## Road Bond Election Big Issue in District

Voters in the southern part of Runnels County will go to the polling places Saturday, September 24, to approve or reject \$275,000 in bonds to be used in providing right-of-way for a long-range highway building program.


The overall project would provide improvement to some thirty-odd miles of highway, part of which would be divided into four lanes, seven miles of new highway, two bridges, a traffic circle and numerous other items. It is estimated that the state and federal dollars would be around five million dollars.

The state highway department has asked for right-of-way requirements in road district No. 3 of Runnels County. The county commissioners' court has estimated that the needs would require an expense of \$275,000 and this must be provided by the sale of bonds voted by the district.

A similar project was submitted to the voters on July 2, except that two propositions were stated instead of the one in the present election. On that occasion the tabulations failed to show the two-thirds majority needed to approve the bonds.

Pending the outcome of the voting on September 24, the state highway department has left all approved projects as they were and is ready to start three of these when the district meets the requirements. Should the voters fail to make the money available on September 24, the appropriations for local projects probably will be transferred to other counties in which projects are ready for construction. State engineers have told local citizens at mass meetings that the funds could not be held indefinitely.

Any adult living in the district who pays a tax to the county and state on any personal item or real estate and who is otherwise qualified may cast a ballot in the election.

## Court Requests County Water Pollution Survey

The Runnels County commissioners' court was in session all day Monday to transact routine and special business.

R. H. Weiss, assistant engineer for the state health department and associated with the water pollution advisory council, appeared before the court and explained the service which could be rendered. The court voted to request that a survey of water problems in several sections of the county be made at once. Mr. Weiss stated that a man would be sent here the latter part of this month to make an extensive survey and the results of his findings would be submitted to the court as soon as completed.

County Judge W. H. Rampy said he was in position to provide the engineer with a number of names of places to be included in the survey. He added that if there were property owners who would like for inspections to be made on their places, to leave their names and the location of their water supply at his office.

The survey will include the taking of samples from lakes, streams, tanks and wells and complete analyses will be made of the water.

The court set the rate for the current tax rolls at 72 cents on the \$100, the same as for last year. Division of the taxes is as follows:

- Jury fund, 1 1/2 cents
- Road and bridge fund, 20 1/2 cents
- General fund, 33 cents
- Permanent improvement fund, 3 1/2 cents
- Bond retirement fund, 13 1/2 cents

The court also approved the tax rates for the Offen, Norton and Miles school districts. The Miles rate was set at \$1.25, Norton at \$1.50 and Offen at \$1.50.

The court put a limit on office space in the court house and county buildings for county, state and federal agencies. This coincides with a law, preventing occupancy of county offices by outside firms and organizations.

Cal Adair was made chairman of precinct No. 1 and will have charge of holding elections in the area.

## Co-op Gin to Build \$25,000 Warehouse

The Ballinger Cooperative Gin & Elevator Co. has begun construction of a \$25,000 warehouse on Fourteenth Street between Park and Phillips avenues. The new building will be adjoining the company's other warehouse and will be 100 by 120 feet of corrugated iron construction with a paved floor.

Jack Fry, manager of the local plant, stated that farm labor was being used with a carpenter in charge of the job and that the warehouse would be completed in about three weeks. The floor space will take care of about 3,000 bales of cotton. The other warehouse is full of cotton at this time and the new building will accommodate this year's crop.

Clyde Wilkins received a city permit in the amount of \$1,300 for the addition of a den and carport at a residence on First Avenue between Eleventh and Twelfth streets.

Mrs. J. F. Currie received a permit for \$12,000 for improvements on her Ninth Street home. Brick will be removed from the house and replaced with Roman brick. A carport also will be added along with other improvements.

The city commission voted at its meeting Tuesday to purchase a lot adjoining the dump grounds to provide more space. The commission will ask for bids for leasing land at the airport.

## Humble Drilling Below 2,000 Feet; Johnson 6 Payer

Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 1-Walter Lange was being drilled below 2,000 feet the latter part of the week. The location is just south of the No. 1-Zappe, completed several weeks ago in new territory, six miles northwest of Ballinger.

The Enoch Johnson field has been extended with the completion of Henson Drilling Co. No. 6-Enoch Johnson, 11 miles northeast of Winters. It was finished for a daily calculated flow of 341.46 barrels of 42 gravity oil. Production is based on an actual 8-hour flow. Top of pay was found at 3,629 feet.

The Norton North (Gardner) field has been assured of a second producer and a 1/2-mile southwestern extension with the flowing of oil on a drillstem test of the M. C. Account No. 1-E L. Bryan. The location is four miles northeast of Norton. The project will be drilled on through the Gardner sand.

The Kendrick (Gardner) field has been assured a producer in Warren Oil Co. No. 1-C R. Kendrick, two miles northeast of Winters. On a drillstem test gas surfaced in 45 minutes and recovery of 220 feet of oil was made. Bottom of the hole is 4,600 feet.

Cherry Brothers, of Lubbock, have filed an application for a permit to drill their No. 2A-C. Minzenmayer, four miles north of Norton. The application calls for a 4,850-foot hole.

## BALLINGERITE'S MOTHER DIES IN DALLAS HOSPITAL







NOTES**

The Ballinger Chamber of Commerce is seeking a manager. For several months the chamber has been operated with a secretary in the office and most of the extra work being done by committees. This plan has worked well but with fall and winter ushering in most activities the directors think a manager is needed to look after projects. Local business men cannot always leave their work when a chamber project needs attention and several items are calendared soon which will require much time and effort. The directors favor a local man if he can meet the requirements. A committee of three was named to conduct interviews and report to the board when it has a recommendation. To properly function with a manager on duty the chamber needs more members and a larger budget. It is believed the budget can be increased when a manager is employed and a definite work program adopted. Fall and Christmas time activities call for much work by the chamber and it is hoped to have someone employed soon.

Ballinger students got off to the usual smooth start last week. Preliminary planning by school officials had most of the work underway and registration and organization of classes required only a short time. Classwork began on regular schedule the second day and by the end of the week most of the special groups had been organized. While enrollment was slightly off the first day, attendance soon will be equal to that of last year. There was a drop in high school enrollment but an increase in other schools.

Dove hunters have reported the fewest number of birds in this area at the opening of the season in a number of years. Several weeks before September 1, there were many doves in the county but since the feed crop here is late, doves moved to other sections where harvesting has begun. Within a short time combines will be operated full blast in most fields of the county and when there is grain on the ground the doves are expected to return.

Additional blocks in Ballinger have been paved during the past few weeks. Eighth Street has been connected with the Bronte highway and most of the traffic to and from this direction will take this route. All streets around the football field have been surfaced and this will eliminate much dust. Other blocks on South Eighth, Sixth and Broad streets have

The new Boy Scout troop at Rowena held its first outing last week. Members with their leaders went to the Colorado River for games, training and a feed. B. G. Urbantke accompanied the thirteen boys on the outing. The Rowena troop was formed several weeks ago with the Lions Club as sponsors. A large number of boys have signed up in the troop, which has been registered.

The Miles Parent-Teacher Association held its first meeting of the new school year last week to greet the faculty. Paul Swanson, president of the school board, introduced each teacher, senior girls sang the favorite song of the teacher and presented each with a corsage or boutonniere in gold and blue, colors of the association. The hospitality committee served refreshments at a social hour. All adults, parents and teachers in the Miles district are being urged to join the organization this year and assist in the program which cooperates with the various departments of the school.

Coleman has been assured of plane service by Trans-Texas Airways, according to a statement at a hearing at Washington. The service will be granted on a temporary certificate, the length of service to be set at either one or three years. It has been explained that stations boarding or deplaning as many as 150 passengers will be granted permanent service while those with less will secure only temporary certificates. Trans-Texas last week completed its first year of carrying first-class mail from Coleman.

The explosion of the earth near Novice last week has attracted large crowds. The explosion was on the Jack Coker place, one and a half miles from Novice. Approximately one and a half acres erupted, throwing large rocks, some weighing 500 pounds, for a considerable distance. People in the vicinity were awakened by the terrific explosion and those who observed it stated that black dirt was mushroomed high into the air. Cause of the eruption is still unknown.

Blackwell is now getting water from Lake Sweetwater on Oak Creek. The first lake water arrived at Blackwell on September 1 after pipelines had been laid and an 80,000-gallon storage tank erected. City officials said 120 meters have been installed. Citizens had been working for some time to secure an adequate supply and recently the town was incor-

porated in order to install the system. Lake Sweetwater is 7 miles south of Blackwell. An unofficial ballot is being taken at Bronte on the proposed flood control project on Kickapoo Creek. A check-up at the end of the first week disclosed 53 favored the proposal and 2 opposed. The flood control project was proposed two years ago after a disastrous flood caused much damage in town. Soil conservation specialists say the project would eliminate flood danger.

Sitters in greater numbers flocked to Comanche County the past week and several new places were opened to serve sufferers. The first patient from across an ocean checked in at Gray's Wonderland Uranium Ranch last week when a father brought his four-year-old son from South America. Others from various points in the United States arrived to try the healing value of the dirt. Packaging and selling the dirt to be taken home made a rapid growth last week. The first dirt house at DeLeon was opened last week and a number of patrons were booked.

A new park, to make the geographical center of Texas, located 20 miles north of Brady, will be known as Heart of Texas Park. The land was purchased jointly by the city and county commissions and the deeds will be turned over to the state highway department for establishing and improving

the site. The highway committee of the Brady Chamber of Commerce has been pushing the project more than a year. The site comprises 6.08 acres and a landscape artist has already started plans for the state.

Plans are entering the final stage for the annual barbecue and party sponsored by the Eden Lions Club at Lee Pfleger Park. The date set is September 24 and tickets for adults are now on sale at 50 cents each. Children under school age will be fed free. Meat for the dinner is being contributed by stockmen of the area and will consist of beef, mutton and goat. Fifty per cent of the net proceeds will be retained by the club and 50 per cent put in the hospital fund.

The 1955 Erath County Fair will be held at Stephenville on September 21, 22, 23 and 24. The general chairman states that all features will be free except college and high school football games. Sixty-nine exhibits for businesses were assigned in the hall and two large tents have been rented. The Fort Hood Jeep Band will offer daily concerts and take part in parades.

The McDonald Gin turned out the first 1955 bale of cot-

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ton at Melvin last week. H. C. Broman was the producer of a regulation bale from 1,875 pounds of pulled cotton. The first bale is several weeks later than in 1954 when one was ginned on August 24. In spite of dry weather and insects, farmers of the Melvin area are expecting to gather a fair crop. Some have had to poison as many as five times to keep insects down but are under control at this time.



**Belts Important to Costume**

Your belt is an important accessory to your costume. If it is well made and the correct type for your figure proportions it will add a professional touch to your costume, according to extension service specialists.

A narrow belt tends to diminish the waist line while a wide one tends to increase it. A belt of contrasting materials tends to decrease the height of the figure.

If you are tall and slender, yet well proportioned, choose a wide belt of self or contrasting materials. If you are thin and short select a narrow belt of self or contrasting materials. If you are short and stout you will want to wear a slightly narrow belt of self material.


Study your figure proportions and select the best type of belt for you. A belt 3/4 to 1 inch wide of self material is a safe choice for most figures. This width may be increased or decreased according to the figure proportions, fashion and design of garment.





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# VOTE FOR PROGRESS AND SAFETY

## Highway Improvements Can Mean Both to the South Part of Runnels County

**Question—Do you have to own real estate to vote in the bond election September 24?**

**Answer—**You do not have to own real estate. You must pay either property or personal taxes but those who pay on a car, watch or any other personal property and are also qualified voters, may take part in the election. This question has been asked by a large number of people the past two weeks. If you have a poll tax receipt or you are over 60 years of age and pay any county and state tax, you may vote.

**Question—(A Ballinger man asks the following question in regard to city requirements.) "At the first meeting at the city hall, it was stated that the highway would go through Ballinger on Hutchings Avenue if the city would meet the state requirements. It was also stated that this would cost the city \$10,000. What are the requirements and how will this money be raised? Will the bond issue take care of all that too?"**

**Answer—**The city will be required to run a concrete curb on Hutchings Avenue from Tenth Street west to the city limits near the Colorado River bridge. Property owners would be asked to pay this cost. Parallel parking on Hutchings will require a change of parking meters and the city commission will pay this cost from the general fund. None of the bond money will be spent inside the city limits of Ballinger—it will be used strictly for securing additional right-of-way by the Runnels County commissioners' court.

**Question—Is there talk of other routes that might be improved and taken if the bond issue is not approved and Runnels County Roads are not improved?**

**Answer—**There have been discussions to this effect, but no actual statement from the state highway department. An east-west road between Winters and Bronte has been assured. This will provide a shorter route from Brownwood or Coleman to Bronte and from that point there are excellent roads to San Angelo, Abilene, Odessa, Big Spring, Midland, Sweetwater and many other points in West Texas. The other suggestion has been a highway south of Runnels County via Paint Rock which would give a shorter route from Brownwood to San Angelo than via Ballinger. The southern part of Runnels County can be definitely hurt by these routes.

**Question—Would the proposed highway program be safer?**

**Answer—**The proposed program is planned for

more highway safety and will eliminate what have been termed hazards. For many years a wider and straighter bridge across the Colorado River has been a goal of many local people, highway officials and the highway patrol. Many wrecks have occurred here which have cost lives, injured others and caused heavy property damage. Wider highways, some four lanes divided, would definitely reduce traffic accidents and would take care of a heavier traffic load. Narrow bridges and curves are reasons for a new route on highway 83 and this would be for the cause of safety.

**Question—(Received by mail)—If the highway is such a good thing, why are so many people opposed to it?**

**Answer—**We cannot answer for the individual voter. It is next to impossible to have any big progressive move which helps everyone and does no injury to anyone. People who would be asked to sell part of their land for right-of-way may feel that the damage done them personally is more than the benefit. There are others who have made investments along the highway in types of business which depend largely on through traffic for their living. Those who would be by-passed oppose the issue for personal reasons. There are others who are opposed to a slight increase in taxes which would be necessary to retire the bonds. Those favoring the issue believe that the spending of \$275,000 in county tax money in exchange for the spending of four to five millions of state and federal funds locally would be good business. They also favor improved highways which will increase traffic along the route and most of all in cutting down accidents which take a bigger toll in lives than all the wars in which this nation has engaged.

**Question—(Received by mail)—We understand that bonds were voted in 1928 in road district No. 3 and that there are still some \$97,000 unpaid. If bonds were voted in this election and the highway from Ballinger to Hatchel over the present route were turned back to the county, would the county have to pay the outstanding bonded indebtedness?**

**Answer—**More than half a million dollars in bonds were voted in the district in 1928. The state department is retiring these through an act of the legislature which is known as the bond assumption bill. The approval or rejection of the bond issue on September 24 would not have any effect on the amount still due. To make a change would require repealing this law and would involve every county in Texas.
