## Contracts Let for Two County Road Projects

The state highway department has let two contracts for road work in Runnels County.

Farm-to-market road, 2133 starting one mile west of Ballinger, on highway 67 and extending 8.8 miles along the Colorado River and then south to Rowena was included in the letting. Part of this job is in commissioner's precinct No. 1 and the remainder in No. 4. Perry Construction Co., of San Antonio, was the successful bidder at \$108,471.

A four-mile road extending north from Crews to an intersection with the new Winters-Novice road also was let at

more than \$71,000.

Construction on both projects are to get underway in the near future.

The two Runnels County jobs were both expensive. The Ballinger-Rowena road will cost slightly over \$12,000 per mile while the Crews job will cost \$17,000 per mile. The contract includes grading, base, surfacing and drainage structures.

## Satterwhite Leaving Ballinger To Manage Brownfield C. C.

Mr. Satterwhite, implement dealer here for the past eight years, revealed Wednesday that he had accepted the position of manager of the Brownfield Chamber of Commerce and would begin his duties there on December 15. He stated Wednesday that he was not ready to state just what would be done with the Runnels County Implement Co. at this time. A representative of the Ford Tractor Company was here working with Mr. Satterwhite on this transaction.

The deal at Brownfield had been pending for several weeks since representatives of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce informed Mr. Satterwhite that he could have one of two important towns in Texas. Because of agriculture, livestock and oil in the Brownfield area, he decided to go there. The starting salary is \$6,000 a year and an advance is to come in April when the new budget is approved.

Mr. and Mrs. Satterwhite came to Ballinger on July 18, 1947, and he opened the Runnels County Implement Co. Since moving here they both have been very active in civic and church affairs and their accomplishments have been many.

Mr. Satterwhite is a past president of the Ballinger Lions Club, has served with the chamber of commerce in various posts, is a past president of the board of elders and deacons of the First Christian Church, active in the Runnels County Tuberculosis Association and has held numerous other civic positions. Perhaps his most outstanding work here was when he served as chairman of the 6-point agriculture committee and was a leader in sponsoring the Runnels County Livestock Show for a number of years. He has been active in various groups in improvement of the county's road program.

Mr. Satterwhite has been active in her church, in a number of clubs, in the council of United Church Women and is now serving as executive secretary of the Runnels County Tuberculosis Association.

Mr. Satterwhite will go to Brownfield within a few days to look after the purchasing of furnishing and office equipment for the chamber. The chamber is moving into new quarters this month and all the office will be new. He plans to return here later this month or at the first of the year to look after the transfer of his business.

Mr. and Mrs. Satterwhite both expressed regret at leaving Ballinger and stated they felt they had the best friends in the world here. Both stated they appreciated every kindness shown them and they would always keep a warm spot in their hearts for Ballinger.

## Court to Purchase Sheriff New Auto Following Wreck

The Runnels County commissioners' court held a called meeting Monday to dispose of emergency business. The court declared an emergency and asked local automobile dealers for bids without the usual advertising. The new car to be purchased will replace the one used by the sheriff which was demolished in the smash up early Sunday.

Dealers were called and asked to submit bids if they desired and these will be opened and a car purchased on December 8. An insurance adjuster was here and paid off for the policy carried on the car.

County Judge W. H. Rampy revealed at the meeting that each of the officers involved in the wreck was covered by a \$100,000 policy for medical care. In addition, some of them had hospitalization insurance which will be in force for the period in the hospital.

The court met with a number of land owners in precinct 3 in regard to acquiring additional right-of-way. After the meeting, Judge Rampy said that no agreement was reached on price.

## Elevator Shaft At Court House About Finished

Most of the preliminary work for the installation of an elevator in the court house has been completed. A hole has been cut in the hall of the ground floor to allow the elevator to sink to ground level and this has been walled with concrete tile and steel. Steel for the shaft is in place and only a little more can be done until the elevator arrives.

Shipment is due soon after the Christmas holidays and county officials expect it to arrive here early in January with a crew to install and put it in operation at that time.

A number of changes will be made in downstairs offices when the work is completed and most of the third floor will be put in service. This will give much needed room at the court house as most of the third floor has been vacant because of the long climb by stairs.

No announcement has been made as yet as to what offices will be moved, but members of the commissioners' court have discussed the changes.

## Oil Development Up In Ballinger Section

### McDaniel Charged In Traffic Death; Gordon Arrested

The grand jury for this term of 119th district court here concluded its investigations late Wednesday and returned an indictment of murder without malice against Arthur B. McDaniel in the death of Eugene Hall McDaniel on highway 67 early Sunday morning.

Mrs. Esther Mae Owens, held since the wreck as a material witness, was released from the county jail here Wednesday on \$1,000 bond. The third person in the death car, Lawrence Gordon, was brought here Wednesday and lodged in jail. Officers said they were holding Gordon for authorities in other counties.

The grand jury reindicted Herman Smith, of Big Lake; and Mrs. Sarah Lou Murray on charges of murder. District Attorney E. C. Grindstaff said the later indictments were to correct faulty language in the original indictments.

## MRS. BILLY DAVIS EN ROUTE OVERSEAS TO JOIN HUSBAND

Mrs. Billy Davis left Ballinger Friday, November 25, for New York, where she will visit her sister, Mrs. Charles F. Anderson, a week before boarding a plane for Frankfurt, Germany, on December 2.

Mrs. Davis will join her husband, Pvt. Billy Davis, who is stationed at Mannheim, where he has been since September.

Davis went into the service last April and was stationed at Fort Ord, California, before sailing for Germany. Mrs. Davis has been making home in Ballinger with her mother, Mrs. Clay Campbell, since her husband went overseas.

Oil operations in Runnels County, especially in the Ballinger area, continued strong the past week. There were a number of completions and locations.

Hoxsey Oil Co. No. 2-Mattie Holliday, near Hatchel, was completed from the lower Jennings as a producer. It flowed at the rate of 200 barrels a day through perforations between 4114 and 4120 feet. This is a stepout to production in the Ballinger (Gray sand) field.

Hoxsey Oil Co. will reenter its No. 1-Holliday, which was plugged and abandoned two weeks ago when no oil was found in the Gray sand. Drilling will go to the Jennings.

Draper, Goodale & Wimmer No. 2-Vancil has been finished in the Gray sand and casing and concrete have been run to gauge production. Storage is being arranged.

Hoxsey Oil Co. No. 1-Vancil is being drilled below 3,000 feet and pay probably will be reached the first of next week.

A. B. See Drilling Co. has made a location on the Allen Bros. place, two miles northwest of Ballinger, and Goree Drilling Co. has the contract for the hole. A rig has been moved to this location and tours started. Contract depth is 4,400 feet.

A. B. See Drilling Co. also has made a location on the R. B. Mack place, three miles northwest of Ballinger, for a 4,400-foot prospector, work to begin this week.

Interest continues high in Humble Oil & Refining Co. and Pan-American Production Co. No. 1-Ollie Wilde Mueller, Capps lime discovery, 1 1/2 miles east of Rowena. At present the well is shut in awaiting storage tanks. It kicked off after being swabbed three times and flowed, but no gauge was taken. Total depth is 3,730 feet.

Humble Oil & Refining Co. has a location for another well half a mile east of the discovery. It will be the company's No. 1-Victor R. Wilde and the contract depth is 5,500 feet.

Bert Fields, of Dallas, has filed an application for a permit to drill his No. 2-E. F. Bryan, one location west of production in the Norton, West (lower Fry) field. The contract calls for a depth of 4,900 feet.

Garret Production Co. No. 1-W. W. McKissack, five miles southeast of Crews, has been completed for a daily pumping potential of 17.17 barrels of 39.1 gravity oil. Top of pay is 3,618 feet.

Mar-Tex Oil & Gas Co. No. 1A-F. A. Bryan, four miles northeast of Norton, has been finished for a daily flowing potential of 126.43 barrels of 47.5 gravity oil. Top of pay was found at 4,356 feet.

M. C. Account has filed an application for a permit to drill his No. 3-A. C. Minzenmayer, a stepout in the Norton, North (Gardner lime) field, five miles northeast of Norton. The application calls for a 4,800-foot hole.

Lee Brothers, of Maverick, No. 2-E. F. Bryan will be a 4,800-foot try in the Norton, North (Gardner lime) field.

Gulf Oil Corp. has filed an application for a permit to drill its No. 2-W. D. Rogers on the south side of the Sanford (Fry) field, one mile northeast of Wingate. The depth given in the application is 4,600 feet.

Investors Production Co. No. 1-Claud Brookshier will be drilled to 3,000 feet in the P.W.C. (Serratt) field. The drilling site is one location southwest of production.

## One Man Killed, Four Injured In Traffic Crashes Near Here

### Parker Appointed Department Head Of Ft. Worth Show

C. T. Parker, Runnels County farm agent, has been named one of the department superintendents for the 1956 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, Fort Worth. Two other county agents also were named to serve during the 1956 show.

Parker will superintend three departments, Brahman, Santa Gertrudis and Brangus, the last named to be shown at Fort Worth competitively for the first time. While a Future Farmer in the May high school, Parker, with savings from previous projects, bought two registered Hereford heifers and now has an outstanding herd.

At one time he was a registered Angus, as well as a registered Hereford breeder and was a director of the Northwest Texas Association for the two groups. He has been a successful exhibitor and supervisor at major shows.

At the Houston show, honors won by his students included the champion Angus steer and the champion Poland China barrow. He is a Texas A. & M. graduate and has served as county agent at Seguin and Carthage. He recently held a position with Burrus Feed Mills as beef cattle feed specialist before becoming agricultural agent for this county.

Two separate highway wrecks at the same place, 5 miles west of Ballinger on highway 67, early Sunday caused the death of one man and serious injuries to four others.

Three peace officers investigating the first crash were seriously hurt in the second collision and are in the Ballinger Clinic-Hospital. Sheriff Don Atkins sustained six broken ribs, a punctured lung and other injuries. He underwent surgery Sunday morning and drainage tubes were attached to the lung. State Highway Patrolman M. E. Gotcher had several broken vertebrae in the upper part of his spine. Justice of the Peace Earl Cope sustained head and face injuries and bruises about the body.

Directors of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce will meet Monday night for very important business. Dick Ayers, chamber president, urges that all directors be present if at all possible.

The finishing touches will be made on the Christmas parade and program for the afternoon of December 10. The Jaycee-Eltes have agreed to take the candy for Santa Claus that afternoon and the exact line of march for the parade will be mapped.

The nominating committee will also report on the eleven names to be put on the ballot for the election of the new directors. The eleven new men, to serve a two-year term, will be elected in December on a post-card ballot.

Plans will also be discussed for the annual banquet and program. A report on plans for the annual livestock show will be submitted along with the proposed plan for erecting highway signs.

Several committee reports will be heard and other items of new business will be presented. This will be the last meeting for eleven retiring directors who have served the past two years.

## Christmas Bonds And Seals Mailed To Area Citizens

The Runnels County Tuberculosis Association has mailed more than 3,000 letters to citizens of Runnels County with Christmas seals and bonds enclosed. This is the annual campaign to raise funds for conducting activities the next year.

A large number of firms have received letters containing bonds and each is asked to send a check for the amount of the bond to the treasurer.

Individuals have been mailed letters with Christmas seals enclosed. These seals are worth \$1 a sheet and each recipient is to remit that amount to the association. This is the only way the association is supported for the year.

For many years the association has conducted a full program in this county. It makes chest X-rays possible for all adults and patch tests in the county's schools. In this way a number of cases of tuberculosis are diagnosed early and treatment given to perfect cures. It also has aided in getting tubercular patients in hospitals for treatment.

Those who have received letters are urged to send checks as soon as possible so the campaign can be concluded on time and annual reports made.

Those who buy Christmas seals are asked to use them on their packages during the holiday season and to put one on each card mailed.

## HUNTERS BAG DEER IN BROWN COUNTY

George Newby and Earl Barr returned Tuesday afternoon from the Barr ranch in Brown County with two large bucks. Newby bagged a 14-point buck which dressed 110 pounds and was one of the largest seen in the vicinity this year. Barr killed an 8-pointer and the hunters made their kills within a few minutes of each other.

McDaniel, 44-year-old Lampasas ranch foreman, was discovered by Miss Flora Lee King, who delivers the San Angelo Times to Ballinger early each morning. After finding the body by the side of the road, she reported to Ballinger authorities and an investigation was begun. The call for an ambulance was received about 4:30 a. m.

Allen Davis, in a Newby-Lewis ambulance, said when he arrived the dead man was lying off the pavement on the north side of the highway several yards from his pickup and trailer on the opposite side of the highway. Mr. Davis turned the ambulance around, headed back towards Ballinger and well off the highway near the dead man. Later the sheriff and other officers arrived and also turned around, parking next to the ambulance at the edge of the pavement.

Sheriff Atkins, Patrolman Gotcher and Justice of Peace Cope were in the sheriff's car sending shortwave radio messages and Mr. Davis had just set a flare on the highway and returned to the sheriff's car and was preparing to get in the rear seat when he saw a car coming at a high rate of speed. He ran towards the north bar ditch and glanced back over his shoulder to see the speeding car crash head on into the sheriff's car, then sidewise the ambulance and come to a stop quite a distance down the highway.

District Attorney E. C. Grindstaff arrived about a minute after the crash and with two ambulances on the scene, Atkins and Gotcher were rushed to the hospital. Other ambulances arrived shortly and took Cope and the driver of the speeding car, V. A. Bland, of Temple to the hospital here. Bland was later moved to a Temple hospital. No charges were filed against Bland, pending outcome of the officers' inquiries.

Arthur B. McDaniel, 34, no relation of the dead man, was arrested at San Angelo later Sunday morning and made a statement in which he admitted he was the driver of the car which hit the victim. A charge of murder without malice was filed against him and his bond was set by County Judge W. H. Rampy at \$2,000.

State Highway Patrolman Joe Perry was en route to Ballinger Sunday morning when he spotted a car by the side of the road with a damaged left fender. On closer inspection he found blood, matted hair and an imprint on the fender of the abandoned car. On checking the registration it was found that the driver was staying at San Angelo and he was located at his hotel room. In a deposition he told officers the accident occurred about 1:00 a. m. Sunday as he and two friends were en route to Baird. Mrs. Esther Mae Owens, one of his companions, was held in the county jail here as a material witness. Her bond was set at \$1,000.

McDaniel stated that he could not have prevented hitting the ranch foreman, that the first thing he knew the man was just in front of his car. He stopped and went back to the victim and found him dead. After that he returned to his car and drove on to Ballinger to spend the night. The other man in the car continued on to Baird and he and Miss Owens returned to San Angelo. He said his car broke down near the scene of the accident and he and Miss Owens hitch-hiked to San Angelo.

Eugene Hall McDaniel was returning home from California, where he had gone to deliver horses for his employer, W. Wessman. His body was removed Sunday to the Davis-Morris Funeral Home, Brownwood.

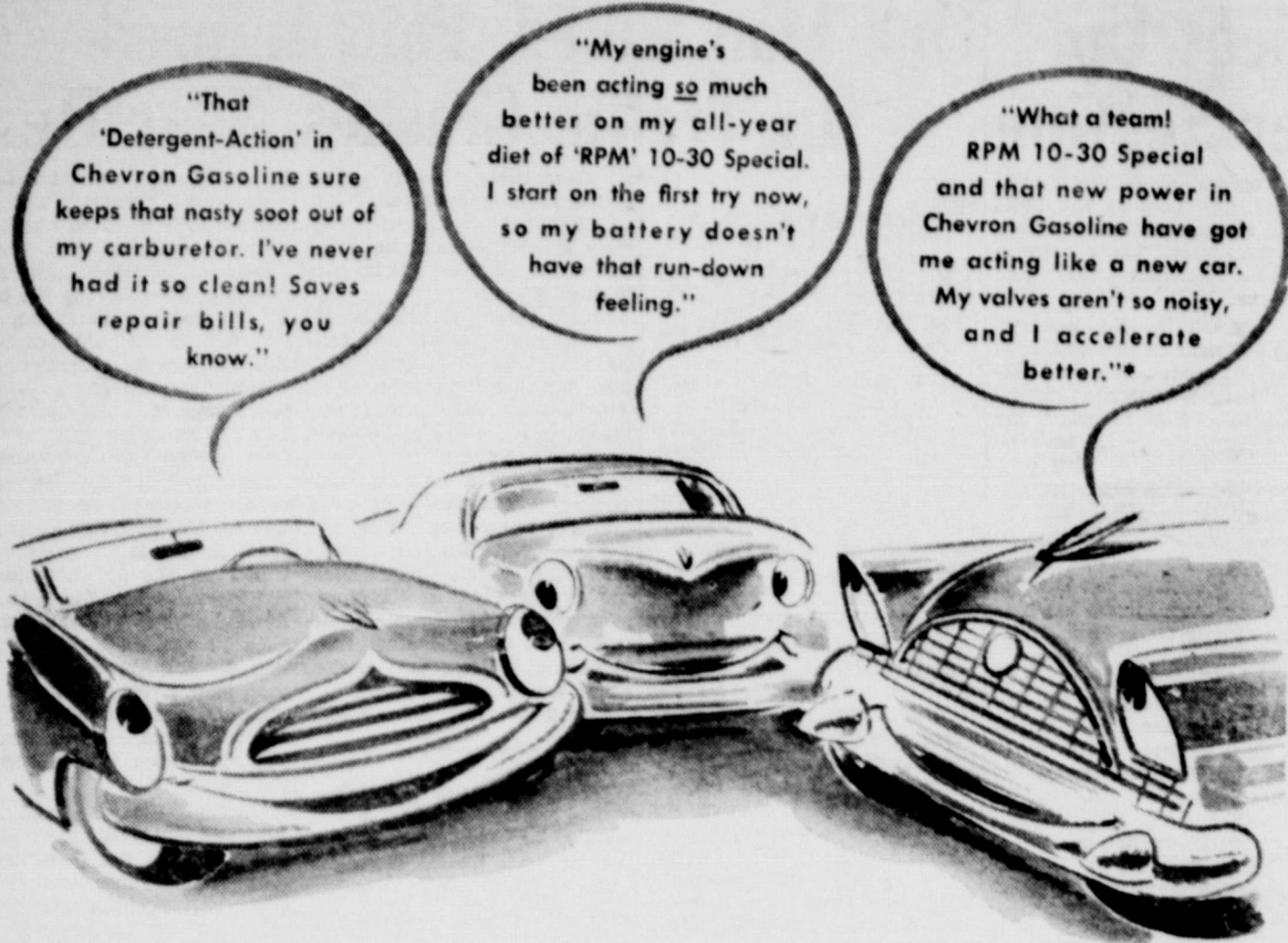

The county agent and home demonstration agent were both busy getting out their annual reports which had to be filed with the extension service by the end of the month.

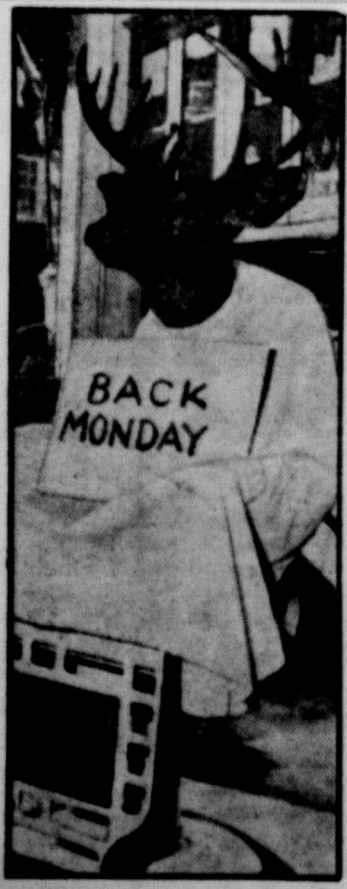

## Bearcats Finish Season With Loss to Breck 11

The Ballinger Bearcats ended the 1955 football season Friday afternoon, going down to the powerful Breckenridge Buckaroos 20 to 6. The red and black boys finished in a blaze of glory as they fought the more experienced crew to a standstill until the second half.

The Bearcats drew first blood after Jackson intercepted a Breckenridge pass on the 30-yard line. They drove down field to the 4 from where Dwayne Patton carried over through the line. Patton attempted the extra point but missed.

The Bearcats continued to play headsup defense and finished the first half leading by the score of 6 to 0.

The Bucks pushed a drive downfield in the third quarter but apparently were stalled until the Ballinger team drew a 15-yard penalty to put the ball on the 1-yard line. Bennett Watts carried over on a line play and Buddy Hamilton crashed off tackle for the extra point to put the Buckaroos ahead 7 to 6.

Again in the third quarter the Breckenridge team carried on sustained drives to the Ballinger 4 and Hamilton went the rest of the way around left end. Watts converted by going over center for the extra point.

A blocked Ballinger punt set up the final score. The Buckaroos took the oval on the 20-yard line and after a first down on the 4, Watts carried the rest of the way for the counter. A line play failed for the extra point.

In the waning minutes of play, the Bearcats tried to get an offense rolling but were forced to kick and the visitors run out the clock with line plays.

The Ballingerites held an edge on ground gained during the first half but were badly outclassed in the second half. Patton suffered a leg injury near the half and had to be used sparingly during the final period.

In ground gains the Bearcats had 132 yards to 224 for the Buckaroos. The Bearcats attempted 12 passes, had one intercepted and completed one for 1 yard. Breckenridge attempted 13, completed 4 for 67 yards and had three intercepted.

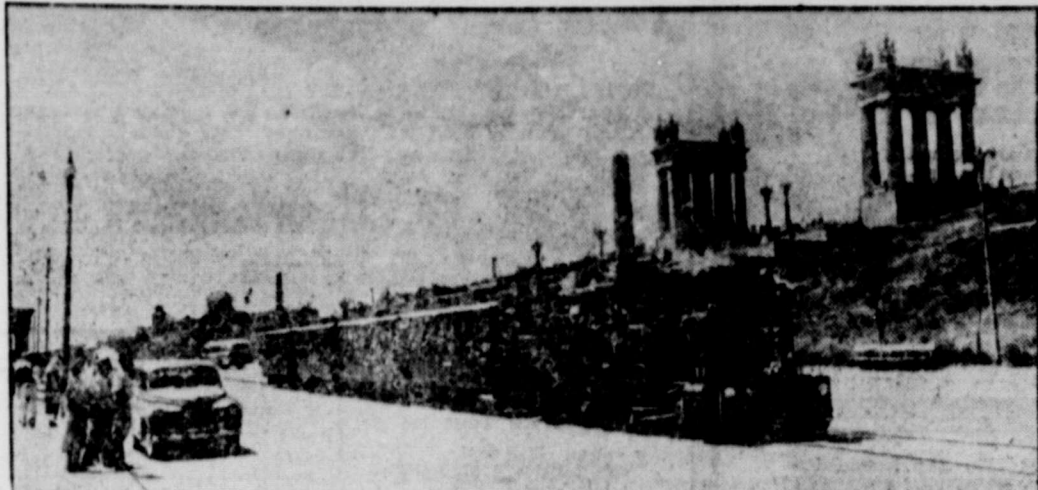

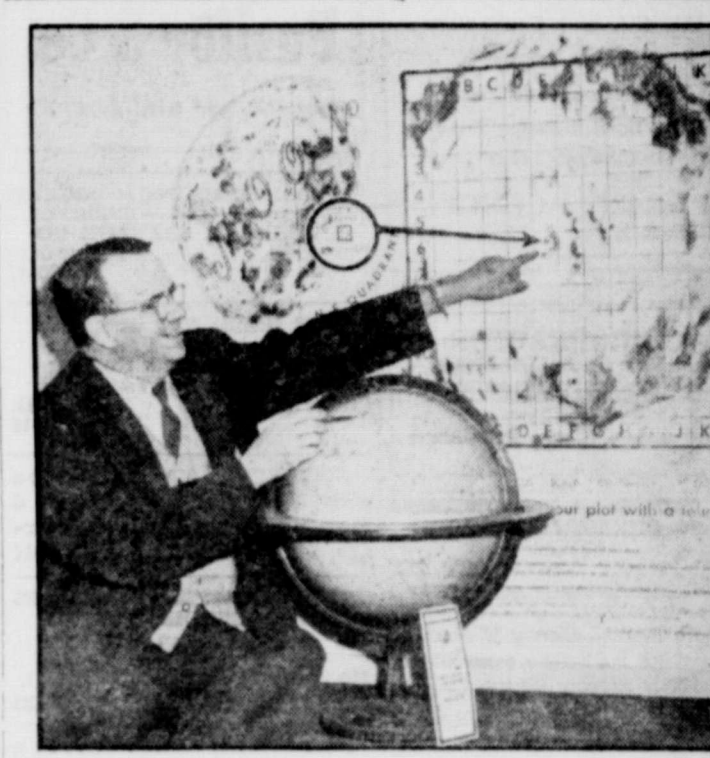

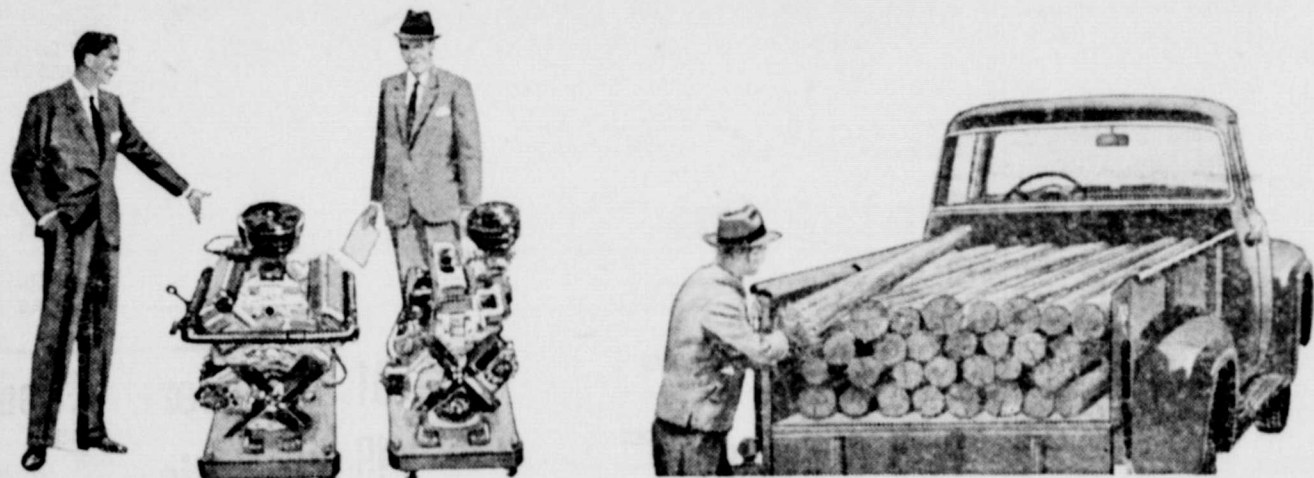
