1 cut-up frying chicken (about 3 lbs.) 1½ cups Pet Evaporated Milk 1¼ cups flour 1 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper

2 teaspoons paprika
1/2 cup shortening
No. 21/2 can cling peach
halves, drained
1 can oven-ready biscuits

1 cup water

Turn on oven and set at 425 (very hot). Dip chicken in ½ cup milk, then roll in mixture of 1 cup flour, the salt, pepper and paprika. Melt shortening in 13 x 9 x 2-in. pan in oven. Put chicken into pan, skin side down. Bake 50 min. Turn chicken and move to one end of pan. Arrange peaches on chicken. Separate biscuits and put into other end of pan. Bake 15 min. longer, or until biscuits are light brown. Remove food to hot plates.

For gravy: Mix ¼ cup flour into drippings left in pan. Stir in water gradually. Boil and stir 2 min. Stir in 1 cup milk. Heat, but do not boil. Add salt and pepper to taste. Serve over biscuits. Makes 4 servings.






