## Classes Will Register For School This Month

Plans for the opening of the Ballinger Schools on September 3 are being completed as fast as possible. Joe Forester, high school principal, has announced dates for registration of high school students in each class. The following schedule has been set up for registrations: Seniors, August 27, 9 a. m.; Juniors, August 28, 9 a. m.; Sophomores, Aug. 28, 1 p. m.; Freshmen, August 29, 9 a. m. Mr. Forester stated that he would be in his office all this week and that any new students who will be entering school here this year are urged to contact him in regard to their courses and other information.

Students who were in school last year and who desire to make a change in their course or schedule are also asked to contact the principal this week. School administrators are trying to complete the faculty as soon as possible and contacts were made last week-end with several prospects. Supt. Ernest Caskey will call a faculty meeting before the opening day of school at which time a general meeting will be held and followed by a session of teachers and principals in each of the three schools. The schedule for the first day of school on September 3 will be announced later.

## Quarterback Club First Meeting Set Friday, August 16

The Bearcat Quarterback Club will hold its first meeting for the new school year on Friday, August 16, at 8 p. m. Officers are urging all fans to attend this meeting and become members of the club for the 1957 football season. Items of business will include the election of officers for the new year, naming a number of committees and hearing a report from the coaches in the State Coaching School at Dallas. The coaches will also give a preview of the prospects and schedule for this fall. At the close of the meeting a picture of a Southwestern Conference football game will be shown. An effort is being made to secure the Sugar Bowl Game between Baylor and Tennessee. The club will make plans for the annual football preview to be held before the first game on September 6. A membership drive will be started and it is hoped that 300 members or more can be obtained. The report of the secretary will list some of the things done by the club last year. This will include: 1. Buying a special camera for filming Bearcat games. 2. Holding a football preview. 3. Furnishing a special bus for all out of town games played by the Bearcat A team. 4. Buying a pair of safety goggles for use of players in games. 5. Giving a banquet for all A and B team boys in high school with Sammy Baugh as the main speaker. 6. Giving a banquet for all A and B team junior high players with Coach Chuck Moser of Abilene as the speaker. 7. Meeting each week during the season to hear a report from the coaches and to view a picture of the game the previous week-end. 8. The club had a membership of 255 last year.

## Mrs. Mary Cain Will Speak Here August 20

The Ballinger Rotary Club will sponsor the appearance of Mrs. Mary D. Cain of Summit, Mississippi at a special meeting here on the night of Tuesday, August 20. While the meeting is sponsored by the Rotarians, the Ballinger Lions, Jaycees and other groups will attend. E. E. King, Rotary program chairman, stated that the meeting would be open to everyone, but asked that reservations be made with him by August 15. The only cost will be the payment of the meal and no collections will be taken. The program will be held at the Acapulco Cafe in case the dining room there will accommodate the crowd. In case reservations indicate an overflow, arrangements will be made for larger quarters so that every person in this area who desires to hear Mrs. Cain may attend. Mrs. Cain was the first woman candidate for governor in Mississippi. In 1952 she acquired national recognition through her defiant refusal to pay social security for either herself or any of her employees and who sawed off a padlock from the door of her newspaper, The Sun, where it had been placed by agents of the Internal Revenue Department. Her subject will be "Our Greatest Trust," a powerful exposure of the manner in which "Big Government" has practically nullified the Bill of Rights which was created to protect individuals in their homes and their property rights. The fiery woman editor is in great demand as a speaker, averaging from three to six nights each week. When the Internal Revenue Department placed a padlock on the door of her newspaper, she left a sick bed and in 15 minutes had sawed it off and she proudly asserts the Sun has not missed a single issue. A large number of people in this area have indicated an interest in hearing Mrs. Cain on her Ballinger appearance and the Rotary Club points out that everyone is invited. Rotarians will take their ladies and others who make reservations may also bring their wives. The important thing is to make reservation by August 15 so that proper arrangements can be made to handle the crowd.

The Pilgrim Royalty & Uranium Corp. of Dallas No. 1-Haywood Tierce has been completed as a Gardner lime producer in the Ballinger multipay field, 3/4 mile northwest of Hatchel. It was finished for a daily flowing potential of 547 barrels of 44 gravity oil. Top of pay was found at 4,084 feet and casing was cemented at 4,989 feet, the total depth of the hole. Rowan Oil Co. and Texas Gulf Producing Co. will drill its No. 2-W. T. Padgett in the Busher (Morris sand) field, seven miles northwest of Ballinger. Rotary drilling to 4,500 feet will start when permit is approved. Jim Thomas of Dallas has filed application to drill a 2,700 foot test, five miles east of Ballinger which will be the No. 1-Morris Stokes. It is 3/4 mile southwest of the one-well Byers (Dog Bend) field. Drilling was scheduled to start on August 8. Murray Petroleum Co. will drill its No. 2-Bertha Ryan as a location step-out to Gardner sand production in the Briley multipay field, four miles northeast of Winters. The contract depth is for 4,500 feet.

## New Hatchel Well Runs 547 Barrels In Gardner Lime

The ASC office will start calling in all wheat farmers this week to see if they want to participate in the soil bank program in 1958. Farmers have from August 26 to October 4 in which to sign their new contracts if they place acreage in the program. W. R. (Buddy) Gray stated that farmers would also be mailed their wheat rate this week. The county average will be about \$9 per acre on wheat with each farm having a different rate which will run from \$7.64 to \$10.34 per acre. Measuring of cotton, both acres out of production and that planted, is about 90 per cent completed and teams will complete the job within a short time. Pay off checks under the soil bank are being made from the local office each week and while no exact figures of the exact amount paid to date were available, it was estimated that the total would reach a million dollars some time this fall. Inspections of land placed in the soil bank on the long time program were being made this week. Where noxious weeds are found, owners are being given 15 days in which to make corrections or penalties will be assessed.

## County Wheat Farmers To Sign New Contracts

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## 4-H Electrical Program At Menard August 13

350 4-H club boys and girls, adult leaders, county and home demonstration agents from 22 West Texas counties are expected in Menard, August 13, for an Electrical Demonstration day to be held at the Menard High School. The school is being sponsored by the Texas Agriculture Extension Service and West Texas Utilities Co. R. E. Ruble of Ballinger, WTU district manager, and R. L. Conner, WTU Menard local manager, will serve as hosts for the utilities company. J. L. (Curly) Hays, WTU Farm and Ranch Advisor, will open the program at 9:30 with introductions and group assignments following the registration of delegates. The boys and girls will be divided into two groups. At 10:15 the two groups of boys will see electrical demonstrations by Price Hobgood, Agriculture Engineer, Extension Service of Texas A & M College and Bob Jaska, Research Associate of the Agriculture Department of Texas A & M. At 11:05 the speakers will change groups.

The two groups of girls will attend demonstrations on home lighting given by Jake Traylor of Ballinger, WTU lighting advisor, and G. C. Osborne of Abilene, lighting supervisor. Mrs. Ruth Clappitt, WTU home economist will give a demonstration on cooking with small appliances. At noon the group will be the guests of West Texas Utilities Co. for lunch served at WTU Park in Menard. Following the lunch, Dan Castles, WTU public service department, will present a program on adequate wiring in homes. The afternoon session will be held in the auditorium where four electrical demonstrations will be presented by 4-H club teams. Assisting with the day's program will be R. E. Kennedy, manager of WTU's public service department. Attending the school from each county will be two representative boys and two representative girls, the county and home demonstration agents.

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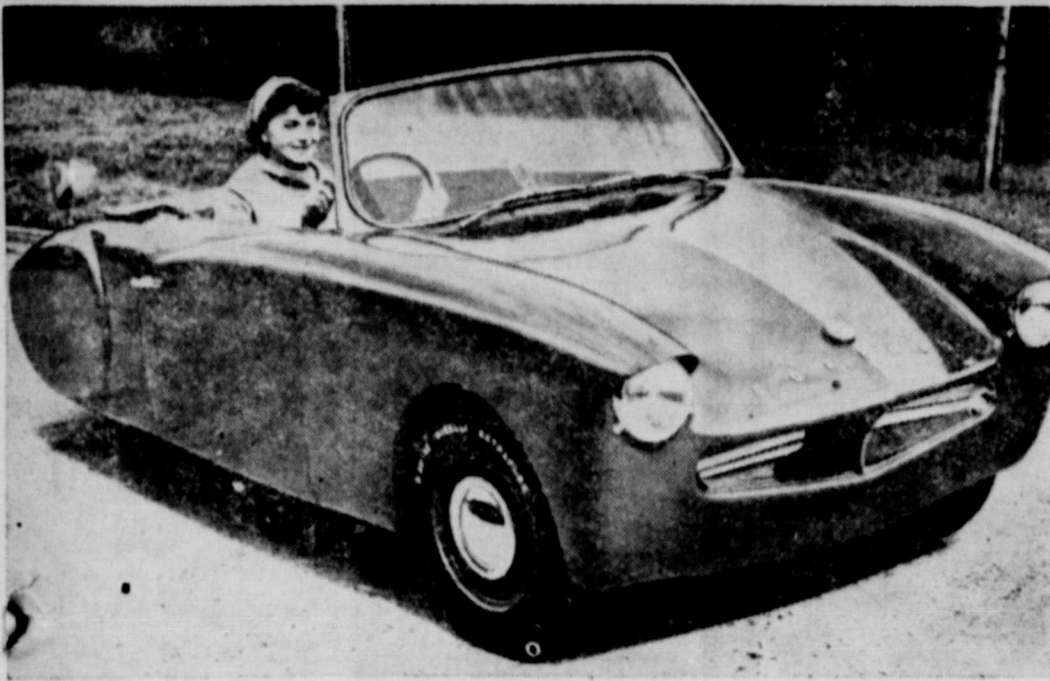

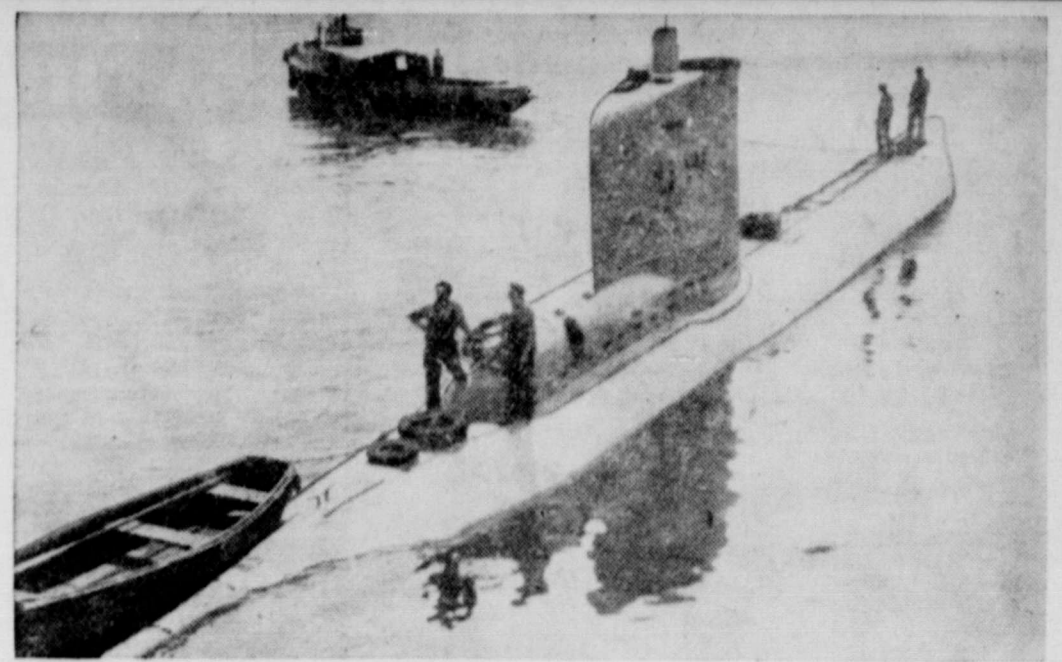

**GRASS DEMONSTRATION IN COUNTY DOES WELL**

Robert Conner, a cooperator with the Runnels Soil Conservation District in the Pumphrey community, has 10 acres of blue panicum and 20 acres of sorghum alnum grass. He is well pleased with the way both grasses are doing. The two grasses were dry planted the first part of April this year. They are now seeded-out.

In discussing and examining these grasses with Woodrow Hoffman, of the local Soil Conservation Service, Conner said that grasses are good soil improving crops. The examination of these grasses' root systems showed them to have deep fibrous roots. These roots will open up the soil and make efficient use of rains and help prevent water erosion. They will also stabilize the soil and help keep it from blowing.

Conner planted about two pounds blue panicum seed per acre. It was planted on top of the beds and not covered. He planted it two years previously but he said that he covered it too deep and it would not come up. He said he tried to plant about a pound of sorghum alnum per acre but actually planted about one-half pound. Conner reports that it is easy to get up. He planted it like sudan grass.

Conner plans to harvest the seed from both of these grasses.

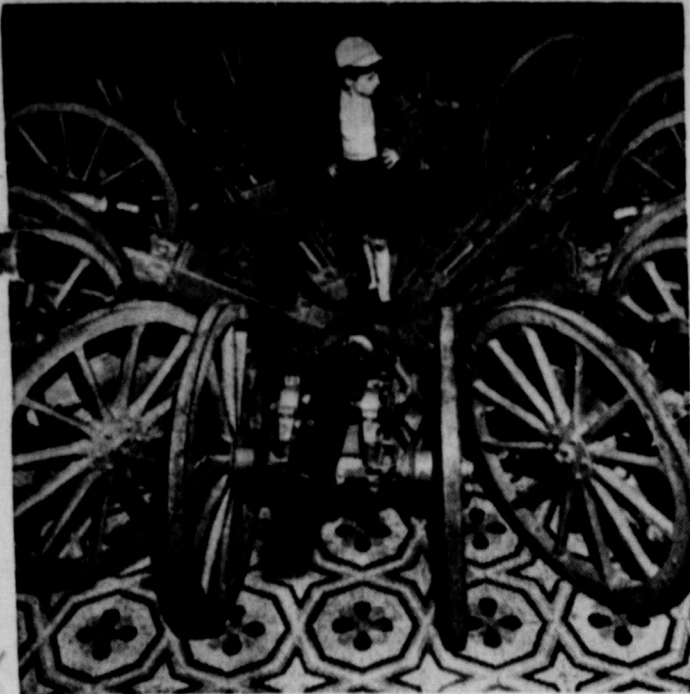

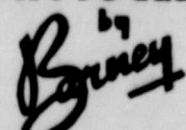

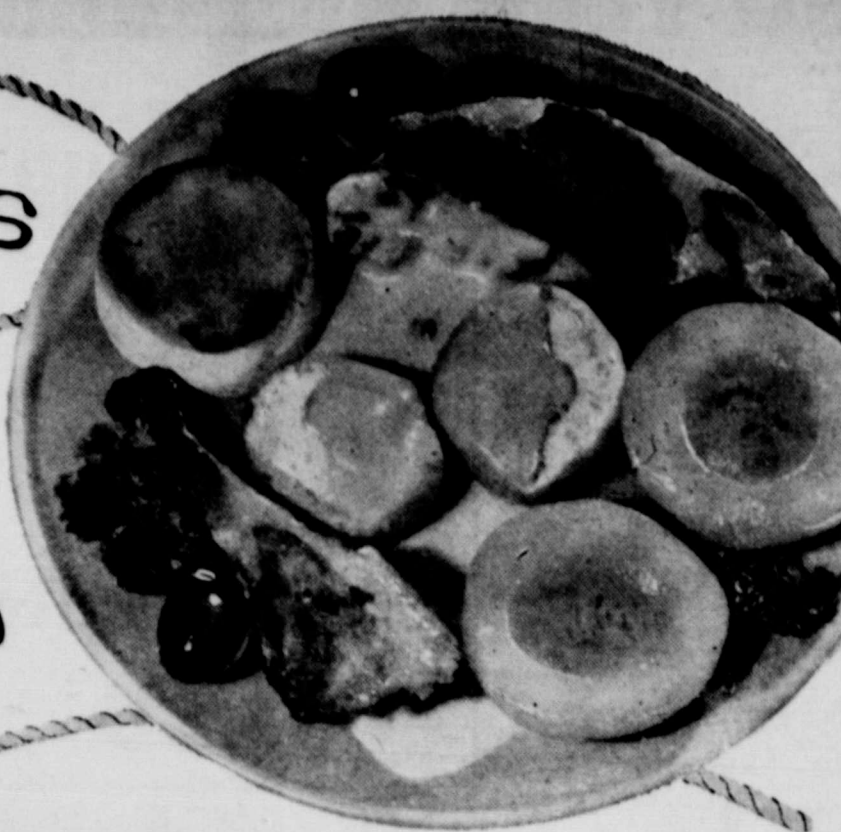

Bake 15 min. longer, or until biscuits are light brown. Remove food to hot plates.

For gravy: Mix 1/4 cup flour into drippings left in pan. Stir in water gradually. Boil and stir 2 min. Stir in 1 cup milk. Heat, but do not boil. Add salt and pepper to taste. Serve over biscuits. Makes 4 servings.

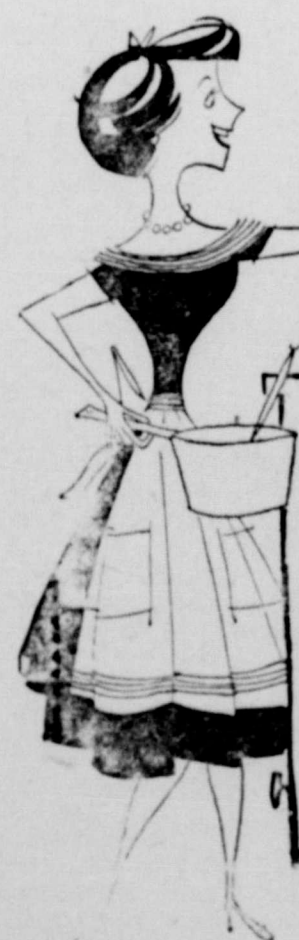

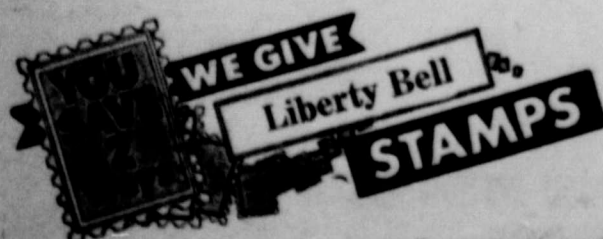

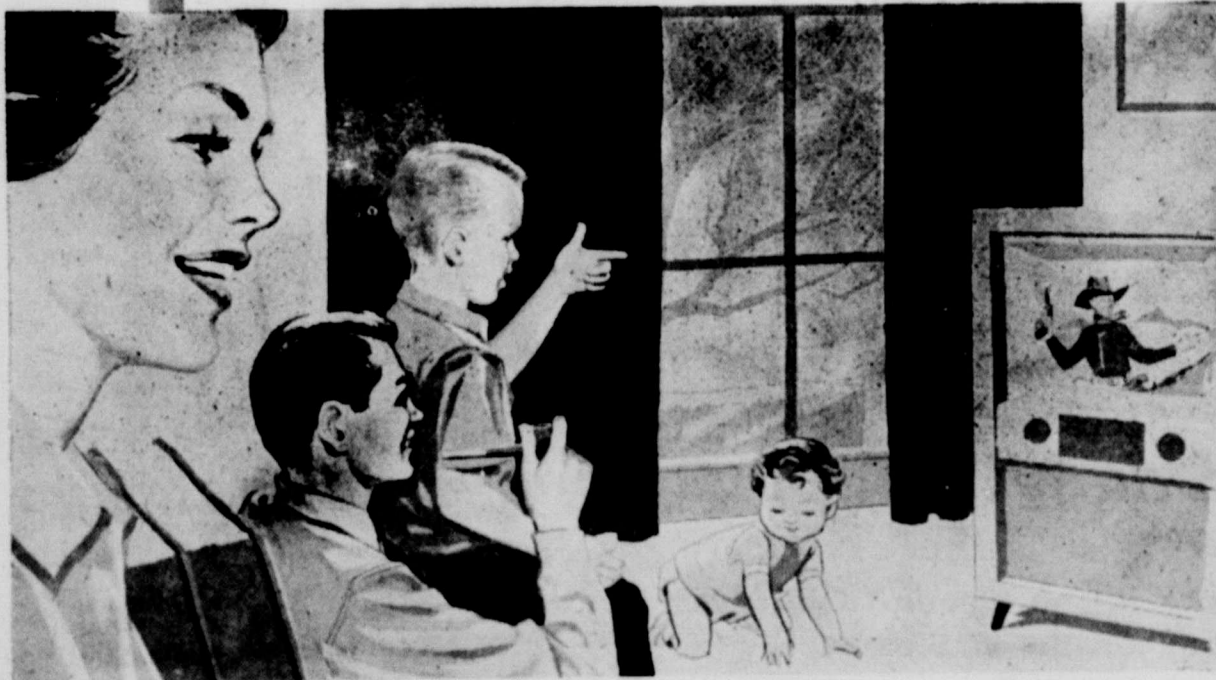
