Ballinger-Breck Tilt Set At Bearcat Field Friday

Ballinger and Breckenridge school officials met at Abilene Monday morning, agreed on game arrangements and then flipped a coin to see where the bi-district contest would be played. A Ballinger school man called "tails" and that was right and brought the game to Bearcat Field at 2:00 p. m. Friday afternoon.

Tickets went on sale at Breckenridge and Ballinger at 10:00 a. m. Tuesday and seats can be purchased here at the Pearce-Bailey Drug Store until 10:00 a. m. Friday. General admission tickets are on sale at all drug stores in Ballinger and student tickets were sold in the schools. General admission is \$1.25, reserved seats \$1.50 and seats will enter at 50 cents each.

The Breckenridge Buckaroos have won the state AAA championship two of the last three years. This year they were forced to return to AA because of reduced high school enrollment and have had little trouble winning in their district. They have only lost two games this season and both of these were to AAAA teams. The Abilene Eagles defeated the Bucks 13 to 0 and they also lost to the Wichita Falls eleven.

The Bearcats have lost one game but all their games have been against teams of their own AA class.

Ballinger school officials began making game arrangements as soon as they returned to Ballinger Sunday afternoon. Tickets and programs were printed at once and work at the park will make every available seat possible for the expected large crowd.

The Bearcats enter the game the underdog by a good margin but they went to the state finals two years ago when they were rated to be beaten by each opponent in the playoffs.

Coaches of both teams were anxious for the game to be played on Friday instead of Thanksgiving in order to give injured players another day to recover.

Refugee Program Group Chairman Named for County

The appointment of Mrs. J. W. Barr, of Ballinger, as local representative for the governor's committee for refugee aid has been announced by John H. Winters, state chairman. Mrs. Barr will act on behalf of the state committee in Runnels County.

Under the refugee act of 1953 214,000 displaced persons were declared admissible to this country. Recent figures disclose slightly over 43,000 have procured sponsors and migrated to the United States. Of this number it is estimated that less than 500 have come to Texas. To be successful in helping DPs get a new start in life, the refugee program will need assurance of 30,000 to 40,000 sponsors by early in 1956.

A sponsor is required to give assurance that the refugee will be given employment and housing and will not become a public charge. The refugee's qualifications to fill the job provided him are certified by official overseas. Many skilled craftsmen are looking for new homes in America.

\$3,216 in Cash Discovered In Bed of Stricken Negro

Sheriff Don Atkins was called to the home of Rufus Thompson, Ballinger negro, Monday to make an investigation. Earlier, Thompson had fallen at his home, striking his head and becoming unconscious. A doctor was summoned and he in turn called the sheriff.

After investigating, Sheriff Atkins was convinced that the injury was caused by the fall. A sister-in-law, Lottie Thomas, found two billfolds in Thompson's bed in which there was \$3,216 in currency. She told officers that she thought there was another billfold hidden about the place somewhere but it could not be found.

The money was deposited in a local bank to Thompson's account by the sheriff and the sister-in-law.

REGISTRATIONS LOW WITH AREA BOARDS

The chairman of the Coleman-Runnels draft board states that registrations of 18-year-old males has been low in this district during the fall. In October, 5,863 were registered in Texas.

Federal law requires men to register on their 18th birthday or within five days of that date. Under present regulations and policies, no one is drafted under the age of 21 except delinquents. Any man who fails to register, upon prosecution and conviction, is subject to fine up to \$10,000, or five years imprisonment, or both.

COTTON GINNINGS RUN HEAVY FOR PAST WEEK

Cotton ginnings in Runnels County the past week were the greatest for any week this season. Gins handled about 10,000 bales during the seven-day period and are still being operated at a fast rate. The total for the year to Tuesday was 19,137 bales. Gins in the northern part of the county had a season total of 9,075 bales and those in the southern part 10,060 bales.

Ginners said a large number of strippers were operated last week. There also are a large number of hands at work in the county and most of them were working last week.

There is still considerable cotton in the fields and it is estimated that the final total will be 21,000 to 22,000 bales.

Hoxsey-Holliday 2 May Offer Dual Production

Interest continues to center in the new Hatchel field with oil encountered in drillstem tests at two depths in Hoxsey Oil Co. No. 2-M Holliday. The tests were taken in the Jennings and Gardner sands. The well was bottomed at 4,120 feet and operators have run casing.

Tool was opened for 20 minutes in the Jennings and gas surfaced in one minute at an estimated rate of 3,000,000 cubic feet a day. Oil flowed in seven minutes at an estimated 20 barrels an hour. In the Gardner sand, gas surfaced in seven minutes and oil flowed to the surface in seven minutes. The new well is a 3/4 of a mile offset to Draper, Goodale & Wimmer No. 1-Maud Vancil, Gray sand producer.

In Draper, Goodale & Wimmer No. 2-Vancil shows of oil and gas were found in the Palo Pinto. Drilling is continuing to the Gray sand depth and the hole Monday was below 3,900 feet. Completion is due this week-end.

Hoxsey Oil Co. has moved a rig to the Maud Vancil place and started a new prospector northwest of production.

Warren D. Sorrels, of Fort Worth, No. 1-Hugo Vogelvang is a Gardner lime discovery, 4 miles east of Norton. In a 24-hour test it flowed 120 barrels of oil. Pay depth was topped at 4,440 feet.

Crealm Oil Co. has filed applications for permits to drill two 2,600-foot wildcats six miles southeast of Benoit. They will be the No. 1C- and 1B- Albert Spreen. Tours are due to start on the first well at once.

Paul E. Berry No. 4-Hugh Campbell was completed Sunday, casing run to the Palo Pinto and a gauge is due this week. Drillstem tests indicated production would be as good as

Water Board Officers Elected by Directors

The newly appointed directors of the Runnels County Water Improvement District met at the Acapulco Cafe Monday night and elected Ray Fuqua, of Ballinger, chairman. Joe Simmons, Miles banker, was elected secretary-treasurer and all directors were given the oath of office.

The board was appointed by the governor on November 8. County Judge W. H. Rampy administered the oath and presided at the business.

The dinner was served by the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce and Dick Ayers, president of the chamber, opened the meeting. He presented Price Middleton, water resources chairman, who started the plan to have Runnels County designated a water improvement district. The legislature passed a bill almost a year ago setting

up the district and specifying that a nine-man board be the governing body.

R. E. Bruce, member of the Upper Colorado River Authority, spoke on the availability of water in this area. C. T. Parker, county agent, spoke briefly in regard to the water problems of the county and the need of irrigation. A. J. Bishop, Jr., state representative, attended the meeting.

Directors present were Earl Barr and John Bradley, Ballinger; Joe Crockett, P. M. Davis, C. C. McKnight and Audra L. Mitchell, Winters; Joe Simmons, Miles, and Cecil Roper, Norton. There are two representatives on the board from each of the four county commissioner's precincts and one member at large.

The board will hold a meeting in the near future to make plans for work.

Several hunters were still out on their first trip to the Hill Country and a few came in with their limit. Others plan to go back to their leases later and have one more hunt before the end of the season.

In addition to those being processed at the locker plant, a number of other deer were left there for a short time and picked up by the hunters and taken to other towns.

The membership in the last two congregations served by Orland W. Rury was doubled and nothing short of this will be the goal for the church.

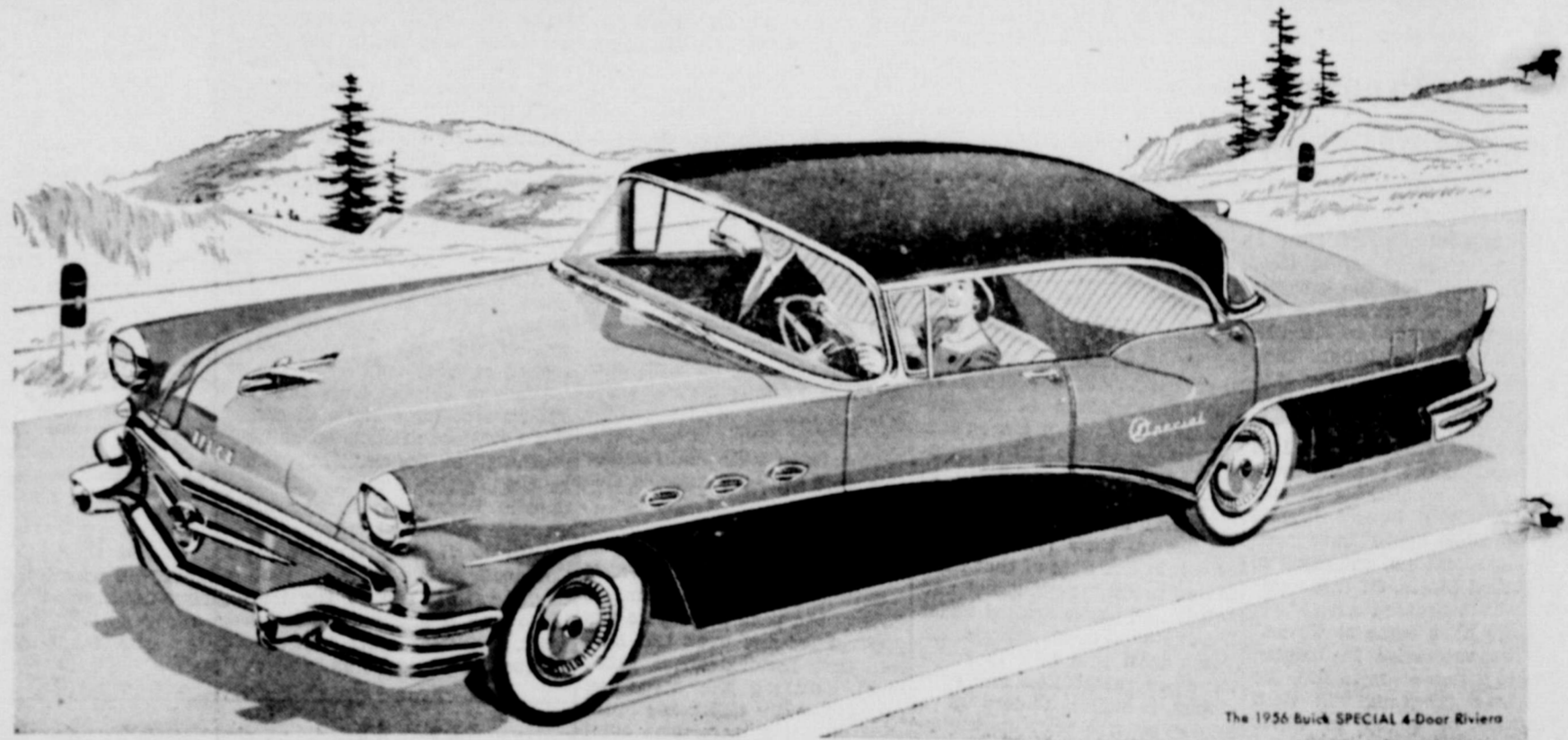

Bearcats Win District By Beating Blizzards

The Ballinger Bearcats took the Winters Blizzards, 13 to 0, Friday night to retain a tie for first place with the Brady team. The Ballinger team will represent the district in state playoff games, because the Bearcats defeated the Bulldogs earlier in the season in a regular district

contest. The Bearcats met a stubborn defense in the Blizzards and the first half ended scoreless. Twice the Ballinger boys looked like they were on their way, but each time a 15-yard penalty bogged them down and forced them to punt.

Opening the second half, the Bearcats were only one minute in getting a lead established. They received the kickoff and Dwayne Patton returned to the 2-yard line. On the first play, Charles Jackson came from his wing position, wide to the left, and with the aid of some excellent blocks went the remaining 71 yards to score. The extra point try was blocked and the Bearcats led 6 to 0.

The locals struck again in the third quarter when the visitors attempted to kick from deep in their end of the field. Glenn

Lisso partially blocked the kick and Charles Holloway scooped up the oval and sped into the end zone for the second score. Patton added the extra point from placement and the tabulation stood 13 to 0, which was all for the night.

The Bearcats suffered a severe loss when Wesley Stokes was taken from the game with several broken ribs. He will be lost to the team in the bi-district game. Don Roach, of Winters, also was taken to the hospital in an ambulance with a leg injury.

The Bearcats stayed on the ground most of the night to pile up 304 yards rushing. They attempted six passes and completed three for a total of 28 yards. First downs were 14 for Ballinger and 8 for Winters. The Ballingerites were assessed four penalties for 50 yards and the Winters boys four for 30 yards.

The crowd was probably the largest of the season, about 3,000 occupying the stands.

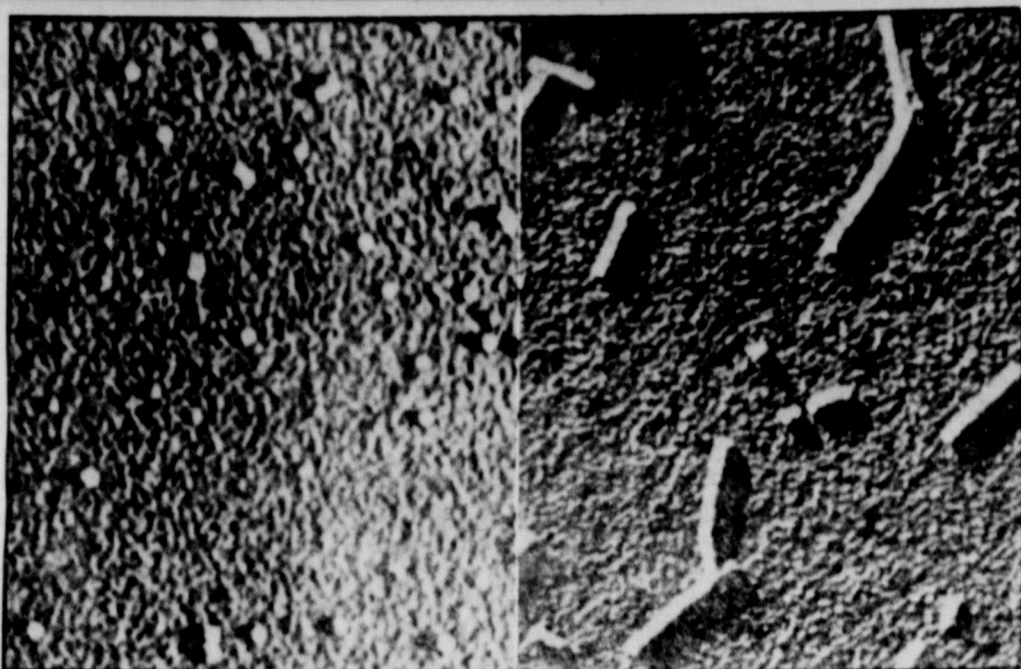

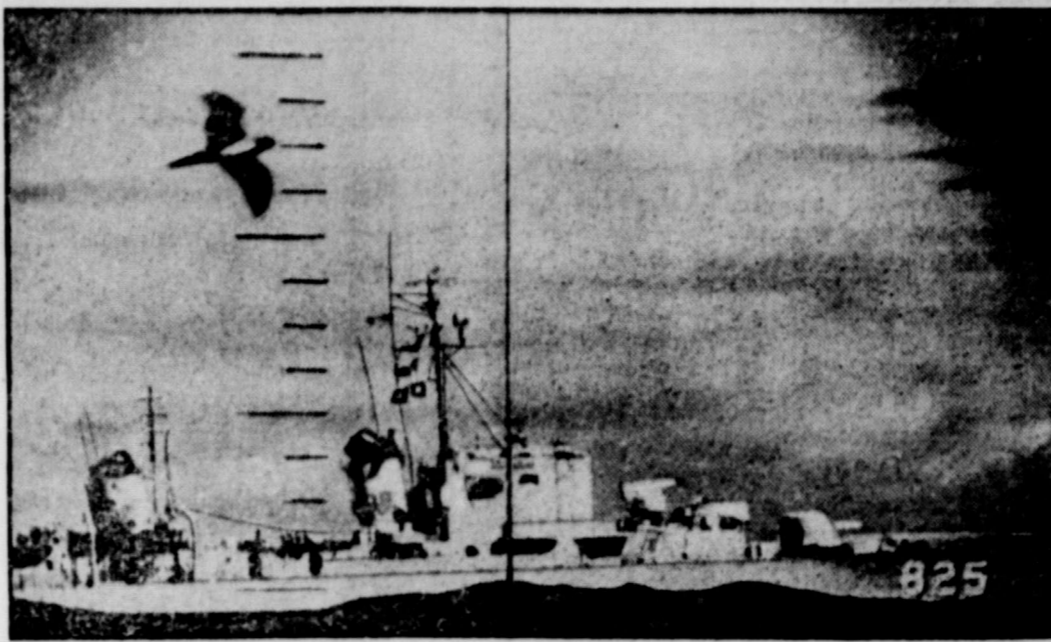

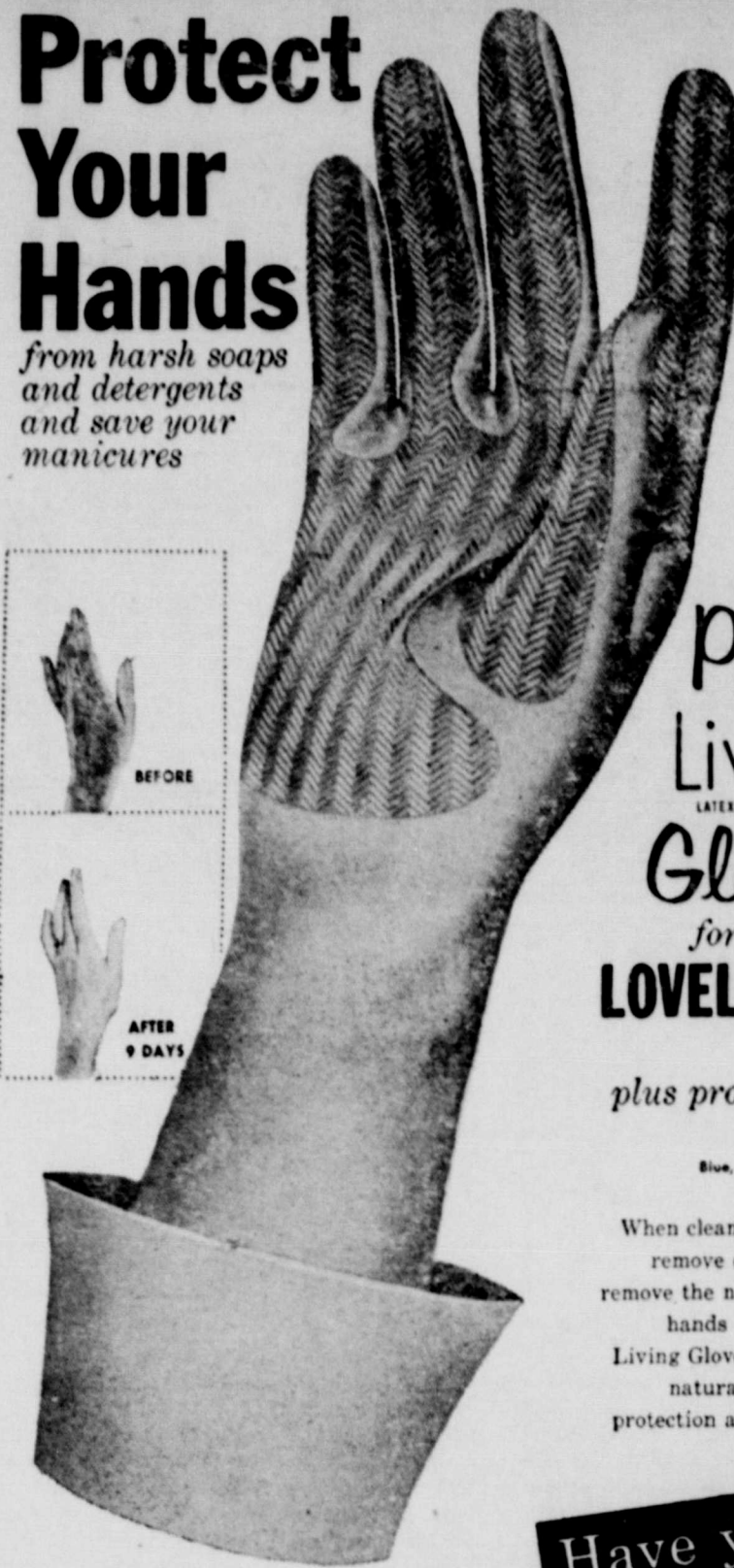
NEW WORLD'S RECORD CORN YIELD SET



A new world's record of 304.38 bushels of corn per acre has been made this year by Lamar Ratliff, 16 year old Prentiss County 4-H Club member. Lamar's variety was Funk's G-711. The rows were 30 inches apart with stalks eight inches apart in the drill. He fertilized the acre with 1,000 pounds of 14-14-14 mixed fertilizer and 200 pounds of ammonium nitrate under the crop, and 300 pounds of ammonium nitrate as side dressing. Lamar plowed the corn twice and no irrigation was practiced. Lamar says Funk's G-711 is the best corn he ever planted.

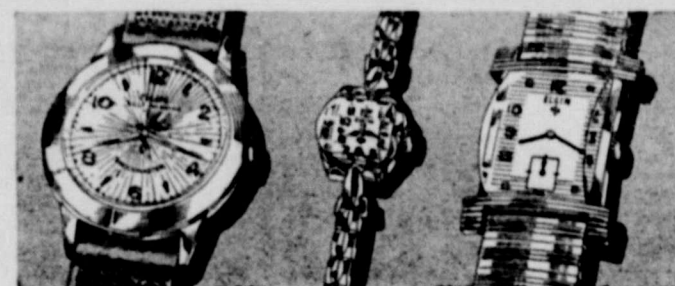

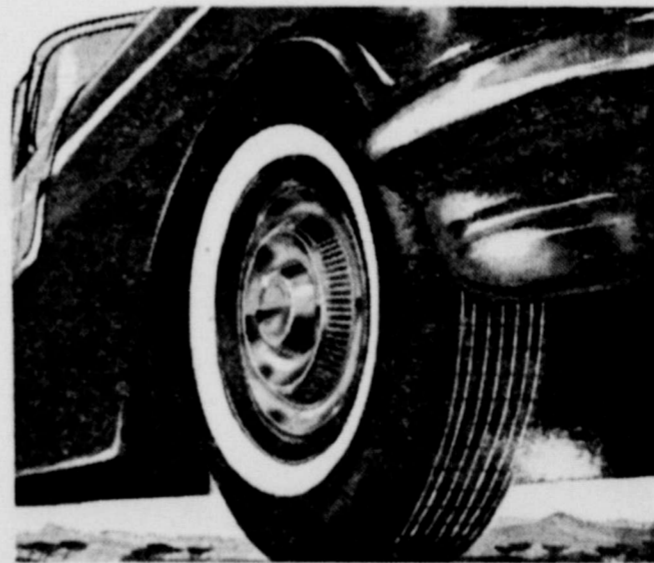
