





Grass Seed Shows Good Income for Farmers-Ranchers

According to information J. W. Purifoy furnished by the Runnels County Soil Conservation district, grass seed production can be a profitable business. The demand for grass seed has been increasing yearly. Rumors of the soil bank program, being considered by Congress, is affecting the market and seed prices are increasing. Grass seed production is new to the county district, but interest is increas-

Last year Bill Moore harvested 500 pounds of blue panirum seed on his Maverick place. Harold Mueller harvested about 1,100 pounds of blue panic from twelve acres. He says that a yield of 200 pounds per acre can easily be obtained by harvesting the crop several times during the growing season.

Technicians point out that farmers should consider the soil improvement that grasses about. 





He has it worked out to perfection and any changes we humans would make would harm rather than help. Concerning the human doctrines of the Pharisees and all such today, Christ said, "Thus ye have made the commandment of God of none effect by your tradition" Matthew 15:6.
