A large number of farmers and ranchmen in the Runnels county soil conservation district have stated they are going to plant grasses this year on old fields and pastures.


John W. Moore, who has a place south of Norton, is going to reseed some of his rangeland. He stated that the drouth has killed some of his grass and he will plant sideoats grama, K. R. bluestem and try the new blue Panicum grass. The latter has not been used much in pastures in this section but Mr Moore will plant a small acreage to see how it will do. He pitted his land last year and this has made a good seedbed for planting grasses. He will use a drill for reseeding. The district owns drills which can be obtained at Norton, Winters and Olfen




