



A BRIEF VIEW OF THE BIBLE

The Bible contains 66 books-39 in the Old Testament and 27 in the New Testament, GENESIS tells of the creation. EXODUS gives the departure of Israel from Egyptian bondage. LEVITICUS deals with the Levitical priesthood. NUMBERS records the counting of the Israelites. DEUTE-RONOMY tells of the second giving of the law. JOSHUA describes the conquering of Canaan. JUDGES tells of Jewish history while ruled by judges. RUTH is a beautiful love story. 1 and 2 SAMUEL tells more history of Israel under the judges. 1 and 2 KINGS tells of Israel when reigned by kings. 1 and 2 CHRONICLES give some history of God's people from the creation to the Jews' return from Babylonian captivity. EZRA tells of the return from captivity and the rebuilding of the temple. NEHEMIAH relates the rebuilding of the walls of Jerusalem. ESTHER tells of a Jewish maiden who became queen of the ancient world and saved her people from destruction. JOB tells of Job's troubles and triumph. The PSALMS are a collection of Jewish hymns, prayers, and poems of David's time. PROV-ERBS is a collection of "wise sayings" by Solomon. ECCLESIASTES is a confession of some of the wrongs and experiences of Solomon. SONG OF SOLOMON propheticaltells of Christ's love for his church, ISAIAH, JERE MIAH, LAMENTATIONS, EZEKIEL, and DANIEL are called the major prophets. HOSEA, JOEL, AMOS, OBADIAH, JONAH, MICAH, NAHUM, HABAKKUK, ZEPHANIAH, HAG-GAI, ZACHARIAH, and MALACHI are the minor prophets Taking all these books of prophecy and teaching together we have some high ethical and moral principles coupled with requirements with God's people then. One major feature of these books is the prophecy, repeated often and in many forms, of the coming Messiah and the setting up

tion, the call of Abraham, the history of the Jews and God's laws and dealing with the Jews. His chosen people then. From Genesis 3:15 on, the Old Testament foretells the coming of Christ and many prophecies concerning him

The New Testament opens with arrival of that im-portant and long awaited event, the coming of Christ. MATTHEW, MARK, LUKE, and JOHN-the four gospelstell of the life of Christ and his preparation for the estabsome of the apostles. It opens with the establishment of the church on the day of Pentecost and gives numerous examples of conversions showing that people entered the church by hearing the gospel, believing in Christ, repenting of their sins, and being baptized for the remission of sins upon their confession of faith in Christ. The last part of Acts tells of the missionary journey of Paul. ROMANS, 1 and 2 CORINTHIANS, GALATIANS, EPHESIANS, PHILIP-PIANS, COLOSSIANS, 1 and 2 THESSALONIANS, 1 and 2 TIMOTHY, TITUS, PHILEMON, HEBREWS, JAMES, 1 and 2 PETER, 1, 2, and 3 JOHN, and JUDE are called the EPISTLES. They are all letters to the early church and to individuals and contain mainly instruction to the church and to Christians on how to worship and live the Christian life. The New Testament closes with the REVELATION, deep book showing the final triumph of right over wrong and giving a brief glimpse of both heaven and hell.

In brief then, the Old Testament gives God's laws and dealings with the Jews, gives their history, and points forward to the time when Christ will come and set up his kingdom. The New Testament opens with the coming of Christ and the establishment of his kingdom. Acts tells how to get into that kingdom. The epistles tell how to live in the kingdom, and Revelation tells of the future home of those faithful ones in the kingdom.

If you will keep in mind this brief view of the entire Bible it will be of great value in understanding the Bible and in "rightly dividing" it.
