Some time ago a hearing of the Texas Railroad Commission was held at Ballinger at which time the Santa Fe Railroad asked to discontinue service at Miles and close the depot there. 

## The Gospel of Christ

Rightly Dividing The Bible

Last week under this same title we learned that the Old Testament is divided into two dispensations, the Patriarchal and Mosaical. We saw that both of those laws have ended and that today we are under Christ's law. Hebrews 10:9-10 states: " . . . He taketh away the first, that he may establish the second. By the which will we are sanctified . ." Matthew 5:17, Colossians 2:14, Galatians 3:24-25 etc. show plainly that the law of Moses has been "fulfilled" or "accomplished," "taken out of the way," "nailed to the cross" and that "we are no longer under a schoolmaster (the law)." The Old Testament contains the record of God's laws and dealings with people under two ages that are past and gone forever. The Old Testament is inspired and the record therein is correct but the laws do not apply to people today in the Christian age. We are under Christ's law, not Moses' law. Christ is our authority (Matthew 28:18 Revised Version) not Moses (Romans 7:1-4). Moses himself said concerning Christ "... him shall ye hear in all things whatsoever he shall say unto you" Acts 3:22.

The laws of the Old Testament could be compared to the early laws of our state or nation. They are applicable to the people back then but many of them are now out-ofdate and abolished. Some of the early civil laws are still binding because they are needed and have been carried on 'till now. A few of the Old Testament laws (for-example nine of the ten commandments) are binding today, not be-cause they are in the Old Testament but because Christ has seen fit to restate them and incorporate them into his law. ONLY THE OLD TESTAMENT LAWS RESTATED IN THE NEW TESTAMENT ARE BINDING ON US TODAY.

It is sensible to enforce civil laws still on the statute books handed down from earlier years but it would be abstird to try to bind laws today that applied only to yester-years and have long since been abolished, for example vehicles from going over fifteen miles or twenty miles an hour. What would you think of an officer trying to enforce such old, out of date, abolished laws today? It would be just as absurd to try to bind the abolished laws of Moses on people today. What would you think of people going back to the abolished pioneer laws of Indian Territory days and trying to enforce them as civil laws today? What do you think of the practice of going to the abolished laws of the Old Testament for authority to disregard Sunday, and worship instead on Saturday, the seventh day? What is the difference in that and going to the abolished Old Testament laws for authority for sprinkling, infant church membership, instrumental music in worship, etc., today? What is the difference? Consistency and inspired Paul demand that if we bring over part of the old law we should bring over all of it (Galatians 5:3) and live as Jews.

Who is wise enough to know what portion of the Old Testament should be bound on Christians today? Christ alone! He restated all he desired in the perfect New Testament (2 Timothy 3:16-17; 2 Peter 1:3; James 1:25). We are warned against changing his perfect will, subtracting from, or adding to it (from the Old Testament or anywhere else) Revelation 22:18-19; 2 John 9; Galatians 1:8-9. Christ knew what he wanted in his will and he placed it Christ knew what he wanted in his will and he placed it there. Who is wise enough to improve upon Christ's per-

Paul shows the great danger of going to the law of Moses for religious authority today. He shows that it is spiritual adultery to be married to Christ (as Christians are) and then try to be loyal to the laws of the dead husband Moses too (Romans 7:1-4). Paul taught the Galatian Christians a lesson we need today. They (as some today) wanted to bind the Old Testament practice (circumcision) on people under the law of Christ. Paul told them they would void the benefits from Christ and that those who did such were fallen from grace (Galatians 5:1-4). Let us heed the warning and not be guilty of going to the Old Testament for religious practices today. CHRIST IS OUR AUTHORITY (Matthew 28:18 R. V.).
