

FOLLOWS: State Speed Laws Applicable The State traffic laws regu-The State traffic laws regu-lating the speed of vehicles shall be applicable upon all streets within this city, except as this ordinance, as authorized by State law, hereby declares and determines upon the basis of engineering and traffic investi-gation that certain speed regu-lations shall be applicable upon lations shall be applicable upon specified streets or in certain areas, in which event it shall be prima facie unlawful for any person to drive a vehicle at a speed in excess of any speed so declared in this ordinance when signs are in place giving notice thereof.




