ay, lest any man should beguile you with enticing words. In verse 8: " Beware lest any man spoil you through philosophy and vain deceit, AFTER THE TRADITION OF MEN, after the rudiments of the world and not after Christ." To "beguile" is to delude, deceive, cheat, or to deprive by guile. Paul warns lest people be beguiled b ypretty speeches of false teachers (v. 6), "Spoil" as used in v. I means to rob or deprive of, to plunder. In other words religious people can be beguiled and robbed of salvation and spiritual blessings. How? The last portion of v. 8 shows that it can happen by human religious philosophies and by doctrines of men. In v. 18 he warns them again: "Let no main beguile you of your reward . . ." and shows that false doctrines, such as angel worship and false teachers such as those who have to force an appearance of humility and try to teach "things which he hath not seen," will rob them of their reward. In verse 20-22 Paul rebukes some of the Colossians for trying to be Christians and at the same time be "subject to ordinances . . . after the commandments and doctrines of men." He asks them why they are subject to human doctrines. The parenthesis of verse 21 gives examples of such human doctrines. In verse 23 speaking of these human doctrines he says "Which things have indeed a show of wisdom in will-worship, and humility and neglecting of the body; not in any honor to the satisfying of the flesh." The American Revised Version translates the last part: "but are not of any value against the indulgence of the flesh." In other words human doctrines might appear or seem wise, but they are actually will-worship. A. Clark correctly defines will-worship as: "simply a mode of worship which a man chooses for himself, independently of the revelation which God has given." Paul says human doctrines are of no value in defeating the lusts of the flesh. Such human doctrines obviously would save no one. Willworship won't win.

In Titus 2:14 Paul warns the preacher Titus "Not giving heed to Jews fables, AND COMMANDMENTS OF MEN THAT TURN FROM THE TRUTH." He shows one of the many evils of the commandments of men, they TURN FROM THE TRUTH. Yet it is the TRUTH (John 17:17), the GOSPEL (Romans 1:16), that saves. How could human doctrines which TURN FROM THE TRUTH save? Certainly they cannot.

Not only did Paul know by inspiration but he knew from ad personal experience that human doctrines will not ave. He thought he was saved while following the human teachings of the Pharisees (Acts 23:1; 24:16; 26:9) but certainly none would say Paul was saved while persecuting the church, binding Christians, etc. He was sincere and realous in living up to human commandments but was lost while doing so just the same. He was not saved until he guit obeying human commands and started obeying divine

### **Peacetime Veteran Not Eligible For** Hospitalization

Peacetime veterans with no war service are NOT entitled to Veterans Administration hospitalization without serviceconnected disabilities, VA reported this week. VA said the only conditions

under which peacetime veterans may be admitted to VA hospitals are: (1) If they were discharged under other than dishonorable conditions for a disability incurred in line of duty; or, (2) If they are receiving VA compensation for a service-connected or serviceaggravated disability. Peacetime service for the

purposes of VA hospitalization s any period of service that ocurs before or after a war as lefined by the Congress.

Generally speaking, peace ime service for VA hospitalization fails between the follow ng dates:

November 12, 1918, when World War I ended for all except a few, and December 1941, when World War II is ieemed to have started. December 31, 1946, when World War II ended except for

a few, and June 27, 1950, when the Korean conflict is deemed to have started. January 31, 1955 when the

Korean conflict ended to the present time. Veterans who served only

during the foregoing periods are considered as peacetime veterans for the purposes of VA may be admitted to VA hospitals only if they meet the requirements established by Congress for these veterans.

Special eligibility requirements apply to peacetime veterans who have been RETIRED from active service. VA advised these veterans to check their eligibility status with VA if they should need hospital- The statement has further value ization.






