inspection.

The unit was also notified that it had been awarded the silver certificate by the National Guard Bureau, Washington, D. C. for efficiency in training the

past year based on inspection of field training conducted last summer at Fort Hood.

James A. Witt was enlisted in the unit Monday night to bring the strength to 74 enlisted men and 6 officers. With the enlistment in two weeks, Pfc. Bobby J. Winans has taken the lead in the recruiting contest now underway. A number of prospects were present for the drill Monday night. Anyone interested in the national guard is invited to attend drills, conducted at the Bruce Field armory each Monday night. Here they can observe the training the men receive and inspect the type of equipment furnished the guardsmen.

## Quarters for Women Jurors Studied by Commissioners

County Judge W. H. Rumpy and members of the commissioners' court discussed taking care of women jurors at their meeting Monday. The passage of the state amendment making it compulsory that women serve on juries, brings a problem in this region in providing quarters for women who are selected to serve.

The court authorized the county judge to make investigations which will lead to providing suitable and convenient quarters for any women who serve on juries in this county.

Judge Rumpy stated Tuesday that in case of women being accepted for jury duty in the immediate future, a small number could be handled with present facilities. Referring to the long range program, he stated that it might be practical to use the third floor of the court house and added that if this is done an elevator would probably have to be installed.

At San Angelo Monday, an attorney sought to quash a jury panel because no women had been included.

The attorney general is due to make a statement in regard to women jurors within a short time. As the law is interpreted here at present, jurors in criminal cases must be kept together and this and a number of other questions will probably be clarified by the attorney general.

## Good Reports Heard At Firemen's Meeting

Ballinger firemen, their families, advisory members and a few other guests assembled at the fire station Friday night for the department's annual banquet and program.

R. E. Harris, incoming president, called the meeting to order and Chaplain A. O. Rue offered the invocation.

After the dinner, Mr. Harris presided for the program and business session which followed. New officers, advisory members and life members were presented.

T. W. McEntire gave the report of the recording secretary showing the department had an average membership of 25 during the past year. The firemen were called to 22 fires in the city limits, 17 outside the city and to 24 locations where no alarm was necessary. To date the fire loss has been held to \$22,075 on fires in which property insurance totalled \$132,000. Attendance at fires, drills and meetings during the year averaged 95 per cent.

Chief Charles Webb gave his report and named all special appointive positions as well as standing committees for the ensuing year. He stated that with good luck the loss could be held low enough to retain the good credit for another year. He also called attention to the fact that the year of the insurance commission does not end until December 31.

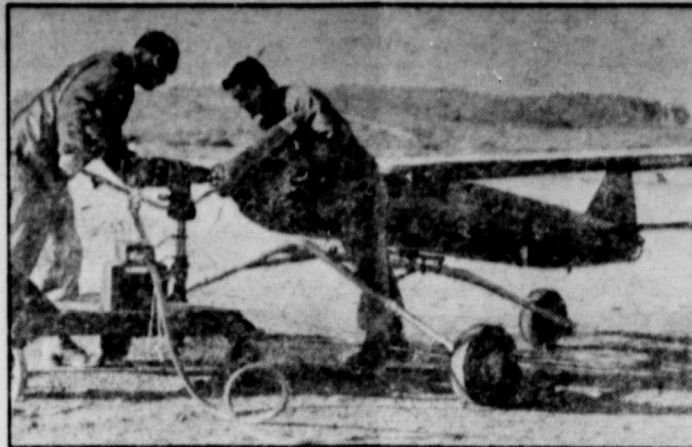
The same production team of

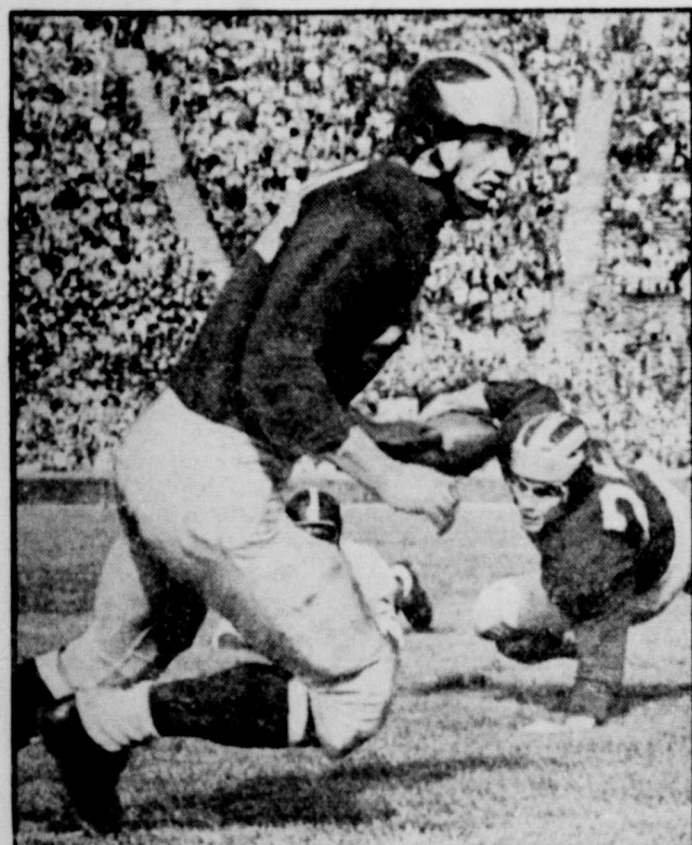

#### Traffic Tickets Still Numerous; Meters Get \$987

City traffic officers issued a total of 1,194 tickets for over-parking during October. This was an increase over the number issued in September when the 25 cents was first required on each ticket. Officers stated that drivers were becoming more negligent about keeping their meters out of the red and better cooperation is requested in the future. Unless conditions improve, the courtesy ticket may have to be rescinded.

Of the total tickets issued all but 210 were returned with the 25 cents enclosed. Notices of a \$1 fine were mailed to 115 and all of these have been returned except 35.

Police made 10 arrests in October and fines totaling \$129.60 were assessed. Fines collected amounted to \$163 which included some in arrears.

Seven accidents were reported in the city during October, damages totaling \$1,473.

Collections from parking meters for the month totalled \$987.

There was one fire in October, damages being reported at \$309.20.

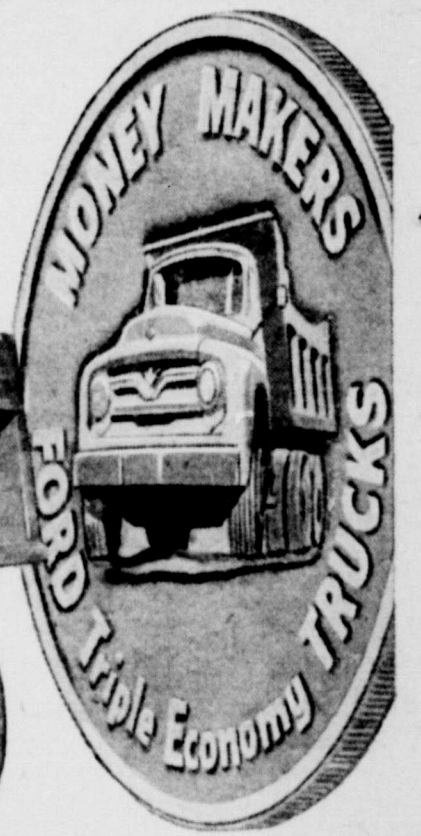
