#### **Tests Show Guar Ups Production On Cotton Fields**

Recent checks made on the arms of William Moore and Morris Robinson, cooperators in the Runnels County soil conervation district, indicate that cotton following guar shows an increase of 20 to 40 per cent in production. The checks were made by William C. Swindle and other technicians working in

The Moore farm is located 13 miles northwest of Ballinger on the Bronte highway and the Robinson farm is 8 miles west

Swindle said that several checks were made on each of the places. On the Moore farm where no guar was planted last year cotton production was only 62 per cent as much as cotton following guar. Tests on the Robinson farm showed 67 per cent production where no guar was planted last year as on land where cotton followed guar.



The meeting was one of a series called by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to discuss the proposals for new cotton acreage allotments in South and West Texas. Fred Husbands. manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, told those gathered at Big Spring that the proposal would rut South and West Texas acressed about 280,000 acres and give that amount to Central and East Texas.

The cotton men voted to ask that the agricultural stabilization and conservation administration not apply a proposed new formula for state reserve acreage distribution until West Texans can state its position. Husbands asserted under the new proposal 256,011 acres would go to upgrade small farms of 15 acres or less and 134 075 acres would be set up to give an additional five acres to farms of 15 to 25 acres. He pointed out there were no farms

that small in West Texas. Mr. Farmer, manager of Ballinger Chamber of merce, was assisting local farmers Saturday in getting sample letters in the hands of cotton growers to be signed and sent to the ASC committee.


