Christ and His Law our Authority Today

In the past two lessons we have learned that the laws the Jews and that the Old Testament laws have been abolished (Colossians 2:14; Galatians 3:24-25; Hebrews 10:-

Paul says, "For the priesthood being changed there is made of necessity A CHANGE OF THE LAW" Hebrews 7:12. made of necessity A CHANGE OF THE LAW" Hebrews 7:12. The Levitical priesthood was changed so the law had to be changed. That was done; therefore it was said of Christ "... He taketh away the first, that he may establish the SECOND. BY THE WHICH WILL (Christ's will) WE ARE SANCTIFIED ... "Hebrews 10:9-10. Thus we see plainly that it it si by Christ's law (will), not Moses', that we are saved or sanctified today. Our last lesson showed that it is high-handed presumption, spiritual adultery, and falling from grace to go to the Old Testament for authority for religious practices today and that those who do such forfeit the blessings of Christ. (See Romans 7:1-4; Galatians 5:1-4). Moses once was the authority but Christ is our authority today.

A failure to heed Paul's exhortation to "rightly divide ... the word of truth" (2 Timothy 2:15) is one of the major causes of religious error and widespread confusion today. We can never understand the Bible or the plan of salvation unless we let the proper portions apply to the people God intended them to apply. If we don't "rightly divide" we may be building an ark, offering up a son, or burning animal sacrifices for our salvation today. It is impossible to mal sacrifices for our salvation today. It is impossible to live under two laws at once. When Bible students understand that we are not Jews before the time of Christ, that we are not under the Old Testament but the New Testa-ment today, they have taken a big step toward understand-

Hebrews 1:1-2 says "God who at sundry times and in Hebrews 1:1-2 says "God who at sundry times and in divers manners spake in time past unto the fathers by the prophets, hath IN THESE LAST DAYS SPOKEN UNTO US BY HIS SON . . " Chapters 1 to 5 and 7 to 10 of Hebrews show the superiority of Christ and his perfect law over Moses and his imperfect law. Even Moses recognized the authority of Christ to come when he said "HIM shall ye hear in all things whatsoever he shall say unto you" Acts 3:22.

At the Mount of Transfiguration Peter implied equality for Moses (the law), Elijah (the prophets) and Christ (the gospel), but God's voice corrected and instructed "... This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased; HEAR YE (not Moses or Elijah but) HIM" Matthew 17:5. Many need to learn that lesson today: "HEAR YE HIM."

Christ himself showed his authority and superiority over Moses when he said "Ye have heard . . but I SAY . ." Matthew 5:21-22, 27-28, 31-34, 38-39, 43-44. Christ's authority was so apparent that "the people were astonished at his doctrine. For he taught them as one having AUTHORITY, and not as the scribes" Matthew 5:28-29.

John declares by inspiration that Christ was the Word, and the Light which was with God from the beginning, and that the Word became flesh and dwelt among us (John 1:1-14). Christ then is the Word of God and Christ's laws came from God (John 14:10).

The Gospels-Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John—contain the life and teaching of Christ while here on earth. The remainder of the New Testament is just as much the will, remainder of the New Testament is just as much the will, law, words, and teachings of Christ because he said he would inspire the Apostles with the Holy Spirit to: "bring all things to your remembrance, whatsoever I have said unto you," "teach you all things," and "guide you into all truth" John 14:26; 16:13. Christ said that the words the Holy Spirit inspired them to say and write would be his (Christ's) words John 16:12-15. Christ did send the Holy Spirit into the Apostles and others and thus today in our complete New Testament we have the words, and teachings, and laws of Christ through inspired men.

Christ and his law as recorded in the New Testament is our authority today. Another way to see that Christ's law is our authority today is by the fact that we will be judged not by the Old Testament but by the New Testament will of Christ (John 12:48). Truly as Christ said "ALL AUTHORITY HATH BEEN GIVEN UNTO ME . . ." Matthew 28:18 (Revised Version)
