

Where To Find The Plan Of Salvation

Previous lessons have shown that THE EVENTS OF THE FOUR GOSPELS TOOK PLACE UNDER THE LAW OF fect after his death.

CHRIST'S WILL COULD NOT GO INTO EFFECT WHILE HE LIVED (Heb. 9:16-17). The law of Moses which he lived under ended at the cross (Col. 2:14). Christ's will was probated by Peter (Matt. 16:19) and the rest of the apostles (John 20:21-23) on the first Pentecost after the resurrection of Christ (Acts 2).

THE EVENTS OF ACTS, CHAPTER TWO BEGIN THE CHRISTIAN DISPENSATION, the will of Christ, which we are under today. The remainder of the New Testament (Acts 2 to Revelation) contains special instructions for us under the Christian age. Genesis 1 to Exodus 19 (creation to Mt. Sinai) tell of the Patriarchal dispensation. Exodus 20 to the death of Christ (as recorded in the gospels) are the scriptures telling of events of the Mosaical dispensation. Acts 2 to Revelation tell of the last dispensation, the Christian, which we are under today).

TO FIND OUT HOW TO BE SAVED AND KEEP SAVED TODAY WE GO NOT TO THE OLD TESTAMENT OR TO THE GOSPELS; WE MUST GO TO ACTS AND THE RE-MAINDER OF THE NEW TESTAMENT.

THE FOUR GOSPELS TELL OF THE LIFE OF CHRIST and were written especially to create faith in Christ (John 20:31). ACTS OF APOSTLES TELLS HOW TO GET INTO CHRIST'S BODY OR CHURCH. Romans to Jude tell how to live in Christ. Revelation tells of the future home of those who die in Christ (Eph. 1:3; 5:23; Rev. 14:13; 20:15).

THE PROPER DIVISIONS OF THE NEW TESTAMENT ACCORDING TO DISPENSATIONS ARE TWO, THE MOSAICAL which continues from the Old Testament through the gospels AND THE CHRISTIAN, from Acts on to Revela-

THE DIVISIONS OF THE NEW TESTAMENT ACCORDING TO BOOKS ARE THESE: THE GOSPELS (Matthew to John), ACTS of Apostles, THE EPISTLES (Rom. to Jude) and THE REVELATION.

With these proper divisions in mind we can more easily understand the New Testament. To disregard them is to guarantee confusion and misunderstanding.

When Bible students understand these divisions it is very simple and easy to know where to go in the Bible to find out what people must do to be saved today. We go not the salms or other places in the Old Testament. We go not to the thief on the cross or other examples of conversion dur-ing the events of the gospels, but WE GO TO ACTS OF APOSTLES where we see the terms of the great commis of Christ put into action and effect.

If we want to know God's laws for the Jews before Christ's death, we go to the Old Testament. If we want more faith in Christ, we go to the gospels. If we want to know what to do to be saved today we go to Acts. If we want to know what to do to keep saved we go to the Epistles. If we want to read of heaven and hell we go to Revelation..

During his lifetime Christ could dispose of his property (forgiveness, healing, etc.) as he saw fit just as men do today. Christ demands different acts of different people and granted favors on various occasions during his lifetime (John 9:7; 5:8; 8:11; Luke 23:43; 18:18-22; etc.); but when Christ died and his last will and testament wien into effect on penecost the conditions of salvation became fixed and will remain forever unchanged. The principle is the same as in the last wills of men. A man can make many wills and can dispose of his property during his lifetime as he desires but when he dies and his valid last will is probated the conditions of disposition of his property become fixed and forever unchanged.

If we lived during the personal ministry of Christ, we might hope to be saved like the thief on the cross and others then; but since we live this side of the cross and the probation of Christ's will, we must go to Acts of Apostles to find the unchangeable conditions of salvation today.


